SUPPORTING STATEMENT FOR NEW AND REVISED INFORMATION COLLECTIONS

OMB CONTROL NUMBER 3038-NEW

Justification

1. Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary.

Identify any legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection.

Attach a copy of the appropriate section of each statute and regulation mandating or authorizing the collection of information.

CFTC Regulation 30.10 allows persons located and doing business outside the U.S., who are subject to a comparable regulatory framework in the country in which they are located, to seek an exemption from the application of certain of the Part 30 regulations. In essence, a petitioner under Regulation 30.10 must present, with particularity, the factual basis for a finding of comparability and the reasons why the policies and purposes of the Commission's regulatory program are met, notwithstanding any differences of degree or kind in the petitioner's regulatory program. The petitioner must set forth how the laws in its jurisdiction are comparable to U.S. laws with regards to: (1) registration, authorization or other form of licensing, fitness review or qualification of persons through which customer orders are solicited and accepted; (2) minimum financial requirements for those persons that accept customer funds; (3) protection of customer funds from misapplication; (4) recordkeeping and reporting requirements; (5) minimum sales practice standards, including disclosure of the risks of futures and options transactions and, in particular, the risk of transactions undertaken outside the jurisdiction of domestic law; (6) compliance; and (7) information-sharing.

Currently, there are 13 foreign entities¹ (two regulators and 11 futures exchanges) that have a Regulation 30.10 exemption some of which date back to the late eighties, early nineties. Consequently, the Commission's Division of Clearing and Intermediary Oversight (DCIO) would like to embark upon a program whereby each year, DCIO sends out a questionnaire to exemption recipients inquiring as to material and other relevant changes that impacted our could impact the fundamentals for which exemptive relief was granted in the first place.

2. <u>Indicate how, by whom, and for what purpose the data would be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection.</u>

The collection will be conducted through a questionnaire (see attachment) inquiring on the seven comparability standards listed above among other relevant questions. The questionnaire will be conducted by DCIO which is the Division responsible for recommending to the Commission whether exemptive relief should be granted in the

first place. The purpose is to: (1) obtain updated information regarding regulatory changes and market developments; (2) update relevant documents within the Division particularly in light of some of the older outstanding orders and; (3) establish lines of communication with the Commission's counterparts in foreign jurisdictions.

3. Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g. permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. The collection of information will involve the submission of answers by means of electronic mail in order to facilitate as many responses as possible through the most efficient means.

The 13 outstanding Regulation 30.10 exemptive orders are to different foreign futures exchanges or foreign regulators all governed by different laws. Thus, there is no duplication in the information requested or to be received.

U.S. customers are the primary beneficiaries of frequent disclosure by Regulation 30.10 exemptive recipients as such disclosure would bring to light any legal change or market change that could have the potential of impacting U.S. customers' transactions abroad. By requiring annual reporting, the Commission will be in a better position to evaluate (or re-evaluate) whether the foreign jurisdiction's laws are still comparable to U.S. laws and thus serve as adequate safeguards for U.S. customers.

The notice was published on February 10, 2010 in 75 FR 6637. Only one comment was received. The comment related to the fact that Taiwan should not be considered a foreign entity or foreign jurisdiction or considered to be located outside the US, territories or possessions.

The comment was reviewed and we have determined that no action needs to be taken.

Consultation with representatives of those from whom information is to be obtained or those who must compile records should occur at least once every 3 years - even if the collection of information activity is the same as in prior periods. There may be circumstances that may preclude consultation in a specific situation. These circumstances should be explained.

The proposed questionnaire will be published in the *Federal Register* for comment. All comments will be carefully considered before sending the questionnaire to the Regulation 30.10 recipients.

The Commission has provided no assurance of confidentiality above that provided by the agency's Freedom of Information Act regulations, 17 C.F.R. Part 145.

Total number of respondents = 13; Frequency of response = annual; Annual hour burden = 13 (13 questions x 1 approximate hour per question*). Aggregate annual hour burden = 169 (13 respondents x 13 annual hour burden).

*Note that some jurisdictions that obtained Regulation 30.10 relief have upheld their obligation to continuously provide the Commission with updates as their laws or market conditions have changed. Others however have not. Consequently, for those jurisdictions who have already fulfilled their obligation, the per hour burden could be less than one hour while those jurisdictions that have been lax in providing the Commission with information could have a per hour burden of one hour.
