COLLECTION INSTRUMENT(S): Form No. N-25

A. Justification

- 1. Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary. Identify any legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection. Attach a copy of the appropriate section of each statute and regulation mandating or authorizing the collection of information.
 - Section 310 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (Act), provides authority to the courts to administer the oath of allegiance,
- 2. Indicate how, by whom, and for what purpose the information is to be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection.
 - The Form N-25 is necessary to allow U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) to obtain verification from a court that a person claiming to be a naturalized citizen has, in fact, been naturalized by that court. The form may be used to validate a claim of being naturalized.
- 3. Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g., permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. Also describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden.
 - The use of this form currently provides the most efficient means for collecting and processing the required data. USCIS or a court may complete the data fields in the form but the court verifies information pertaining to the court naturalizing a person. The court cannot return the form to USCIS because it is not ingested into an electronic system.
- 4. Describe efforts to identify duplication. Show specifically why any similar information already available cannot be used or modified for use for the purposes described in Item 2 above.
 - A search of the USCIS Forms Inventory Report revealed no duplication of effort and there is no other similar information currently available that can be used for this purpose.

This collection of information does not have an impact on small businesses or other small entities.

In the absence of other evidence, Form N-25 is the only way that one may prove that he or she has been naturalized.

 - Requiring respondents to report information to the agency more often than quarterly;
 - requiring respondents to prepare a written response to a collection of information in fewer than 30 days after receipt of it;
 - requiring respondents to submit more than an original and two copies of any document;
 - requiring respondents to retain records, other than health, medical, government contract, grant-in-aid, or tax records for more than three years;
 - In connection with a statistical survey, that is not designed to produce valid and reliable results that can be generalized to the universe of study;
 - requiring the use of a statistical data classification that has not been reviewed and approved by OMB;
 - that includes a pledge of confidentiality that is not supported by authority established in statute or regulation, that is not supported by disclosure and data security policies that are consistent with the pledge, or which unnecessarily impedes sharing of data with other agencies for compatible confidential use; or
 - requiring respondents to submit proprietary trade secret, or other confidential information unless the agency can demonstrate that it has instituted procedures to protect the information's confidentiality to the extent permitted by law.

The special circumstances contained in Item 7 of the Supporting Statement are not applicable to this information collection.

On 16 February, 2012, USCIS published a 60-day Notice in the Federal Register at 77 FR 9258. No comments were received in connection with that publication. On April 24, 2012, USCIS published a 30-day Notice in the Federal Register at 77 FR 24507. No comments have been received in connection with that publication to the date.

USCIS does not provide payments or gifts to respondents in exchange for a benefit sought.

There is no assurance of confidentiality. The Privacy Impact Assessment associated with this information collection is the Integrated Digitization Document Management Program (IDDMP) dated January 5, 2007 and the corresponding system of record notice is the Immigration and Customs Enforcement, Customs and Border Protection—001 Alien File, Index, and National File Tracking System of Records which was published in the

Federal Register on June 13, 2011 at 76 FR 34233.

Annual Reporting Burden

The annual reporting burden is 250. This figure was derived by multiplying the number of respondents (1,000) x frequency of response (1) x hours per response (25) hours (15) minutes). This estimation is based on prior USCIS experience with the program.

Government Cost

The estimated cost to the Government is \$10,000. This figure is calculated by multiplying the estimated number of respondents $1,000 \times .25$ hours (15 minutes) per response (Time required to collect and process this information) $\times \$40$ (suggested average hourly rate for clerical, officer, and supervisory time with benefits). In addition, this figure includes the estimated overhead cost for printing, stocking, and distributing the form, which is \$0.

There has been no increase or decrease in the estimated burden hours previously reported for this information collection. No changes have been made to the information being collected.
