Supporting Statement Request for Entry or Departure for Flights To and From Cuba 1651-xxxx

1. Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary. Identify any legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection. Attach a copy of the appropriate section of each statue and regulation mandating or authorizing the collection of information.

Under Department of Homeland Security (DHS) regulations, direct flights between the United States and Cuba must arrive at or depart from one of three named U.S. airports: John F. Kennedy International Airport, Los Angeles International Airport, and Miami International Airport. This document amends current DHS regulations to allow additional U.S. airports that are able to process international flights to request approval of U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to process authorized flights between the United States and Cuba. These amendments are in accordance with the President's recent statement easing the restrictions placed on flights to and from Cuba by, among other things, providing that eligible airports may seek approval from CBP to accommodate flights arriving from, or departing for, Cuba.

To be eligible to request approval to accept flights to and from Cuba, an airport must be an international airport, landing rights airport, or user fee airport, as defined and described in part 122 of the CBP regulations (19 CFR part 122) and have adequate and up-to-date staffing, equipment and facilities to process international traffic.

In order for an airport to seek approval to allow arriving and departing flights from Cuba, the port authority must send a written request to CBP requesting permission and asserting that they have adequate staffing, equipment, and facilities to process international traffic.

This proposed information collection is authorized by 19 U.S.C.1433, 1644a, 8 U.S.C 1103, and provided for by 19 CFR 122.153.

2. Indicate how, by whom, and for what purpose the information is to be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection.

CBP will use this information to determine whether to approve or disapprove the request. This approval will be based on whether the requesting location has adequate staffing and facilities to support CBP operations.

3. Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g.

permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. Also describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden.

Due to the small number of responses associated with this information collection, it would not be cost effective to automate this process. Respondents may send in their requests by mail or fax, or they may scan a signed copy and email it.

CBP will post an information notice on CBP.gov instructing respondents how to submit this information.

4. Describe efforts to identify duplication. Show specifically why any similar information already available cannot be used or modified for use for the purposes described in Item 2 above.

This information is not duplicated in any other place or any other form.

This information collection does not have an impact on small businesses or other small entities.

Without this information, CBP would not know which airports intend to have flights to or from Cuba.

The burden hours associated with collection are estimated at 16 hours. This is based on the estimated number of respondents 16) multiplied (x) the time per response (I hour) = 16 hours.

The number of respondents (16) is an estimate based on the number of airports located in areas with Cuban populations and therefore, might send a request to CBP to allow Cuban flights to arrive or depart.

Public Cost

The estimated cost to the respondents is \$320. This is based on the estimated burden hours (16) multiplied (x) hourly rate (\$20.00).

13. Provide an estimate of the total annual cost burden to respondents or recordkeepers resulting from the collection of information.

There are no record keeping, capital, start-up or maintenance costs associated with this information collection.

The estimated annual cost to the Federal Government associated with the review of these records is \$48,384. This is based on the number of responses that are submitted to CBP (16) that must be reviewed (x) the time to review and process each response (72 hours) = 1,152 hours (x) the average hourly rate (\$42.00) = \$48,384.

This is a new collection of information.
