Antidumping duties may be assessed on the subject imports as a result of this proceeding if the Commission makes an affirmative determination of injury, threat, or material retardation, and if the U.S. Department of Commerce makes an affirmative determination of dumping. <u>1,1,1,2-Tetrafluoroethane ("R-134a")</u>.--The product covered by this investigation is 1,1,1,2-Tetrafluoroethane, R-134a, or its chemical equivalent, regardless of form, type, or purity level. The chemical formula for 1,1,1,2-Tetrafluoroethane is CF_3-CH_2F , and the Chemical Abstracts Service registry number is CAS 811-97-2.

<u>Importer</u>.--Any person or firm engaged, either directly or through a parent company or subsidiary, in importing R-134a (as defined above) into the United States from a foreign manufacturer or through its selling agent.
