30 CFR Part 702 - Exemption for Coal Extraction Incidental to the Extraction
of Other Minerals

OMB Control Number 1029-0089

Terms of Clearance: None

Introduction

This information collection clearance package is being submitted by the Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement (OSMRE) to request permission to continue collecting information for 30 CFR Part 702 of the OSMRE permanent regulatory program. The information collection for 30 CFR Part 702 was previously approved by OMB and was assigned control number 1029-0089.

Sections 702.11, 702.12, 702.13, 702.15, and 702.18 contain information collection requirements.

General Instructions

A completed Supporting Statement A must accompany each request for approval of a collection of information. The Supporting Statement must be prepared in the format described below, and must contain the information specified below. If an item is not applicable, provide a brief explanation. When the question "Does this ICR contain surveys, censuses, or employ statistical methods?" is checked "Yes," then a Supporting Statement B must be completed. OMB reserves the right to require the submission of additional information with respect to any request for approval.

Specific Instructions

Justification

1. *Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary. Identify any legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection.*

This Part implements the requirement in Section 701(28) of the Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act of 1977 (SMCRA), 30 USC 1201, which grants an exemption from the requirements of SMCRA to operators extracting not more than 16 2/3 percentage tonnage of coal incidental to the extraction of other minerals. This information will be used by the State regulatory authorities (SRA's) to make that determination.

2. *Indicate how, by whom, and for what purpose the information is to be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection. Be specific. If this collection is a form or a questionnaire,*

every question needs to be justified.

Section 702.11 requires that operators who believe their mines may qualify for an incidental mining exemption file an application for exemption with the appropriate regulatory authority in order to obtain that benefit.

Section 702.12 describes the information that must be provided in an application for exemption including operator names and addresses, a list of the minerals to be extracted, estimates of production and revenue, the projected fair market values of the coal and other minerals mined. The applicant must include a description and maps of the location of the mining area and a general description of mining and mineral processing activities. Public participation for this regulation is provided for in section 702.12(i). That section requires a newspaper notice be published in the county of the mining area announcing the filing an administratively complete application for exemption with the regulatory authority.

Section 702.13(a) requires that ". . . all information submitted to the regulatory authority under this part shall be made immediately available for public inspection and copying at the local offices of the regulatory authority having jurisdiction over the mining operations claiming exemption." Paragraphs 702.13(b) and (c) of section 702.13 provide protection from public disclosure for confidential information held by the regulatory authorities. Therefore, section 702.13(a) requires the SRA's to make all non-confidential information acquired pursuant to sections 702.11, 702.12 and 702.18 available for public inspection and copying.

Section 702.15(a) requires operators of mining areas exempt pursuant to section 701(28) of SMCRA to maintain "information necessary to verify the exemption including, but not limited to, commercial use and sales information, extraction tonnages, and a copy of the exemption application and exemption approved by the regulatory authority." Paragraph 702.15(b) requires operators of mining areas exempt pursuant to section 701(28) of SMCRA to notify the SRA upon completion of mining or permanent cessation of all coal extraction activities.

Section 702.18 requires the annual reporting of the information needed by the SRA to determine continued eligibility for an incidental mining operation exemption from SMCRA. Each annual report submitted in support of the continuation of an existing exemption must contain the information specified in section 702.18.

3. *Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g., permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. Also describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden and specifically how this collection meets GPEA requirements.*

Requested information is received infrequently by States, usually only a few nationally. Regulatory authorities have indicated that their focus is on electronic receipt of full permit applications and not these exemption applications. Since State regulatory authorities are responsible for the receipt and approval of these applications and not OSMRE, we have no authority over the method of submission of these applications.

4. *Describe efforts to identify duplication. Show specifically why any similar information already available cannot be used or modified for use for the purposes described in Item 2 above.*

This is a unique information collection, there is no duplication. No similar information is collected pertaining to exempt operations by OSMRE, or any other Federal agency.

5. *If the collection of information impacts small businesses or other small entities, describe any methods used to minimize burden.*

Some of the operators filing applications are small businesses. Information required is limited to the minimum detail necessary to verify that exemptions were valid or to determine whether the mining area operation is exempt.

6. *Describe the consequence to Federal program or policy activities if the collection is not conducted or is conducted less frequently, as well as any technical or legal obstacles to reducing burden.*

The application is a one-time information collection, and the annual reports are submitted yearly. Less frequent submissions could prevent SRA's from determining whether the exemptions were being fraudulently maintained.

7. *Explain any special circumstances that would cause an information collection to be conducted in a manner:*
- * requiring respondents to report information to the agency more often than quarterly;*
 - * requiring respondents to prepare a written response to a collection of information in fewer than 30 days after receipt of it;*
 - * requiring respondents to submit more than an original and two copies of any document;*
 - * requiring respondents to retain records, other than health, medical, government contract, grant-in-aid, or tax records, for more than three years;*
 - * in connection with a statistical survey that is not designed to produce valid and reliable results that can be generalized to the universe of study;*
 - * requiring the use of a statistical data classification that has not been reviewed and approved by OMB;*
 - * that includes a pledge of confidentiality that is not supported by authority established in statute or regulation, that is not supported by disclosure and data security policies that are consistent with the pledge, or which unnecessarily impedes sharing of data with other*

agencies for compatible confidential use; or

** requiring respondents to submit proprietary trade secrets, or other confidential information, unless the agency can demonstrate that it has instituted procedures to protect the information's confidentiality to the extent permitted by law.*

Guidelines in 5 CFR 1320.5(d)(2) are not exceeded.

