II. POLICIES AND SUPPORTS FOR SERVICE-LEARNING

For the purposes of this survey, service-learning is defined as <u>curriculum-based</u> community service that integrates classroom instruction with community service activities. Like community service, service-learning may be mandatory or voluntary, and may have service activities that take place outside of or within the school. However, service-learning also:

- Is organized in relation to an academic course or curriculum;
- Has clearly stated learning objectives;
- Addresses real community needs; and
- Involves students in drawing lessons from the service through regularly scheduled, organized reflection or critical analysis activities, such as classroom discussions, presentations, or directed writing.

Example of service-learning: Students in a middle school science class studying the environment help preserve the natural habitat of animals living at a local lake. Through classroom studies, the students learn about the environment. The students keep the area around the lake clean, post signs providing information to the public, and study soil and water composition as well as the impact of industrial development on wildlife. Throughout the project, students write about their experiences in journals and participate in class discussions about the project and its effect on their lives and the local community.
