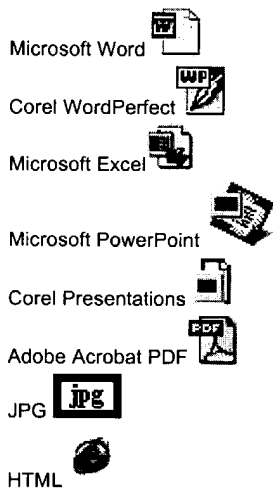


Welcome to the SAMHSA Disaster Technical Assistance Center

Outreach Materials are provided to the States/Territories as easy-to-use, print and reproducible electronic templates. Materials have been compiled on a CD-ROM but not limited to children, older adults, general audiences, and first responders. Materials and slide presentations are formatted in Microsoft Word/PowerPoint/Perfect/Presentations. In some cases, the conversion from PowerPoint to PDF (the non-essential graphics being lost). Please note that depending on the user's system, the files provided in the files should be carefully reviewed and tailored before printing. A large number of files are provided in Adobe® PDF® format and may be opened in Adobe Reader.



Accessing files from the CD-ROM

(This document, welcome.doc, is available as a Word document in the root directory of the CD-ROM.)

The Table of Contents on the left is the user's guide for assistance in identifying files on this CD-ROM. Icons also are provided in a legend to help the user identify individual files.

In order to access the files on the CD-ROM, the user will need to use a computer (for example, the C: drive). Once there the user will view the direct Table of Contents.

One way to access the files is to:

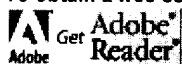
- Enter the "My Computer" folder by either double clicking on "My Computer" or clicking on "start" and then clicking on "My Computer."

- Right mouse click on the icon and choose "Explore."

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V. Outreach Materials

How to Use the Public Educational Outreach Materials

Outreach, as it is used in the Crisis Counseling Program (CCP), is one of the methods for delivering crisis counseling services to disaster survivors. Public materials are distributed to individuals and community groups and target populations such as children, older adults, general audiences, farmers and The content of some of the materials also is phase-related to address specific disaster recovery including such needs as coping with holidays or the disaster and preparing the community for program closure.









Many of these public educational materials were developed by State crisis grant programs funded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). Innovative brochures, flyers, and pamphlets are a sampling of materials used by State grantees in quarterly and final reports.

Outreach materials are categorized by target population or disaster phase. They are formatted in MS Word and Corel WordPerfect, quick, user-friendly to the user to save the materials for immediate use and modification. Users are encouraged to review carefully the sample materials prior to "customizing" individual program needs and disaster type. For example, MS Word and Corel allows the user to easily delete/insert individual project name/logos and headers. The user is responsible for the final product including putting the files through the review and clearance processes for the individual State/Territory.

Although these materials are in the public domain and may be duplicated for State and local programs, materials should be referenced accordingly and author/development, where provided, should receive appropriate attribution to the agency. 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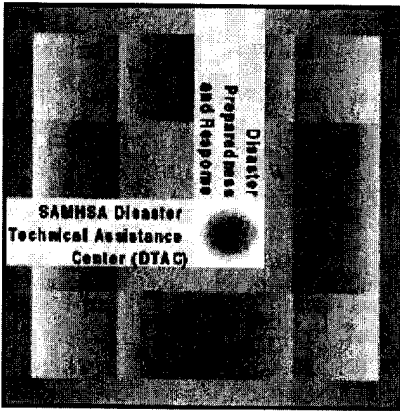

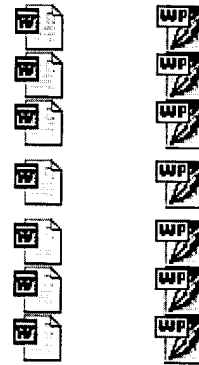

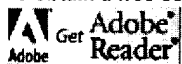