8. *If applicable, provide a copy and identify the date and page number of publication in the Federal Register of the agency's notice, required by 5 CFR 1320.8(d), soliciting comments on the information collection prior to submission to OMB. Summarize public comments received in response to that notice and in response to the PRA statement associated with the collection over the past three years, and describe actions taken by the agency in response to these comments. Consultation with representatives of those from whom information is to be obtained or those who must compile records should occur at least once every three years — even if the collection of information activity is the same as in prior periods. There may be circumstances that may preclude consultation in a specific situation. These circumstances should be explained.

In January 2016, OSMRE staff contacted representatives of three companies who have prepared mining permits which extract coal under the exemption for 30 CFR Part 702:

The above respondents did not identify any concerns regarding the availability of data, frequency of collection, clarity of instructions and record keeping of the information collection requirements. These individuals did provide the burden estimates identified in item 12 for each section.

On February 16, 2016, OSMRE published in the Federal Register (81 FR 7829) a notice requesting comments from the public regarding the need for the collection of information, the accuracy of the burden estimate, ways to enhance the information collection, and ways to minimize the burden on respondents. This notice gave the public 60 days in which to comment. However, no comments were received.

9. *Explain any decision to provide any payment or gift to respondents, other than remuneration of contractors or grantees.*

No payments or gifts were made to respondents.

10. *Describe any assurance of confidentiality provided to respondents and the basis for the assurance in statute, regulation, or agency policy.*

Pursuant to section 702.13(b) and (c), the SRA will keep the information confidential if, at the time of submission, (1) the operator requests in writing that it be kept confidential,

and (2) the information concerns trade secrets, or (3) the information is privileged commercial or financial information of the operator. The information may be available to the public after notice and a hearing is afforded persons both seeking and opposing disclosure of the information. All information submitted without requesting confidentiality will be made available to the public.

11. *Provide additional justification for any questions of a sensitive nature, such as sexual behavior and attitudes, religious beliefs, and other matters that are commonly considered private. This justification should include the reasons why the agency considers the questions necessary, the specific uses to be made of the information, the explanation to be given to persons from whom the information is requested, and any steps to be taken to obtain their consent.*

Sensitive questions are not asked.

b. Estimate of wage cost to respondents:

OSMRE has estimated wage costs for respondents: industry and State regulatory authorities. OSMRE has derived these wages from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) websites at http://www.bls.gov/oes/current/naics4_212100.htm for industry wages and http://www.bls.gov/oes/current/naics4_999200.htm for State employees. Benefits have been calculated using a ratio between wages and benefits using a rate of 1.4 of the salary for industry personnel and 1.5 for State employees per the BLS news release USDL-16-0463 entitled EMPLOYER COSTS FOR EMPLOYEE COMPENSATION—DECEMBER 2015 at - <http://www.bls.gov/news.release/pdf/ecec.pdf>, dated March 10, 2016.

We estimate the following hourly wage cost for industry:

For applicants we estimate wage costs as follows:

Therefore, $\$1,567 \times 3 \text{ responses} = \$4,701$ for all applicants.

For SRA's:

A State engineering technician earning \$34.13 per hour with benefits as discussed above, will process each exemption. Therefore, the estimated total annual wage cost for SRA's for this section is $\$34 \text{ per hour} \times 20 \text{ hours} \times 3 \text{ responses reviewed} = \$2,040$ (rounded).

Therefore, we estimate that the burden to all respondents is $\$4,701$ for industry + $\$2,040$ for State regulatory authorities = $\$6,741$.

Section 702.13 –

Based on discussions with those identified in item 8, it will take a State administrative support employee, at \$28.76 per hour when including benefits, 1 hour to prepare the confidential file. Therefore, \$28.76 per hour x 1 hour X 31 files = \$892.

Section 702.15 –

At \$58.04 per hour for each industry Mining/Geological engineer, the wage cost to prepare a notification of completion of mining is \$58.04, or \$116 (rounded) for both respondents to prepare the notification.

In addition, the SRA's must review the operation for completion. A State engineering technician earning \$34.13 per hour with benefits as discussed above will conduct the review. Therefore, the estimated wage cost for each State regulatory authority for this section is \$34.13 per hour x 2 hours = \$68.26 for each SRA, or \$137 (rounded) for both SRA's.

Therefore, we estimate that the burden to all respondents is \$116 for industry + \$137 for State regulatory authorities = \$253.

Section 702.18 –

For operators we estimate the following wage costs for this section:

Therefore, \$214 x 43 responses = \$9,202 for all operators.

