

**SUPPORTING STATEMENT
(Form 8819)**

1. CIRCUMSTANCES NECESSITATING COLLECTION OF INFORMATION

Form 8819 is filed by U.S. and foreign persons to elect to use the U.S. dollar as its and its qualified business units' functional currency. Only businesses that operate in a country whose currency is hyper-inflationary may make this election.

2. USE OF DATA

The IRS uses Form 8819 to determine if the election is properly made and if the country which the business operates has a truly hyper-inflationary currency.

We have no plans to offer electronic filing for Form 8819 due to the relative low number of filers.
