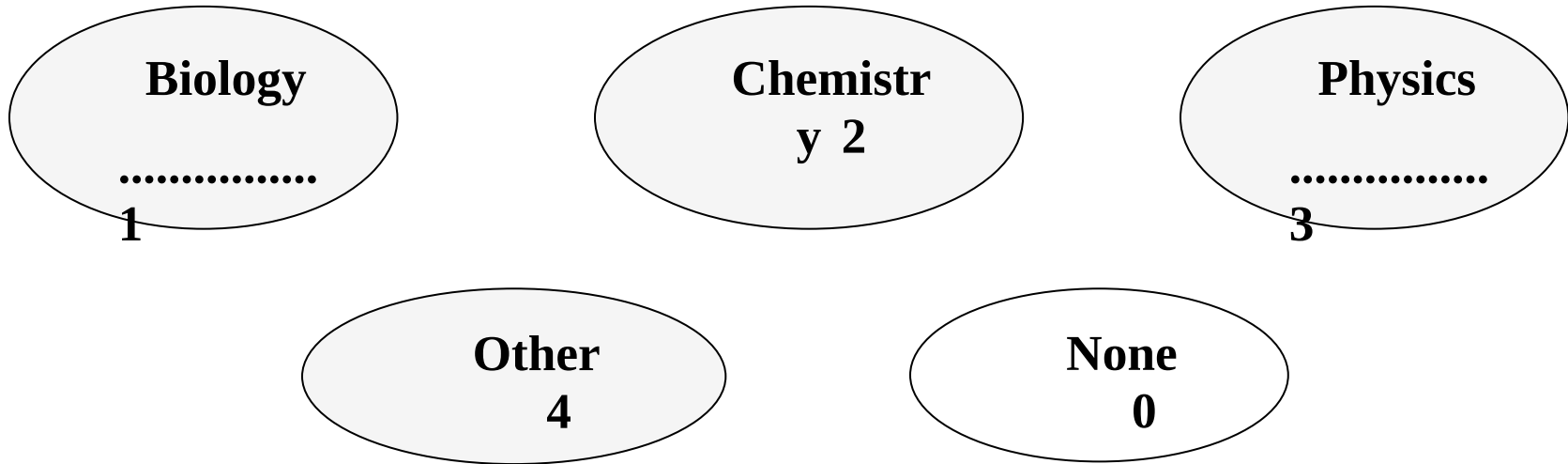

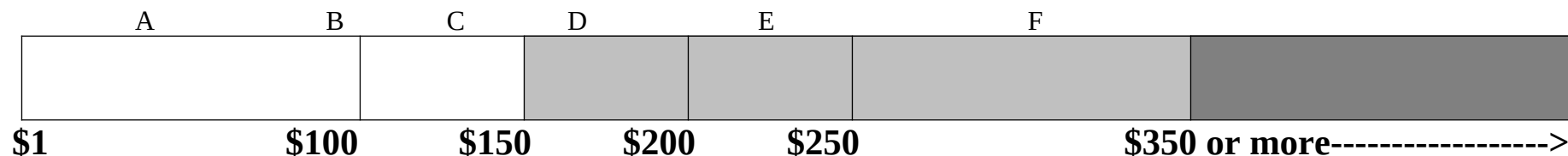

## Types of Child Care Arrangements

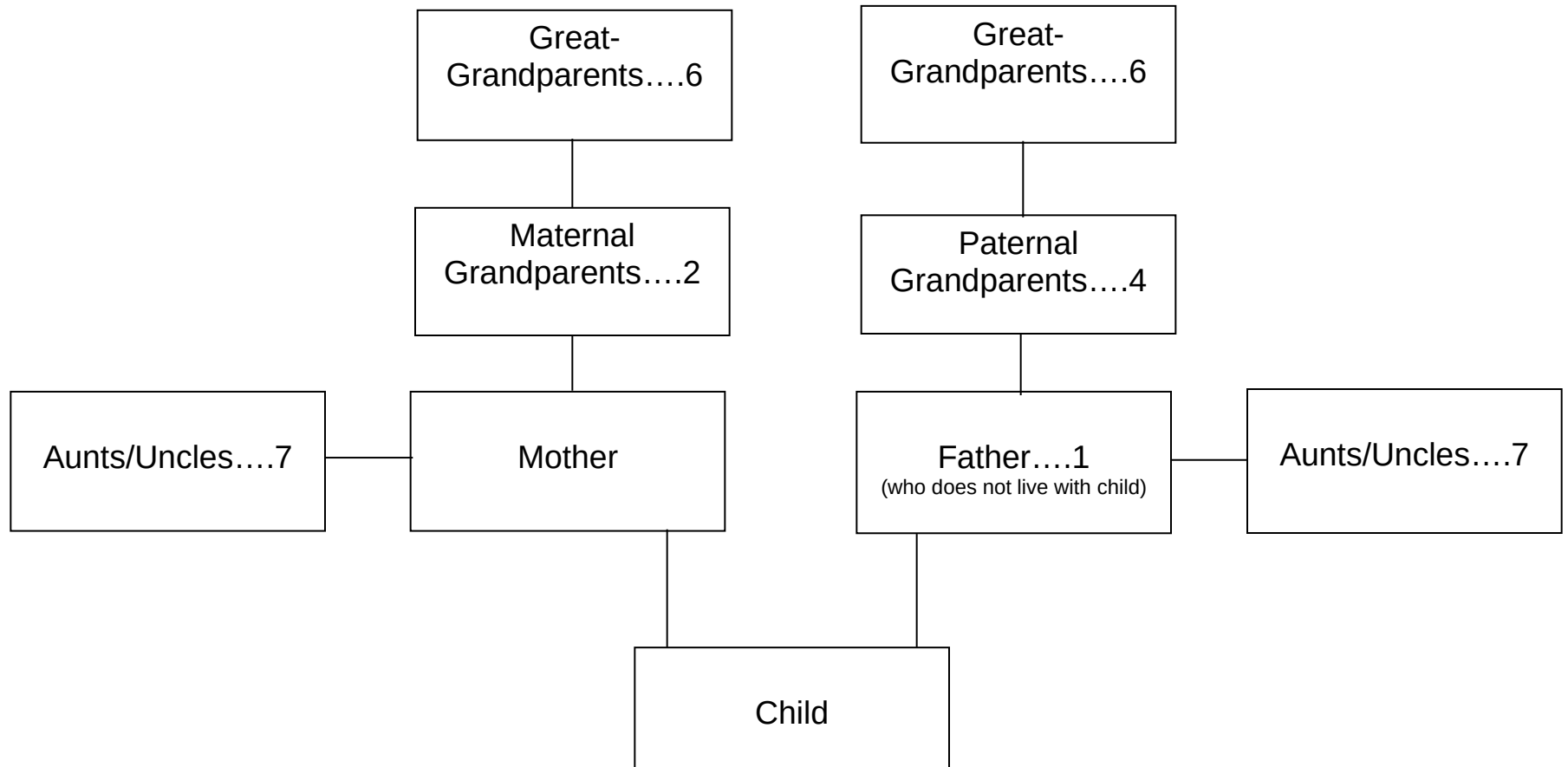
### Informal Care

- **Spousal or Partner Care.....1** - child is cared for by your live-in spouse or partner who may or may not be the child's father
- **Relative Care.....2** - child is cared for by your relative or in-law, including the child's father if the father does not live with the child; this type of care does not include care given by any of your other children
- **Sibling Care.....3** - child is cared for by one of your other children
- **Self Care.....4** - child cares for herself or himself
- **Non-Relative Care.....5** - child is cared for by a baby-sitter, nanny, boyfriend, or friend in the child's home

### Formal Care

- **Family Day-Care.....6** - child is cared for by a non-relative in the non-relative's home - even if your child is the only one for whom the provider cares
- **Child Care Center.....7** - child is cared for in a preschool, Head Start, Montessori, day-care center, nursery school, or other pre-kindergarten program
- **Formal Schooling.....8** - child attends a kindergarten, elementary, middle, or junior high school
- **After-School Care.....9** - child receives formal care after school