For SRA's, we estimate the following wage costs:

A State engineering technician earning \$34.13 per hour with benefits as discussed above will review each annual report. Therefore, the estimated total annual wage cost for all SRA's for this section is \$34.13 per hour x 1 hour per review x 43 reports = \$1,468(rounded).

Therefore, we estimate that the burden to all respondents is \$9,202 for industry + \$1,468 for State regulatory authorities = \$10,670.

13. *Provide an estimate of the total annual non-hour cost burden to respondents or recordkeepers resulting from the collection of information. (Do not include the cost of any hour burden already reflected in item 12.)*
- * The cost estimate should be split into two components: (a) a total capital and start-up cost component (annualized over its expected useful life) and (b) a total operation and maintenance and purchase of services component. The estimates should take into account costs associated with generating, maintaining, and disclosing or providing the information (including filing fees paid for form processing). Each permit applicant is required to publish a newspaper announcement notifying the public of the applications, and request public comment. At \$200 per announcement, total capital and start-up costs for all 3 respondents is \$600.

14. *Provide estimates of annualized cost to the Federal government. Also, provide a description of the method used to estimate cost, which should include quantification of hours, operational expenses (such as equipment, overhead, printing, and support staff), and any other expense that would not have been incurred without this collection of information.*

OSMRE has calculated a wage rate for an OSMRE Reclamation Specialist/Engineer who would complete the oversight reviews and conduct the Federal program activities for each section using the Office of Personnel Management wage rates for Federal employees located at <https://www.opm.gov/policy-data-oversight/pay-leave/salaries->

Using a salary of a GS 13, step 1 employee, and including benefits at the rate of 1.5 of salary derived from the BLS news release USDL-16-0463, we estimate the hourly OSMRE wage rate to be \$40.46 per hour, or approximately \$60.69 per hour including benefits.

Section 702.11 & 12 –

Oversight: The OSMRE does not anticipate conducting any significant oversight review of compliance with the State program counterparts to the requirements of 30 CFR 702.11 and 702.12 in the absence of any indication of problems. OSMRE assumes that we will conduct an oversight review of this topic in one State program per year and that the review requires an average of 8 hours. At \$60.69 per hour including benefits for the regulatory program specialist/ engineer, the annual cost to the Federal government for this oversight activity is estimated to be \$486 ($\60.69×8 hours).

Federal Programs: OSMRE does not anticipate receiving any exemption applications under Federal programs.

Total estimated cost to the Federal government: \$486 for oversight.

Section 702.13 –

Oversight: OSMRE does not anticipate conducting any significant oversight review of compliance with the State program counterparts to the requirements of 30 CFR 702.13(a) in the absence of any indication of problems. OSMRE assumes that we will conduct an oversight review of this topic in one State program per year and that the review requires approximately 1 hour at \$60.69 per hour including benefits for a regulatory program specialist/ engineer. Therefore, annual cost to the Federal government for this oversight activity is estimated to be \$61.

Federal Programs: OSMRE does not anticipate receiving any exemption applications under Federal programs.

Total estimated cost to the Federal government: \$61 for oversight.

Section 702.15 -

Oversight: OSMRE does not anticipate conducting any significant oversight review of compliance with the State program counterparts to the requirements of 30 CFR 702.15 in the absence of any indication of problems. OSMRE assumes that we will conduct an oversight review of this topic in one State program per year and that the review requires approximately 1 hour at \$60.69 per hour including benefits for a regulatory program specialist/ engineer. Therefore, annual cost to the Federal government for this oversight activity is estimated to be \$61.

Federal Programs: OSMRE has not received a mining exemption for Part 702 in a number of years, nor is there any currently in operation.

Total estimated cost to the Federal government: \$61 for oversight.

Section 702.18 –

Oversight: It will take an average of 1 hour to review each exemption report. OSMRE's oversight role is to review several (4) randomly chosen reports submitted annually to SRA's. This is done to assure OSMRE that the State is fully complying with the Act and the approved regulatory program. At \$60.69 per our including benefits for the regulatory program specialist to review each report it will cost the Federal government \$243(4 reports x 1 hour per report x \$60.69 per hour) for oversight.

Federal Programs: OSMRE has not received a mining exemption for Part 702 in a number of years, nor is there any currently in operation.

Total estimated cost to the Federal government: \$243 for oversight.

Therefore, we estimate that the burden to the Federal government to comply with all information collection sections of Part 702 is \$851 (\$486 + \$61 + \$61 + \$243).

15. *Explain the reasons for any program changes or adjustments in hour or cost burden.*

This information collection request will result in a reduction of 139 burden hours due to a reduction in estimated SRA burden to review an exemption in section 702.12, a modest reduction in the burden to industry to prepare annual reports to continue their exemption in section 702.18, and a reduction in the number of respondents currently mining under the exemption which reduces the number of annual reports submitted to SRAs for the 16 2/3 exemptions.

Therefore, this request adjusts the burden hours as follows:

This request does not change the non-wage cost burden of \$600 for newspaper advertisements.

OSMRE has no plans to publish the information.
