SUPPORTING STATEMENT FOR VA FORM 29-4364 & VA FORM 29-0151, APPLICATION FOR SERVICE-DISABLED VETERANS INSURANCE 2900-0068

A. Justification

1. Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary. Identify legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection of information.

These forms are used by veterans to apply for Service Disabled Veterans Insurance, to designate a beneficiary and to select an optional settlement. The information is required by law, 38 USC, Section 1922.

2. Indicate how, by whom, and for what purposes the information is to be used; indicate actual use the agency has made of the information received from current collection.

The data collected on these forms is used by Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to determine the veteran's eligibility for insurance.

3. Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g. permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. Also describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden.

VA Form 29-4364 is available on the One-VA web site in a fillable electronic format and the VA Insurance website. VBA is currently hosting this form on a secure server and does not currently have the technology in place to allow for the complete submission of the form. VA Form 29-0151 is released to the veteran when he/she is first notified of their disability rating. This form is not available to the general public. Validation edits are performed to assure data integrity. Efforts within VA are underway to provide a mechanism to allow the information to be submitted electronically with a recognized signature technology. There currently is no utility process in place that will allow the data submitted on the forms to be incorporated with an existing centralized legacy database.

4. Describe efforts to identify duplication. Show specifically why all similar information already available cannot be used or modified for use for the purposes described in Item 2 above.

The information is not contained in any other VA records. Similar information is not available elsewhere.

5. If the collection of information impacts small businesses or other small entities, describe any methods used to minimize burden.

The information does not involve any small businesses.

6. Describe the consequences to Federal program or policy activities if the collection is not conducted or is conducted less frequently as well as any technical or legal obstacles to reducing burden.

These forms are designed for use by the insured to apply for Service Disabled Veterans Insurance, to designate a beneficiary and to select an optional settlement.

The information collected is supplied by the respondent. No remuneration is made.

10. Describe any assurance of confidentiality provided to respondents and the basis for the assurance in statue, regulation, or agency policy.

The information collection conforms with the Privacy Act of 1974 and is subject to the conditions of disclosure contained therein. The records are maintained in the system identified as 36VA29, "Veterans of Uniformed Services Personnel Programs of U.S. Government" as contained in the Privacy Act Issuances, 1993 Compilation.

11. Provide additional justification for any questions of a sensitive nature, such as sexual behavior and attitudes, religious beliefs, and other matters that are commonly considered private; include specific uses to be made of the information, the explanation to be given to persons from whom the information is requested, and any steps to be taken to obtain their consent.

There are no questions of a sensitive nature.

12. Estimate of the hour burden of the collection of information:

Estimate of Information Collection Burden

a. Number of Respondents: 25,000

b. Frequency of Response: Oncec. Annual Burden Hours: 8,333

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d. Estimated Completion Time: 20 minutes

e. The respondent population for VA Forms 29-4364 and 29-0151, is composed of individuals gathering the necessary information needed to apply for Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance. VA cannot make further assumptions about the population of respondents because of the variability of factors such as the educational background and wage potential of respondents. Therefore, VBA used general wage data to estimate the respondents' costs associated with completing the information collection.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) gathers information on full-time wage and salary workers. According to the latest available BLS data, the median weekly earnings of full-time wage and salary workers are \$954.40. Assuming a forty (40) hour work week, the mean hourly wage is \$23.86 based on the BLS wage code – "00-0000 All Occupations." This information was taken from the following website: (http://www.bls.gov/oes/current/oes_nat.htm#00-0000, May 2016).

Legally, respondents may not pay a person or business for assistance in completing the information collection. Therefore, there are no expected overhead costs for completing the information collection. VBA estimates the total cost to all respondents to be \$198,825.38 (8,333 burden hours x \$23.86 per hour).

13. Provide an estimate of the total annual cost burden to respondents or record keepers resulting from the collection of information.

This submission does not involve any record keeping costs.

The transition has been completed and the PRA duties have been reassigned in order to avoid future insurance icr's from expiring.
