#### Profiles Update

The Alaska Fisheries Science Center is planning to update the Alaskan community profiles to include new U.S. Census data from 2010 and input from the communities and industry. #### Current Profiles

In 2005, the Alaska Fisheries Science Center compiled baseline socioeconomic information about 136 Alaska communities most involved in commercial fisheries. Communities were selected by assessing fishery-involvement indicators including landings, processors, vessel homeports, vessel ownership, crew licenses, and gear operator permits. The profiles compile information from the US Census, Alaska Department of Fish and Game, Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission, National Marine Fisheries Service Restricted Access Management Division, Alaska Department of Community and Economic Development, and various community groups, websites, and archives. Each profile contains information about location, demography, history, current economy, governance, facilities, commercial fisheries, recreational fisheries and subsistence fisheries. Introductory materials cover purpose, methods, and an overview of the profiled communities in the larger context of the state of Alaska and North Pacific fisheries. The profiles were published as NOAA Technical Memorandum NMFS-AFSC-160 in December 2005.
