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# 1 INTRODUCTION

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The purpose of this document is to list all the data elements collected online from the Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS) program alumni. The data element differences between EIS and other CDC fellowship programs are documented in Appendix B. The data elements are grouped by the high level entities in the system.

The Fellowship Management System (FMS) alumni directory system is a self-service connection to allow alumni to update their personal information including current address, contact information and education. FMS is a robust flexible framework and has been successfully tailored for the various CDC fellowships including EIS.

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## 1.1 DOCUMENT STRUCTURE

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This document is broken down by the major sections/screens of the alumni directory system. The alumni login & registration pages are documented as the separate section. A section has its own chapter that is further divided by subsections where applicable. Each section/subsection contains:
