National Immunization Survey – Evaluation Study Frequently Asked Questions

How long will this survey take?

It will take approximately 28 minutes to complete the interview.

Why can't you contact somebody else?

Your household was scientifically selected to participate in this study and represents many others in your community. Without your help, your community may not be adequately represented in the results of the survey.

How are the data used?

Although childhood vaccination rates are at an all-time high of 90%, many children still do not have all of their shots. In response, the Department of Health and Human Services wants to improve immunization services while lowering the cost of vaccines. Local, state, and federal health officials need the results of this survey to help achieve those goals. Data are collected from households with children between the ages of 19 and 35 months living in the United States at the time of the interview. These data are used to analyze vaccination levels among young children in the US, to identify groups at risk of vaccine-preventable diseases and to evaluate the effectiveness of programs designed to increase vaccination coverage.

The results of this survey also help local, state, and federal health officials understand how to improve health care services for all children. Therefore, some households may be asked questions about the types of health services their children need or use.

What confidential protection do I have?

This survey is authorized by Title 42, United States Code, Sections 306 & 2102(a)(7) of the Public Health Service Act and by The National Childhood Vaccine Injury Act of 1986. Legal authorization for the Census Bureau to conduct the survey is granted by Title 13, United States Code, Section 8. The information you provide will be treated confidentially, as specified by law in Section 9 of Title 13. We will not release any information that could identify you, your child, or the child's medical history. The information collected will be used for statistical purposes only. Although your participation is voluntary, we hope that you will choose to participate in this very important study.
