HEADBOAT SURVEY

Instructions for completion of the headboat survey trip report

Filling out the catch record is not difficult. Most of the information is easily understandable from the form. The following is a brief explanation of the information that is to be provided in each blank

Lines 1 - 5: Each line should be complete. In the first line, enter the name of the vessel, the date of departure, the departure time, and the arrival time. Enter the license number of the captain operating the vessel. The location of the trip should be reported from the map that is provided. Write in the degrees of latitude and degrees of longitude and the alpha and numeric codes for corresponding 10 minute squares. Enter the number of anglers taken on the headboat trip, and the number of anglers who fished, even if the same as the number of anglers taken. The columns labeled Full Day, Night, 3/4 day, overnight, ½ day and other are the trip types. Use the table below to determine which type of trip and check () the appropriate line.

FISH SPECIES Section: Record only one number and one weight in whole pounds for each type of fish kept. Please do not write in "lbs" or "#". Record the number of fish released alive, and the number of fish released dead. Include any fish used for bait in the released dead column. Spaces have been provided at the bottom of the form for species not listed.

Signature: This helps the port agent if he or she must ask any follow-up questions about a particular entry.
