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Who must comply?	Owners and operators of commercial vessels.
What is this collection about?	This information collection requires the owner or operator of a vessel, within 5 days, to report a marine casualty. Additionally, the owner or operator of a vessel must periodically report chemical drug and alcohol testing of commercial vessel personnel.
Where do I find the requirements for this information?	Title 46 CFR Parts 4 and 16 are available at— http://ecfr.gpoaccess.gov . For 46 CFR, select TITLE 46 – SHIPPING, and follow it to Parts 4 and 16. For reporting marine casualties, see 46 CFR Part 4. For periodic chemical testing, see 46 CFR Part 16.
When must information be submitted to the Coast Guard?	For reporting a marine casualty, within 5 days of the casualty. For chemical drug and alcohol testing of commercial vessel personnel, periodically according to the requirements in 46 CFR Part 16.
How is the information submitted?	- For reporting a marine casualty, the information is submitted on form CG-2692 (and CG-2692A and CG-2692B, if necessary) within 5 days of the casualty. Forms are available at http://homport.uscg.mil Missions > Investigations. - For chemical drug and alcohol testing of commercial vessel personnel, periodically according to the requirements in 46 CFR Part 16. All the above information may be submitted in writing or electronically via facsimile or e-mail.
What happens when complete information is received?	This information will be reviewed by CG investigators. No specific documentation will be issued by the CG.
