Request: The U.S. Census Bureau plans to conduct additional research under the American Community Survey (ACS) Methods Panel Tests clearance to test the potential impact of the inclusion of the citizenship question on the 2020 Census to better plan for the Nonresponse Followup (NRFU) operation. The Census Bureau proposes to conduct a national self-response test with a separate sample from the ACS production panel mid-June to mid-August 2019. No additional burden is expected.

Background: The Census Bureau has limited empirical evidence about the potential impact of including the citizenship question on self-response rates for the 2020 Census. The results of this test will inform the Integrated Partnership and Communications Campaign and the planning for the Nonresponse Followup (NRFU) operation, the operation designed to collect a response in-person from addresses that do not self-respond.

Time line: The test will have a Census Day of July 1, 2019. The first mailing will go out mid-June 2019. The data collection period will be nine weeks. Data collection will end mid-August. The test will utilize the 2020 Census mail strategy, including Internet First and Internet Choice strategies, and the use of English-only and English/Spanish bilingual materials.

Method: For the 2019 Census Test, the Census Bureau will compare two treatments using a randomized controlled experiment. The control treatment questionnaire will ask the planned 2020 Census questions (i.e., number of people, tenure, sex, age, date of birth, Hispanic origin, race, citizenship, relationship to householder, and coverage questions). The experimental treatment questionnaire will ask these same questions minus the citizenship question.

Analysis Metrics: The Census Bureau will assess the effect of the inclusion of the citizenship question in the 2020 Census by comparing the control and experimental treatments through various measures, including self-response rates, form completeness rates, item nonresponse rates, and comparison of response distributions. These measures will be compared overall and on subgroup levels, where possible.

Sample: The test will employ a sample size of 480,000 addresses that will be divided evenly between the control and the experimental treatments. This sample size is designed to detect a difference of 0.5 percentage points between the self-response rates of the control and experimental treatments at the national level. The sample, which will be separate from the ACS production sample, will oversample areas with high proportions of noncitizens and low self-response. The sample construction will also allow for limited analysis for race and Hispanic origin subpopulations.

Use of Incentives: None.

Burden: There is no change in burden to the public associated with this test. The test is being conducted using a separate sample from the ACS production sample. The burden to the public will fall within the burden hours estimated in the request submitted by the Census Bureau to the Office of Management and Budget for authorization to conduct the ACS Methods Panel tests.

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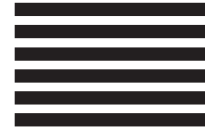

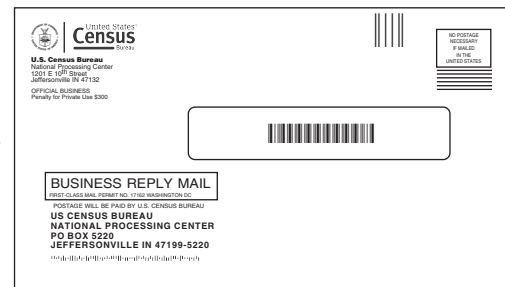

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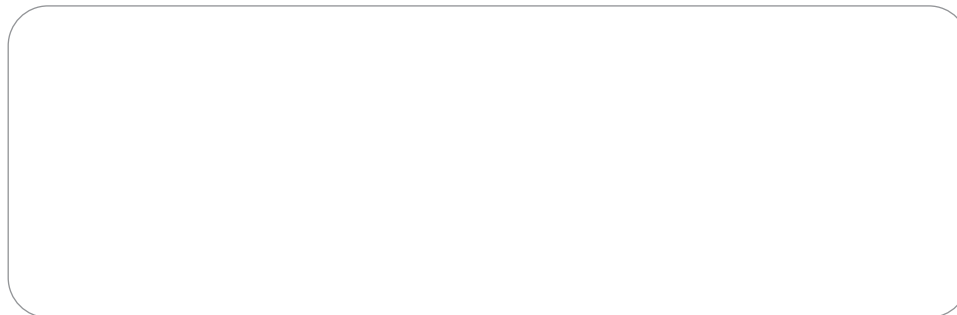

Needs and Uses: The U.S. Census Bureau requests authorization from the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) for the American Community Survey (ACS) Methods Panel 2019 Census Test. The purpose of this proposed test is to gather direct, quantitative information on the potential impact of the inclusion of the citizenship question on self-response in the 2020 Census to fine-tune the planning for the 2020 Census Nonresponse Follow-up (NRFU) operation, which is designed to collect responses from addresses that did not self-respond. The potential impact on self-response is of particular interest since it is the primary and most cost-effective mode of data collection in the decennial census. The Census Bureau lacks definitive, empirical evidence on the impact of the inclusion of the citizenship question on self-response in the 2020 Census. The information obtained from this test may also inform the Integrated Partnership and Communications Campaign, which is the outreach campaign to maximize self-response to the 2020 Census.

The 2019 Census Test will use the ACS Methods Panel to conduct the test. This will allow the Census Bureau to continue devoting its full complement of staff resources to 2020 Census operations.

