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INTERAGENCY AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE OFFICE OF JUSTICE PROGRAMS NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF JUSTICE

AND

U.S. DEPARMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION NATIONAL CENTER FOR INJURY PREVENTION AND CONTROL

I. Purpose

This memorandum sets forth the terms of an agreement between the National Institute of Justice (NIJ), Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention-(CDC), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to provide funds to support multi-agency (NIJ, CDC, DoD) efforts in development and conduct of the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey (NISVS). NIJ will provide funding for support of this survey.

II. Authority

The Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended, 42 U.S.C. sec 3722 and sec 202, and Fiscal Year 2007 Appropriations Act, Public Law 110-5, 121 Stat. 8 (2007), a continuing resolution incorporating Public Law 109-108, 119 Stat. 2298 (2005).

CDC authority is contained in The Economy Act of 1932, as amended (31 U.S.C. Sections 1535 and 1536) and in Section 301 of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 241).

III. Background

NIJ and the CDC have had nearly fifteen years of collaboration in support of intimate partner and sexual violence research and evaluation. Similarly, NIJ, DoD and the CDC have a number of years of collaboration in support of domestic violence prevention and intervention programs and research. The proposed transfer of funds is intended to further the mutual work of the agencies. It is further understood that NIJ will gain substantial benefit from the expenditure of these funds for the purposes enumerated in this Agreement.

IV. Scope of Work

NIJ is providing funds to the CDC for support of the NISVS, which is based on the first National Violence Against Women Survey jointly sponsored by CDC and NIJ. All parties intend that funds provided under this agreement will be expended only for the conduct of NISVS and related purposes, as specified herein.

A. Objective

The primary objectives of this survey are as follows:

- Determine prevalence, incidence, characteristics and consequences of intimate partner violence, sexual violence and stalking among civilian populations.
- Oversample Native American women. The data on Native American women will feed into NIJ's congressionally mandated Baseline Study of American Indian and Alaska Native women.
- Determine prevalence, characteristics and consequences of intimate partner violence among married military members. Documenting actual rates will provide comparison against the civilian rates as well as against reported rates in the military.

B. Approach/Methods

The design and conduct of the NISVS will be based on the results of the NISVS pilot study that is currently under way at the CDC. The survey will include a random, representative sample of the population of married active duty military members and current spouses of active duty military members that can be compared to the civilian sample.

C. Specific Tasks

- 1. Secure approval from Institutional Review Boards, as well as review/approval under DoD Instruction (DoDI) 1100.13 and licensing under DoD Directive (DoDD) 8910.
- 2. Train interviewers on study design and protocol.
- 3. Collect data on civilian sample and a comparable DoD sample according to specified study protocol.
- 4. Create data set of civilian and military sample that is ready to be analyzed.
- 5. Analyze data as to the prevalence, incidence, characteristics and consequences of intimate partner violence, sexual violence and stalking among civilian populations.
- 6. Analyze data as to the prevalence, characteristics and consequences of intimate partner violence in the military.
- 7. Compare civilian data with a comparable military sample.
- 8. Provide final report with Executive Summary that documents analyses of the civilian population.
- 9. Provide final report and summary briefing paper that documents analyses of the military population, including the comparison to the civilian sample.

D. Deliverables

- 1. A full data set that is cleaned and coded, including the civilian and military samples.
- 2. A final report with Executive Summary that documents analyses of the civilian population.
- 3. A final report and summary briefing paper that summarize the analyses conducted on the military sample, alone and in the context of the civilian sample.

E. Schedule

- 1. Revise existing proposal for approval with Institutional Review Boards, DoDI and DoDD 120 days following award of the contract to the organization that will be collecting and analyzing the NISVS data.
- 2. Submit materials for review to Institutional Review Boards, DoDI and DoDD 4½ months following award of the contract to the organization that will be collecting and analyzing the NISVS data.
- 3. Modify training material for interviewers 8 months following award of the contract to the organization that will be collecting and analyzing the NISVS data.
- 4. Train interviewers and collect data months 12 through 18 following award of the contract to the organization that will be collecting and analyzing the NISVS data.
- 5. Prepare data for analysis 12-24 months following award of the contract to the organization that will be collecting and analyzing the NISVS data.
- 6. Provide weekly data reports during data collection.
- 7. Review initial analyses and findings with NIJ and DoD Subject Matter Expert 26 months following award of the contract to the organization that will be collecting and analyzing the NISVS data.
- 8. Provide draft of final report that documents analyses of the military population, including the comparison to the civilian sample, within two months of CDC receiving final data set.
- 9. Provide final report and summary briefing paper that summarize the analyses conducted on the military sample, alone and in the context of the civilian sample, within four months of CDC receiving final data set.

F. Identification and Disposition/Use of Data

Data collected from the civilian population will be archived at the Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research (ICPSR), National Archive of Criminal Justice Data (NACJD) at the University of Michigan. DoD maintains the authority over all data collected from the DoD population. DoD data and results can only be released with the prior written approval from DoD.

VII. Modifications and Termination

A. Amendments or modifications to this Agreement must be approved by each of the parties in writing, in accordance with applicable policies, procedures, and legal requirements.

B. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon sixty (60) days advance written notice to the other party. The party receiving notice that the other party intends to terminate the Agreement shall be given the opportunity to respond to a proposed termination for cause prior to any final action. In the event the Agreement is terminated for cause, the party proposing to terminate the Agreement shall, in the notice, specify the reason for the termination and accord the other party a reasonable time to terminate operations under this Agreement.

C. Disposition of any efforts in progress at the time of notification of termination shall be determined by agreement of the parties.

VIII. Limitations

All payments and activities under this Agreement are subject to the availability of appropriated funds. No provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted to require obligation or payment of funds in violation of the Anti-Deficiency Act, 31 U.S.C. § 1341.

IX. Effective Date

The provisions of this Agreement become effective as of the date of the last signature hereunder, and shall remain in effect for two (2) years, unless terminated earlier in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

X. Disputes

In accordance with OMB Memorandum M-07-03, any disputes that may arise under this IAA shall be resolved under the procedures set out in section VII of Treasury Bulletin 2007-03.
