 How long of a period did you think about in determining a "TYPICAL MONTH"?
- Some questions referred to the last 12 months, from September 2006 until now. How did you interpret that time frame?

(Researcher Note: Have clean version of questionnaire, without probe questions, available for participant to refer to, if needed, when trying to identify specific questions in response to probes below.)

PROXY ISSUES:

- Would you be able to answer the survey questions about everyone that lives in your household? If no, ask which topics R might not be able to answer for other household members.?
- Do you think other people living in your household would be willing to answer the survey questions? If no, probe further as to which ones and why.
- Do you think one household respondent would be able to answer the survey questions about everyone that lived in their household? If no, probe further as to which ones and why.

SENSITIVITY ISSUES:

- What was your overall opinion about the survey questions we discussed?
- Do these questions sound like a lot of other survey questions you've answered?
- **Did you find any of the questions difficult to answer?** If yes, probe to determine which questions the participant thought were difficult to answer?
- **Did you find any of the questions sensitive?** If yes, probe further to identify which questions and what it was about them that was sensitive.
- Were you offended by any of the questions we asked? If yes, probe further to identify which questions and what it was about them that was offensive.
- Is there anything about these questions that might cause you not to want to participate in Census Bureau surveys? If yes, probe further to determine what reasons the participants has.
- Did you think the questions were appropriate for a Census Bureau survey? If no, probe further to determine why the questions don't seem appropriate.
