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What is PISA?

Assessments will be conducted in science, reading, mathematics, financial literacy, and collaborative problem solving.

PISA is sponsored by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) and managed in the United States by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) of the U.S. Department of Education.

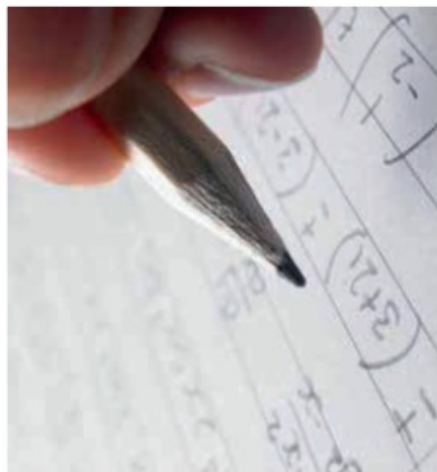
Why is PISA important?

PISA provides a unique opportunity to compare U.S. 15-year-old students' science, reading, and mathematics knowledge and skills with those of peers in countries around the world. PISA



complements what we learn from national assessments by identifying the strengths and weaknesses of student performance internationally. The results inform national discussions about education as well as international competitiveness.

PISA also compares U.S. student performance over time and across different segments of the U.S. student population. PISA examines relationships between student performance and schooling across countries to suggest national strengths and weaknesses.



What is the purpose of the PISA Field Test in 2014?

PISA conducts a field test (a small-scale, trial run of the assessment) in every participating country to see if any of the test questions are biased because of national, social, or cultural differences. Statistical analyses of student answers are also conducted to check for evidence of differences in student performance across countries that could indicate a linguistic or conceptual translation problem. Test questions that are found to be problematic are dropped from the assessment or treated differently in the analysis.

In spring 2014, the United States will participate in the PISA 2015 field test. Assessments will be conducted using both paper-and-pencil and computers so that a mode effects study can be performed. The field test data will provide valuable information to ensure both unbiased assessments and a smooth transition to a fully computer-based assessment for PISA 2015.

What will students be asked to do in the field test?

The field test consists of either paper-and-pencil or computer sessions. Each is approximately 3 hours and includes time for instructions, the administration of the assessment, and a brief questionnaire that students complete about themselves. Participation is voluntary but important for ensuring that the sample is representative of schools and students across the country.

What type of assessment is PISA?

The PISA assessments are developed through an international consensus-building process involving input from U.S. and international experts in science, reading, mathematics, financial literacy, collaborative problem solving, and measurement. In a final step, the assessment is endorsed by all participating countries. The assessment contains a mix of types of questions: some require students to select appropriate responses, while others require that students solve problems and provide written answers. Who conducts the PISA assessment?

The entire assessment process will be undertaken by trained staff from Westat, a research organization under contract to the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics (NCES). NCES conducts this study under authorization in the Education Sciences Reform Act of 2002 (20 U.S.C., § 9543) and approval of the U.S. Office of Management and Budget under OMB # 1850-0755.

How are teacher and school questionnaires administered?

The teacher and school questionnaires are both administered online from a secure website. Up to 25 teachers (10 science and 15 non-science) will be asked to participate by completing an online 45-minute questionnaire that asks about their education and teaching experience. This is the first time PISA is administering the teacher questionnaire. The school questionnaire, which looks at school characteristics such as enrollment and school practices, is also online and takes about 60 minutes to complete.

Do teachers need to help administer the assessment?

No. Westat field staff will visit the school on the day of the assessment, bringing with them all the materials required, and they will handle the entire administration of the assessment. Field staff will also bring all of the necessary computer equipment for the computer-based assessments.

When will the field test be conducted?

The field test will be conducted between April 7 and May 16, 2014. Westat will work with schools to identify an assessment date convenient for the school in that time period.

Where will the field test be conducted?

The assessment will be conducted in the schools that are selected to participate.

How long does the field test take?

Students will take either a paper-and-pencil or computer-based assessment. This approximately 3-hour session includes time for instructions, the assessment, and a brief questionnaire that students complete about themselves. Some students will return to participate in an additional 1-hour assessment in financial literacy.

What will happen with the collected data?

The field test data will be used to evaluate whether the assessment fairly and accurately measures students' knowledge and skills in all participating countries. By law, the data provided by schools, staff, and students may be used only for statistical purposes and may not be disclosed, or used, in identifiable form for any other purpose [Education Science Reform Act of 2002 (ESRA 2002), 20 U.S. Code, Section 9573]. Reports of the findings from the field test will not identify participating districts, schools, students, or individual staff. Individual responses will be combined with those from other participants to produce summary statistics and reports.

What is PISA?

How often do you get to represent your country?*

What subjects are assessed in PISA?

In the field test students will take either a paper-and-pencil or computer-based assessment. Students will be assessed in science, reading, mathematics, financial literacy, or collaborative problem solving, or some combination of these subjects.

How long does PISA take?

The PISA assessment takes approximately 3 hours to complete. This includes time for instructions, the assessment, and a brief questionnaire that students answer about themselves. Some students will return to participate in an additional 1-hour assessment in financial literacy.

How does PISA select a representative sample of students?

The schools that participate in PISA in the United States are randomly selected from a list of all schools in the country that have 15-year-old students. This is to ensure that the U.S. participants accurately represent the whole United States and not particular types of schools or students. In each PISA school, each 15-year-old student has an equal chance of being selected. From a list of all 15-year-old students in the school, 42 students are randomly selected to participate. Participants in other countries are selected just the same way to make sure each country is fairly represented and no country has an advantage because of types of schools or students selected.

What is PISA?

PISA (the Program for International Student Assessment) is the world's largest international assessment that measures student learning in science, reading, and mathematics. More than 60 countries representing more than 90 percent of the world's economy participate in PISA. The assessment occurs every 3 years (2000, 2003, 2006, 2009, 2012, and 2015), and provides information about how students in the U.S. compare in achievement with students in other countries. What is the purpose of the PISA Field Test?

Each time the study is done, new assessment questions need to be developed and tested to ensure that those questions accurately measure the knowledge and skills of students. This field test will allow test developers to modify or delete questions that are not working effectively for students in the United States.

What is involved?

PISA staff will visit the school and administer the field test. The field test will take approximately 3 hours; it includes time for instructions, the administration assessment, and a brief questionnaire that students complete about themselves. Some students will be asked to return for an additional 1-hour assessment of financial literacy.

What are the benefits?

The nation as a whole benefits from PISA by having a greater understanding of how the knowledge and skills of U.S. students compare with those of students from other countries. The country benefits from the field test by ensuring that the questions used are fair and appropriate for U.S. students. Schools that participate in PISA will receive \$200, and each student who participates will receive \$25 and a certificate from the U.S. Department of Education for 4 hours of volunteer service. Students who also participate in the financial literacy assessment will receive an additional \$15.
