| <b>Who must comply?</b>                                       | Owners and operators of commercial vessels.  |
| <b>What is this collection about?</b>                         | This information collection requires the owner or operator of a vessel, within 5 days, to report a marine casualty. Additionally, the owner or operator of a vessel must periodically report chemical drug and alcohol testing of commercial vessel personnel.   |
| <b>Where do I find the requirements for this information?</b> | Title 46 CFR Parts 4 and 16 are available at— <a href="http://www.eCFR.gov">http://www.eCFR.gov</a> . For 46 CFR, select TITLE 46 – SHIPPING, and follow it to Parts 4 and 16.<br><br>For reporting marine casualties, see 46 CFR Part 4.<br><br>For periodic chemical testing, see 46 CFR Part 16.  |
| <b>When must information be submitted to the Coast Guard?</b> | For reporting a marine casualty, within 5 days of the casualty. For chemical drug and alcohol testing of commercial vessel personnel, periodically according to the requirements in 46 CFR Part 16.  |
| <b>How is the information submitted?</b>                      | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For reporting a marine casualty, the information is submitted on form CG-2692 (and CG-2692A and CG-2692B, if necessary) within 5 days of the casualty. Forms are available at <a href="http://homport.uscg.mil">http://homport.uscg.mil</a> Missions &gt; Investigations.</li> <li>• For chemical drug and alcohol testing of commercial vessel personnel, periodically according to the requirements in 46 CFR Part 16.</li> </ul> <p>All the above information may be submitted in writing or electronically via facsimile or e-mail.</p> |
| <b>What happens when complete information is received?</b>    | This information will be reviewed by CG investigators. No specific documentation will be issued by the CG.   |
