With your host, or on your own, begin planning your presentation. Use resources in the presentation kit and on the Peace Corps website. Here are some tips to get started:

- Think about the audience with which you would be most comfortable—your child's classmates, colleagues at work, congregation, or grandchild's Scout troop? Select an environment and audience works for you.
- Contact a teacher, Scout leader, religious leader, community center, of workplace supervisor and offer your services. Point out that thousands of other returned Volunteers will be doing the same thing in an effort to help Americans nationwide learn more about other countries and peoples.
- Consider asking another returned Volunteer to make a presentation with you. Two viewpoints will give your audience a broader perspective on the work of Volunteers and might make the experience even more enjoyable for you.

The Paul D. Coverdell World Wise Schools Program helps bring the cross-cultural experiences of Peace Corps Volunteers to schoolchildren in the United States. It makes a diverse world more familiar through easily adapted lessons and stories written by cur ent and returned Volunteers. The program links U.S. teachers with Volunteers overseas through the Correspondence Mat h program, and it offers students a flavor of the Peace Corps experience through archived e-mails of selected Volunteers. Teachers can use the program's study guides on culture, geography, and service; videos about the countries where Volunteers serve; and other resources to impart the knowledge and experiences of Volunteers. The Peace Corps Partnership Program is one of the primary channels for Volunteers and their host communities to obtain financial support for community-initiated projects.

The Partnership Program links interested individuals, groups, foundations, and service organizations in the United States that are willing to contribute to the projects of Volunteers and their communities they serve abroad. The Partnership Program conveys the communities' pressing needs to Americans who share a concern for grassroots development. A key criterion of the cost-sharing program is that the receiving community contributes 25 percent to the total project cost and therefore is actively involved in its own development.

The program also establishes direct communication between groups and individuals in the United States and communities hosting a Volunteer. This facilitates mutual understanding of different cultures and ways of life. Visit www.peacecorps.gov/contribute.