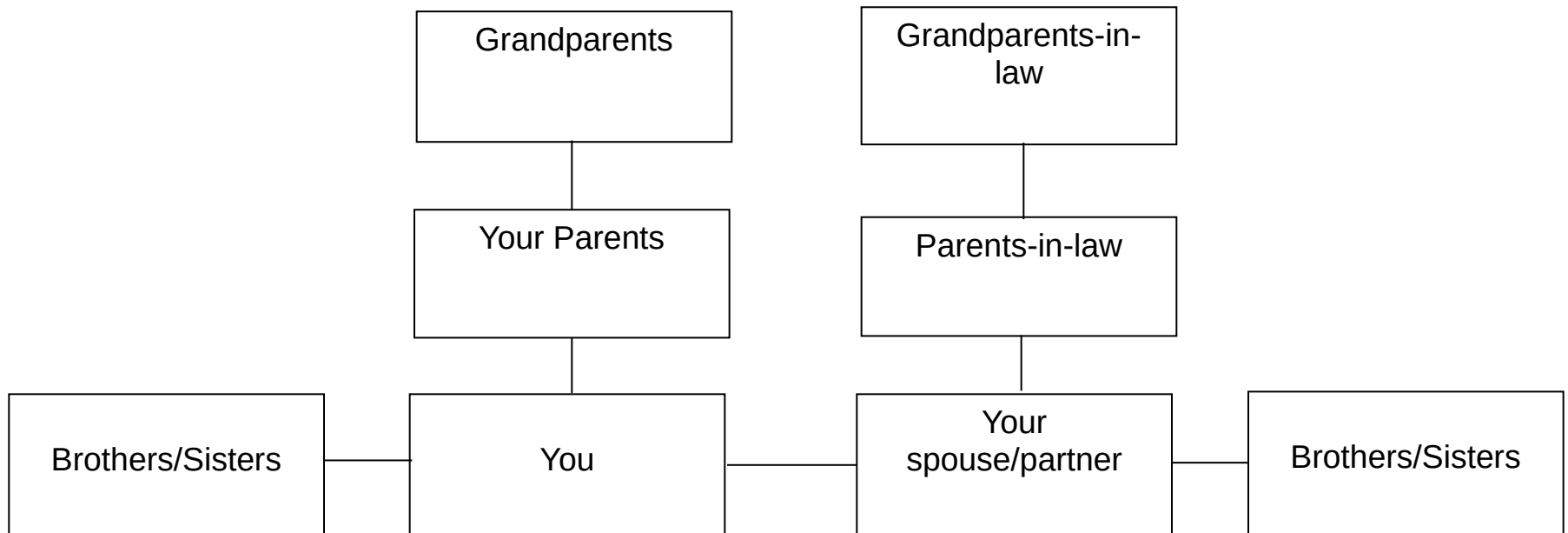

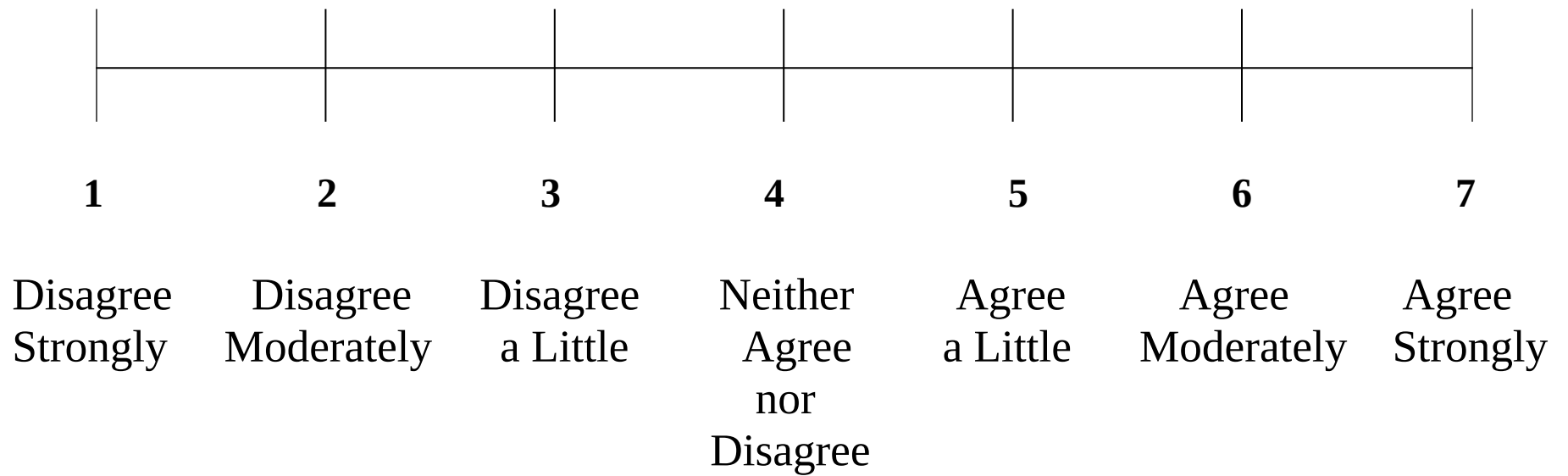
