A. Justification

Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Public Law 93-288) as amended (42 USC 5121 et seq. DISASTER RELIEF) is intended to provide an orderly and continuing means of assistance by the Federal Government to State and local governments in carrying out their responsibilities to alleviate the suffering and damage which result from such disasters by

- 1. revising and broadening the scope of existing disaster relief programs;
- 2. encouraging the development of comprehensive disaster preparedness and assistance plans, programs, capabilities, and organizations by the States and by local governments;
- 3. achieving greater coordination and responsiveness of disaster preparedness and relief programs;
- 4. encouraging individuals, States, and local governments to protect themselves by obtaining insurance coverage to supplement or replace governmental assistance;
- 5. encouraging hazard mitigation measures to reduce losses from disasters, including development of land use and construction regulations; and
- 6. providing Federal assistance programs for both public and private losses sustained in disasters.

It is the intent of the Congress, by this Act, to provide an orderly and continuing means of assistance by the Federal Government to State and local governments in carrying out their responsibilities to alleviate the suffering and damage which result from such disasters by-- providing Federal assistance programs for both public and private losses sustained in disasters.

2. Indicate how, by whom, and for what purpose the information is to be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection.

This information is used to ensure that owners follow HUD procedures regarding recovery efforts after a Presidentially-declared disaster. These procedures minimize disruption to HUD's normal business requirements by owners and set guidelines for owner/tenant responsibilities under these circumstances.

3. Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g., permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. Also describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden.

This collection does not require the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques. This collection requires ad hoc telephone and email correspondence; information

gathered from owners and tenants, and reported between field office staff and headquarters staff. This collection provides information necessary to determine the extent of damage, if any, caused by a declared disaster providing individual federal assistance.

4. Describe efforts to identify duplication. Show specifically why any similar information already available cannot be used or modified for use for the purposes described in Item 2 above.

There is no duplication of other sources for this information. Each declared disaster is unique, and requires unique responses.

5. If the collection of information impacts small businesses or other small entities (Item 5 of OMB Form 83-I), describe any methods used to minimize burden.

Impact to small businesses is limited to the extent they serve areas defined by Presidentially declared disasters, and become subject to the same requirements as any other entity serving the impacted area. Presidentially declared disasters involving individual assistance are rare, and the scope varies widely according to the geographic area impacted. The impact on tenants and owners is limited to telephone and email correspondence. Further limits are not possible.

6. Describe the consequence to Federal program or policy activities if the collection is not conducted or is conducted less frequently, as well as any technical or legal obstacles to reducing burden.

Without the information gathered through this collection, HUD would face increased risk of improper subsidy assistance payments and would be unable to identify and assist owners and tenants during Presidentially declared disasters.

7. Explain any special circumstances that would cause an information collection to be conducted in a manner:

* requiring respondents to report information to the agency more often than quarterly;

information is collected on an ad hoc basis, only following a Presidentially declared disaster.

* requiring respondents to prepare a written response to a collection of information in fewer than 30 days after receipt of it;

No information is required to be written in response to a collection of information at any time.

* requiring respondents to submit more than an original and two copies of any document;

No information is required to be written in response to a collection of information at any time.

*requiring respondents to retain records, other than health, medical, government contract, grant-in-aid, or tax records, for more than three years;

No records retention is required by HUD in conjunction with this collection, other than normal tenant retention records relative to doing business with HUD.

* in connection with a statistical survey, that is not designed to produce valid and reliable

results that can be generalized to the universe of study;

No information gathered in conjunction with this collection is used in a statistical survey.

* requiring the use of a statistical data classification that has not been reviewed and approved by OMB;

No information gathered in conjunction with this collection is used in a statistical survey.

* that includes a pledge of confidentiality that is not supported by authority established in statute or regulation, that is not supported by disclosure and data security policies that are consistent with the pledge, or which unnecessarily impedes sharing of data with other agencies for compatible confidential use;

No pledge of confidentiality not supported by disclosure and data security policies is required as part of this collection.

Respondents are not required to submit proprietary trade secrets, or other confidential information.

Housing assistance payments to respondents pursuant to the business agreements in place prior to the Presidentially-declared disaster. There are no gifts to respondents.

No assurance of confidentiality, statute, regulation, or agency policy is provided.

15. Explain the reasons for any program changes or adjustments reported in Items 13 or 14 of the OMB Form 83-I.

This is an extension of a currently approved collection. The change in inventory in item 13 of page 1 reflects a change in collection techniques applied to disaster reporting. Preliminary disaster numbers reflect data received from FEMA sources, matched with project counts of properties located in the declared disaster areas. Counts of resident displacement at projects, and counts of damaged projects reflect actual reports received from affected projects within the declaration areas. The burden hours reflect time that may be required for owners impacted by a potential disaster to report damage to HUD. Owners are then directed to EPA for assistance from the state.

The results of this collection of information will not be published.
