FBI UCR DEFINITIONS

<u>Murder and non-negligent manslaughter:</u> The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Rape: Penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury.

<u>Other assaults (simple):</u> Assaults and attempted assaults where no weapon was used or no serious or aggravated injury resulted to the victim. Stalking, intimidation, coercion, and hazing are included.

<u>Burglary:</u> The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft, including attempted forcible entry.

<u>Larceny-theft (except motor vehicle theft):</u> The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

Motor vehicle theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.

<u>**Drug trafficking:**</u> The violation of laws prohibiting the production and distribution, of certain controlled substances.

<u>**Drug possession:**</u> The unlawful cultivation, purchase, use or possession of controlled substances.

<u>Weapons:</u> carrying, possessing, etc.: The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices, or other deadly weapons.
