Watching out for the people you love is your #1 priority. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration offers easy-to-access tools to help keep them safe. Simply log on to [safercar.gov](https://www.safercar.gov) and sign up to receive an email notification for all safety recalls that may apply to your vehicle, so you can get it fixed before something goes dangerously wrong. Also, when you believe your car has a safety problem or defect — including your brakes, steering, tires or anything else that could impact the safety of your vehicle — log on to [safercar.gov](https://www.safercar.gov) to report it to NHTSA. That way, the agency can alert other drivers and inform manufacturers of possible safety defects that need to be addressed. NHTSA also offers a search tool that lets you enter your Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) to quickly learn if your vehicle has not been repaired as part of a safety recall. Many of these safety tools are available on the SaferCar mobile app, so you have a way to help keep your family safer right at your fingertips.

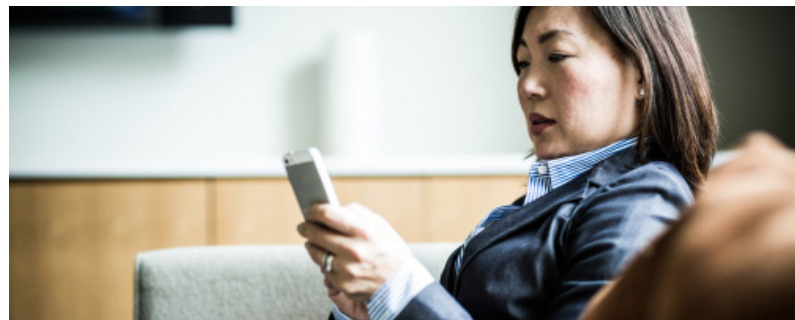

Simply log on to [safercar.gov](https://www.safercar.gov) and report any safety problems you detect with your vehicle — including your brakes, steering, tires or anything else that could impact the safety of your car. This information can help us alert other owners and influence manufacturers to fix potentially dangerous safety problems. You can also sign up for a simple email alert that lets you know when your vehicle has a recall and the appropriate steps to take. NHTSA even offers a search tool that lets you enter your Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) to quickly learn if your vehicle has not been repaired. Many of these safety tools are available on the SaferCar mobile app, so the power to improve auto safety really is in your hands.

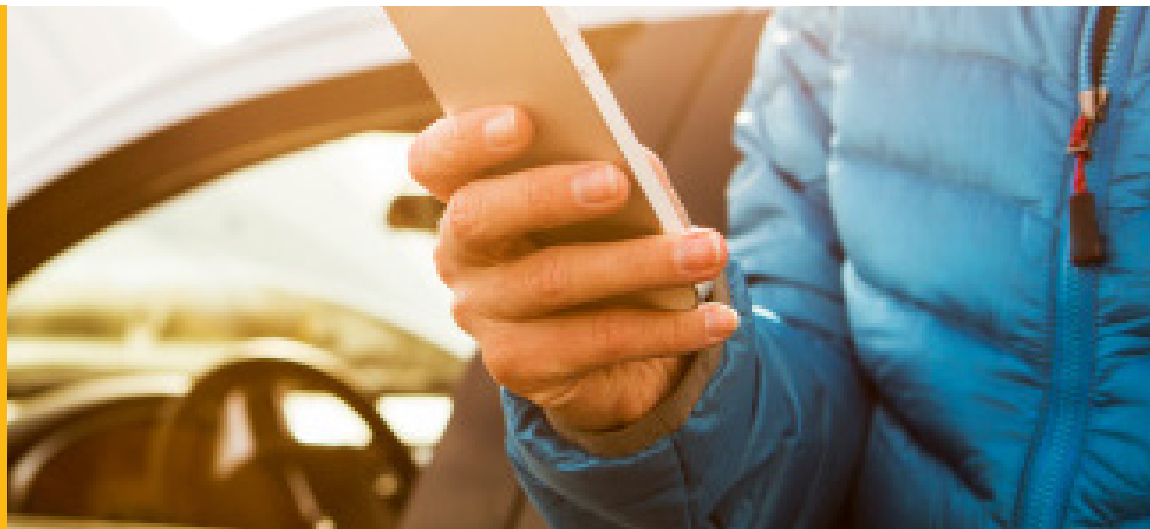

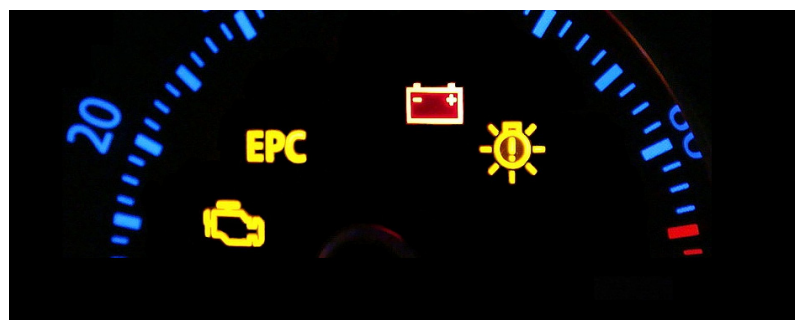

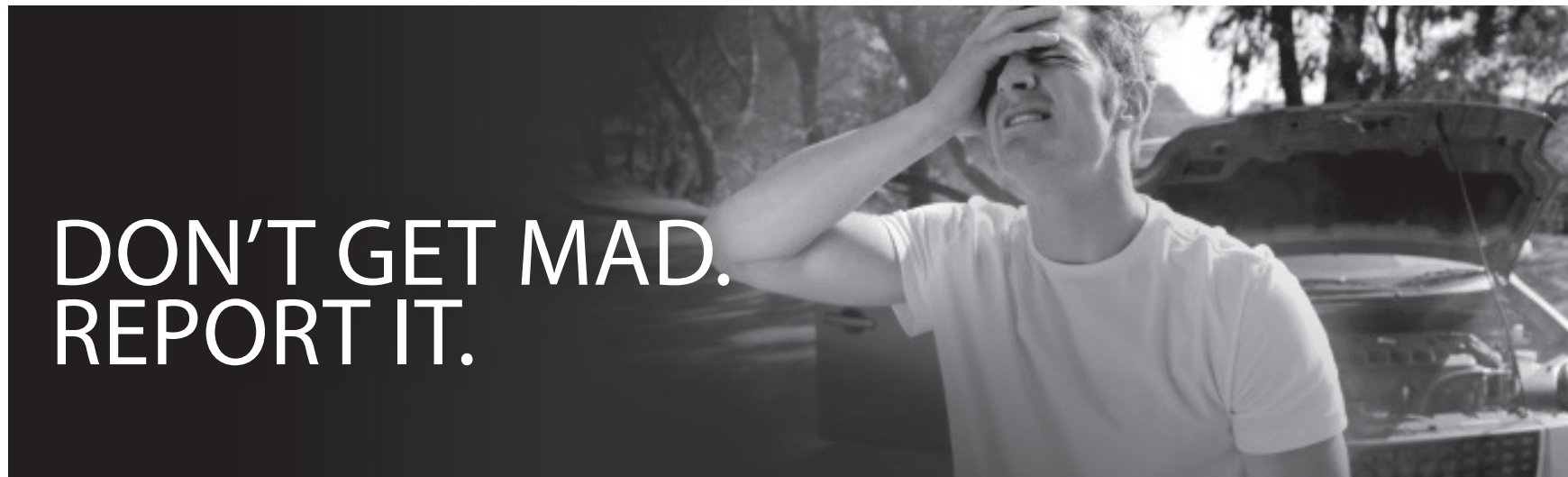
