<u>Introduction</u>: Information Collection #2133-0511, Effective U.S. Control (EUSC) Parent Company; request for renewal; expiration date: February 28, 2009

A. Justification

1. Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary. Identify any legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection. Attach a copy of the appropriate section of each statute and regulation mandating or authorizing the collection of information.

The Effective U.S. Control (EUSC)/Parent Company collection consists of an inventory of foreign-registered vessels owned by U.S. citizens. The information in question is collected from commercial sources and verified through direct contact with the vessel operators. The verification of information on vessels that could be vital in a national or international emergency is essential to the logistical support planning by MARAD's Office of Emergency Preparedness. The information is used in contingency planning and provides data related to potential sealift capacity to support movement of fuel and military equipment to war or crisis zones as well as essential liquid and dry cargoes to support the national economy. The enabling authority is found in Sections 210, 211, and 902 of the Merchant Marine Act, 1936, as amended. (See attachments).

This collection of information enhances the Department of Transportation's strategic goal for security, preparedness and response.

2. Indicate how, by whom, and for what purpose the information is to be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection.

The information is used by MARAD's Office of Emergency Preparedness for contingency planning for sealift capacity. Incomplete or inaccurate information as to the ownership, flag, size, age, speed and tonnage could lead to invalid conclusions and faulty analysis.

3. Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology. Also, describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden.

MARAD offers a total electronic option for this collection.

4. Describe efforts to identify duplication. Show specifically why any similar

information already available cannot be used or modified for use for the purposes described in item 2 above.

We have identified Lloyd's "Register of Shipping" as the prime source on vessel owners and ship characteristics, but have not identified an alternative to direct verification. A significant number of exceptions are found annually that precludes sole reliance on the prime source.

5. If the collection of information impacts small businesses or other small entities (Item 5 of OMB Form 83-I), describe any methods used to minimize burden.

This information collection does not impact small businesses.

6. Describe the consequence to Federal program or policy activities if the collection is not conducted or is conducted less frequently, as well as any technical or legal obstacles to reducing burden.

Mobilization plans would lack current information thereby reducing their accuracy.

There are no special circumstances that require the collection of information to be conducted in a manner described above.

The Maritime Administration published a 60-day notice and request for comments on this information collection in the Federal Register on September 2, 2008, (Vol. 73, No. 170, at 51340, copy attached) indicating comments should be submitted on or before November 3, 2008. No comments were received.

No payments or gifts are provided to respondents.

The information requested is not of a confidential nature and, consequently, no assurance of confidentiality need be given.

The information is also included in a tabulation that exhibits the parent company, direct owner, vessel name, class of vessel, where built (country), year built, gross tonnage, deadweight tonnage, speed and flag of registry.

Publication is released annually in May based on survey data as of January 1.
