On background, the Federal Register Notice for the Department of Energy's Office of Electricity Delivery and Energy Reliability's (OE) request for extension of its emergency information collection request provides transparency for both OE and the Smart Grid Investment Grant and Smart Grid Demonstration Project recipients. This monthly reporting enables the DOE to monitor each recipient's work and track their progress in achieving their project milestones while ensuring cost compliance with Recovery Act guidelines. Also, monthly reporting provides the DOE and recipients data to facilitate any needed changes since funding for the projects has a relatively short time span of 36 months. The monthly reporting did not impede the negotiations for Smart Grid Investment Grants or the Smart Grid Demonstration Projects.
