How is the information submitted?	Information is submitted as detailed in 33 CFR Part 96. A checklist is provided in the PSC guidance noted above.	
What happens after providing all required documentation/information?	Once all required information has been provided and the CG recognized organization has approves it, the vessel will be issued ISM Code–related documents. If the information is incomplete, the vessel owner/operator will be advised of the deficiency.
