Frontcountry Road Noise Visitor Survey - 2018



NOTE: Each respondent will be given seven randomly selected scenarios (each with a different random combination of attributes). 12a-12g represent possible random outputs of scenario choices.



 - (a) Which scenario best describes the experience you would most prefer while in Death Valley National Park?




- Road Noise reduced by 20%

- (b) Which scenario best describes the experience you would most prefer while in Death Valley National Park?




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


- Road Noise reduced by 5%
