SHPPS does not involve a student survey. School staff will be interviewed in person during a convenient time at their school campus. Data from a nationally representative sample

of schools will be collected between February and May 2014. Study procedures are designed to allow for anonymous participation; states, districts, schools, and staff will not be identified in any published reports.

Enclosed is an informational packet about the study, which contains questionnaire content outlines, a study fact sheet, and invitational packets for the selected schools in your district. Results from SHPPS will be available by the fall of 2015 and will be available on the CDC's web site. SHPPS data will be used to help improve school health policies and programs nationwide and to support the school health and HIV education programs CDC has supported since 1988.
