Justification

CBP Form 3347, *Declaration of Owner*, is a declaration from the owner of imported merchandise stating that he/she agrees to pay additional or increased duties, therefore releasing the importer of record from paying such duties. This form must be filed within 90 days of the date of entry. CBP Form 3347 is provided for by 19 CFR 24.11 and 141.20.

When entry is made in a consignee's name by an agent who has knowledge of the facts and who is authorized under a proper power of attorney by that consignee, a declaration from the consignee on CBP Form 3347A, *Declaration of Consignee When Entry is Made by an Agent*, shall be filed with the entry summary. If this declaration is filed, then no bond to produce a declaration of the consignee is required. CBP Form 3347A is provided for by 19 CFR 141.19(b)(2).

This collection of information is used by CBP to ensure that additional duties are not imposed on the importer.

Without this information, nominal importers of record would be liable for any increased or additional duties, and agents would not be able to make entry and clear their client's merchandise.

Public comments were solicited through two Federal Register notices published on May 9, 2016 (Volume 81, Page 28095) on which no comments were received, and on July 14, 2016 (Volume 81, Page 45514) on which no comments have been received.

There is no offer of a monetary or material value for this information collection.

Public Cost

The estimated cost to the respondents is \$17,151.30. This is based on the estimated burden hours (570) multiplied by (x) the average loaded hourly wage rate for importers (\$30.09). CBP calculated this loaded wage rate by first multiplying the Bureau of Labor Statistics' (BLS) 2015 median hourly wage rate for Cargo and Freight Agents (\$20.13), which CBP assumes best represents the wage for importers, by the ratio of BLS' average 2015 total compensation to wages and salaries for Office and Administrative Support occupations (1.4799), the assumed

occupational group for importers, to account for non-salary employee benefits.^{1,2} CBP then adjusted this figure, which was in 2015 U.S. dollars, to 2016 U.S. dollars by applying a 1.0 percent annual growth rate to the figure, as recommended by the U.S. Department of Transportation's value of travel time guidance.³

13. Provide an estimate of the total annual cost burden to respondents or record-keepers resulting from the collection of information.

There are no record keeping, capital, start-up or maintenance costs associated with this information collection.

14. Provide estimates of annualized cost to the Federal Government. Also provide a description of the method used to estimate cost, which should include quantification of hours, operational expenses (such as equipment overhead, printing, and support staff), and any other expense that would not have been incurred without this collection of information.

The estimated annual cost to the Federal Government associated with this collection is \$62,032.87. This is based on the number of responses that must be reviewed (5700) multiplied by (x) the time burden to review and process each response (.166 hours) = 946.2 hours multiplied by (x) the average hourly loaded rate for other CBP employees (\$65.56)⁴ = \$62,032.87.

15. Explain the reasons for any program changes or adjustments reported in Items 13 or 14 of this Statement.

There has been no increase or decrease in the estimated annual burden hours and there are no changes to Forms 3347 and 3347A.
