You May Burn	You May Not Burn
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> •Paper, paper products, or cardboard used to start a fire •Paper, paper products, or cardboard that is produced at a single-family residence or at a building with four or fewer apartments or housing units •Yard clippings, brush, and other vegetation. <p>AND</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •Pile must be less than 6 feet in diameter <p>OR</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •No more than 30 feet of fence line vegetation <p>OR</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •No more than 20 feet of ditch bank vegetation 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Garbage • Plastic • Hazardous waste • Dead animals or parts of dead animals • Junked motor vehicles • Tires • Asphalt • Construction debris • Lumber or timber • Pesticides or packaging • Batteries • Light bulbs • Asbestos • Pathological organisms • Insulated wire • Any material that makes dark smoke other than vegetative materials • Paper and cardboard more than necessary to start a fire

This permit is part of a federal air quality program administered by the Nez Perce Tribe to control emissions of air pollutants and manage smoke for air quality purposes. These rules apply to any person within the Nez Perce Indian reservation.

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We appreciate your comments or feedback:

Q: Why do I need a permit?

A: Smoke from open burning is an air pollutant with effects on air quality and public health (especially for children and the elderly).

Q: What are some alternatives to outdoor burning?

A: Chipping and shredding vegetation for composting. Also household items such as glass, plastics and paper can be recycled and should not be burned.

Q: How can I burn more cleanly?

A: Make sure your fuel is as dry as possible, separate the fire from the damp ground and be sure there is a draft to keep the fire burning hot.

Q: Are there exceptions?

A: Cultural, traditional and recreational fires are exempt and do not require a permit.
