10. Abstract:
The Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 ("VAWA") protects qualified tenants, participants, applicants, and affiliated individuals, who are victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking. This is an optional form. A PHA, owner, or management agent presented with a claim for continued or initial tenancy or assistance based on status as a victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking has the option to request that the victim document or provide written evidence to demonstrate that the violence occurred.

Supporting Statement for Paperwork Reduction Act Submissions

A. Justification

1. Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary. Identify any legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection. Attach a copy of the appropriate section of each statute and regulation mandating or authorizing the collection of information.

The Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (VAWA 2013), Public Law 113-4, 127 Stat. 54, reauthorized and amended the Violence Against Women Act of 1994, as previously amended (title IV, sec. 40001-40703 of Public Law 103-322, 42 U.S.C. 13925 et seq.). In order to fully implement the provisions of VAWA that afford protections to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking, the Department must revise the HUD-approved certification form for victims to submit and sign certifying that the individual is a victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking and that the incident in question is bona fide. See Title VI of VAWA 2013, Section 41411.

2. Indicate how, by whom and for what purpose the information is to be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection.

PHAs, owners, and managers will use the information in order to evaluate whether an individual is entitled to protection under VAWA.

3. Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g., permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. Also describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden.

This is a limited collection and will not affect a large number of individuals therefore; it would not be cost effective to automate the collection.

4. Describe efforts to identify duplication. Show specifically why any similar information already available cannot be used or modified for use for the purposes described in Item 2 above.

Similar certification forms related to this purpose are not already available.

5. If the collection of information impacts small businesses or other small entities (Item 5 of OMB Form 83-I) describe any methods used to minimize burden.

This collection does not impact small businesses or other entities.

6. Describe the consequence to Federal program or policy activities if the collection is not conducted or is conducted less frequently, as well as any technical or legal obstacles to reducing burden.

The consequences to Federal program or policy activities if the collection is not conducted are that HUD would be in violation of the law and could be sued; and the information may be construed to limit the authority of the PHA to evict any tenant or lawful occupant that commits violations of the lease.

7. Explain any special circumstances that would cause an information collection to be conducted in a manner:

- requiring respondents to report information to the agency more than quarterly;
- requiring respondents to prepare a written response to a collection of information in fewer than 30 days after receipt of it;
- requiring respondents to submit more than an original and two copies of any document;
- requiring respondents to retain records other than health, medical, government contract, grant-in-aid, or tax records for more than three years;
- in connection with a statistical survey, that is not designed to produce valid and reliable results than can be generalized to the universe of study;
- requiring the use of a statistical data classification that has not been reviewed and approved by OMB;
- that includes a pledge of confidentiality that is not supported by authority established in statute or regulation, that is not supported by disclosure and data security policies that are consistent with the pledge, or which unnecessarily impedes sharing of data with other agencies for compatible confidential use; or
- requiring respondents to submit proprietary trade secret, or other confidential information unless the agency can demonstrate that it has instituted procedures to protect the information's confidentiality to the extent permitted by law.

Respondents must provide the certification form (or alternate documentation as described on the certification form) by 14 days (or any extension of that date provided by the PHA, owner or management agent) after receiving written request for the certification by the PHA, owner, or management agent. Without this certification (or alternate documentation as described on the certification form), a PHA, owner, or management agent may evict, deny, or terminate assistance to a domestic violence victim, and cannot be assured s/he will receive VAWA protections.

8. HUD published a Notice of Proposed Information Collection for public comments in the Federal Register, Volume 78, Page 78375 on December 26, 2013. The public was given until February 24, 2014, to submit comments on the proposed information collection. HUD received comments from Columbia Housing Authority and National Network to End Domestic Violence. Comments are attached.

9. Explain any decision to provide any payment or gift to respondents, other than reenumeration of contractors or grantees.

No payment or gift will be made to respondents.

10. Describe any assurance of confidentiality provided to respondents and the basis for assurance in statute, regulation or agency policy.

The information provided by the victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking pursuant to the certification form will be retained in confidence and not entered into any shared database nor provided to any related entity except when the disclosure is: requested or consented to by the individual in writing, requiring for use in eviction proceedings, or otherwise required by law.

11. Provide additional justification for any questions of a sensitive nature, such as sexual behavior and attitudes, religious beliefs, and other matters that are commonly considered private. This justification should include the reasons why the agency considers the questions necessary, the specific uses to be made of the information, the explanation to be given to persons from whom the information is requested, and any steps to be taken to obtain their consent.

VAWA 2013 provides that, at the request of a PHA, owner or manager, that an individual may certify, via a HUD-approved certification form that the incident or incidences of abuse are bona fide. VAWA 2013 requires that the form include the name of the perpetrator of the violence only if the name of the perpetrator is safe to provide, and is known to the victim. VAWA also establishes a 14-day deadline (plus any extensions granted by the PHA, owner or management agent) from the date of the request for such certification, to return the form. The Department therefore considers the form and its contents necessary in order for victims of abuse to receive the protections of VAWA. Recognizing that domestic violence is a sensitive topic and that victims of abuse may be reluctant to fill out the certification, the Department has tried to develop a form that clearly and concisely explains the purpose of the form and what information is required. To that end, the form itself has a section that explains its purpose and another section that explains how to use the form, the timeline for submitting the form to the PHA, owner and management agent, and that the protections of VAWA may not apply if the form is not submitted in a timely manner. The form also informs the individual of alternate documentation that may satisfy the certification requirement as well as provides a confidentiality statement.

12. Provide estimates of the hour burden of the collection of information. The statement should:

- indicate the number of respondents, frequency of response, annual hour burden, and an explanation of how the burden was estimated. Unless directed to do so, agencies should not conduct special surveys to obtain information on which to base hour burden estimates. Consultation with a sample (fewer than 10) of potential respondents is desirable. If the hour burden on respondents is expected to vary widely because of differences in activity, size, or complexity, show the range of estimated hour burden, and explain the reasons for the variance. Generally estimates should not include burden hours for customary and usual business practices;

13. Provide an estimate of the total annual cost burden to respondents or recordkeepers resulting from the collection of information (do not include the cost of any hour burden shown in Items 12 and 14).
- The cost estimate should be split into two components: (a) a total capital and start-up cost component (annualized over its expected useful life); and (b) a total operation and maintenance purchase of services component. There are no additional costs to PHAs.

We do not estimate that there will be any additional costs to the Federal government for this information collection.

15. Explain the reasons for any program changes or adjustments reported in Items 13 and 14 of the OMB Form 83-I.

HUD does not anticipate a direct cost to the Federal government as a result of the provision and collection of form HUD-50066 by PHAs to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking. HUD's participation is not required for a PHA to extend VAWA 2013 protections to victims. HUD did make changes to form HUD-50066 to reflect the requirements of VAWA 2013. These changes include: Adding sexual assault to the list of domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking; That the victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking is required to provide the name of the perpetrator only if the name of the perpetrator is safe to provide and is known to the victim; and Expanding upon the acceptable forms of documentation. The changes to HUD-50066 are not anticipated to create additional costs to PHAs as they are already required to provide form HUD-50066 and adhere to the requirements of VAWA 2013.
