CBP Form 1304, Crew's Effects Declaration, was developed through an agreement by the United Nations' Intergovernmental Maritime Consultative Organization (IMCO) in conjunction with the United States and various other countries. The form is used as part of the entrance and clearance of vessels pursuant to the provisions of 19 CFR 4.7 and 4.7a, 19 USC 1431, and 19 USC 1434. CBP Form 1304 is completed by the master of the arriving carrier to record and list the crew's effects This form that are onboard the vessel. is accessible http://forms.cbp.gov/pdf/CBP Form 1304.pdf.

CBP Form 1304 is used by CBP to account for crew's effects onboard arriving vessels and to assess duties, if appropriate.

Public Cost

The cost to respondents is estimated at \$10,474,002. This is based on the estimated annual burden hours associated with this collection (206,100) multiplied by (x) the average hourly wage rate (\$50.82).

There are no capitalization or start-up costs associated with this collection.

The estimated annual cost associated with collecting the information is \$9,571,284. There has been no increase or decrease in the estimated annual burden hours previously reported for this information collection and no change to the information being collected.
