Background. This proceeding was instituted in response to a petition filed on November 12, 2014 by Cornerstone Chemical Company, Waggaman, Louisiana. Countervailing and/or antidumping duties may be assessed on the subject imports as a result of these proceedings if the Commission makes an affirmative determination of injury, threat, or material retardation, and if the U.S. Department of Commerce makes an affirmative determination of subsidization and/or dumping. <u>Melamine</u> covered by these investigations is melamine in crystal form. Melamine in crystal form is a fine white crystalline powder typically used to manufacture melamine formaldehyde resins.

The subject merchandise is provided for in subheading 2933.61.00 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States ("HTSUS"). Although the HTSUS subheading is provided for convenience and customs purposes, the written description of the scope is dispositive.

<u>Importer</u>.--Any person or firm engaged, either directly or through a parent company or subsidiary, in importing melamine (as defined above) into the United States from a foreign manufacturer or through its selling agent.
