What is this collection about?	This information collection requirement affects small passenger vessels (under 100 gross tons) that carry more than 6 passengers. The information is necessary for the proper administration and enforcement of the commercial vessel safety program for these vessels.

When must information be submitted to the Coast Guard?	For a vessel seeking an initial certification as a small passenger vessel, the information must be submitted to the Coast Guard (CG) Officer in Charge, Marine Inspection (OCMI) before a determination can be made. For a vessel that has previously been certified and seeks a renewal of its certification, the information must be submitted at least 30 days prior to the expiration date of the Certificate of Inspection.	
How is the information submitted?	In writing or electronically to the local OCMI. Contact info for CG OCMIs can be found at— <u>http://www.uscg.mil/top/units/</u> .	
What happens when complete information is received?	The CG will review the information and determine if a vessel is eligible to receive certification as a small passenger vessel. If it qualifies, a small passenger vessel will receive a Certificate of Inspection valid for five years (one year if on international voyages).