The ACS Methods Panel is a research program designed to address and respond to emerging issues and needs of the Census Bureau’s Decennial Census Programs, including the 2020 Census and ACS. Every year, the Census Bureau contacts over 3.5 million sampled addresses across the country to participate in the ACS and hundreds of millions each decade for the decennial census. The complexity of both of these programs requires that the Census Bureau continue research, testing, and evaluations aimed at reducing respondent burden, improving data quality, achieving survey cost efficiencies, and improving questionnaire content and related data collection materials.

For the 2019 Census Test, the Census Bureau will compare two treatments using a randomized controlled experiment. The control treatment questionnaire will ask 2020 Census questions (*i.e.*, number of people, tenure, sex, age, date of birth, Hispanic origin, race, citizenship, relationship to householder, and coverage questions). The experimental treatment questionnaire will ask these same questions minus the citizenship question.

The test will employ a sample size of 480,000 addresses that will be divided evenly between the control and the experimental treatments. This sample size is designed to detect a difference of 0.5 percentage points between the self-response rates of the control and experimental treatments at the national level. The sample, which will be separate from the ACS production sample, will oversample areas with high proportions of non-citizens and historically low self-response rates. The sample construction will allow for limited analysis by race and Hispanic origin.

The test will have a Census Day (reference date) of July 1, 2019. The first mailing will go out mid-June 2019. The data collection period will be nine weeks. Data collection will end mid-August 2019. The test will utilize the 2020 Census mail strategy, including internet First and internet Choice contact strategies, and the use of English-only and English/Spanish bilingual materials. With the internet First contact strategy, the initial mailing only provides instructions for responding online. The initial mailing for the internet Choice contact strategy also includes a paper questionnaire. For each contact strategy, a subset of the areas will receive bilingual materials (English/Spanish).

The 2019 Census Test will be of the household population and will include

areas designated to be self-response areas in the 2020 Census, specifically excluding Puerto Rico and the population living in group quarters. The test will be conducted using self-response only. The Census Bureau will also provide telephone questionnaire assistance (TQA). Respondents will be able to call TQA with questions about the survey and may also complete their survey over the phone. TQA can support 10 of the 12 non-English languages supported in the 2020 Census: Spanish, Chinese (Mandarin and Cantonese), Vietnamese, Korean, Russian, Arabic, Tagalog, French, Haitian Creole, and Portuguese. The exceptions are Japanese and Polish.

Preliminary results that can be used to adjust NRFU hiring and refine messaging for the Integrated Partnership and Communications Campaign will be available on a rolling basis. Self-response rates will be available by the end of August 2019, and preliminary results will be available in early October 2019. Final results are expected by spring 2020.

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1 INTRODUCTION

In December 2017, the Department of Justice (DOJ) made a request to reinstate the citizenship question on the 2020 Census. As a result of the request, the 2020 Census may ask respondents to answer a question regarding their citizenship status.

During the Department of Commerce’s review of the DOJ request, the Census Bureau studied the quality of citizenship data by comparing self-reported responses from several surveys with administrative records on citizenship from the Social Security Administration. The results of the study suggested that “adding a citizenship question to the 2020 Census would lead to lower self-response rates in households potentially containing non-citizens...” compared to households with all citizens (Brown, Heggeness, Dorinski, Lawrence, & Yi, 2018). However, the authors noted that the analysis conducted was not the ideal method for studying the self-response effect of including a citizenship question on the 2020 Census. They recommended a randomized control trial to compare response rates on a questionnaire without a citizenship question to one with the citizenship question. In response to the recommendation, the U.S. Census Bureau will conduct the 2019 Census Test, a nationwide, randomized field experiment designed to study the potential impact on self-response of including a citizenship question on the census questionnaire.

Understanding the effect of the citizenship question on self-response rates is important for 2020 Census cost purposes and planning. A lower self-response rate prior to the start of Nonresponse Followup (NRFU) results in a larger workload. These in-person and telephone contacts during NRFU with respondents are much more expensive than self-response.

The 2019 Census Test will measure the operational effect of including a citizenship question on a census questionnaire. The results of this test will help plan for the NRFU operation in 2020 and inform the Integrated Partnership and Communications Campaign, should the citizenship question appear on the 2020 Census form.

2 BACKGROUND

2.1 Citizenship Question

A question on citizenship has been asked in previous censuses including in 1820, 1830, 1870, and 1890 to 1950 (U.S. Census Bureau, 2018b). However, from 1960 to 2000, only the sample of households (one-in-six for the 2000 Census) that were selected to complete the decennial long-form were asked this question. Households receiving the decennial short-form were not asked this question. The American Community Survey, which replaced the decennial long-form questionnaire, has included the citizenship question since its inception in 2005.¹ As such, the citizenship question was not asked as part of the 2010 Census.

¹ The American Community Survey selects a sample of about 3.5 million housing unit addresses each year (about 288,000 each month).

Figure 1 shows the citizenship question that will be used for the 2019 Census Test and is being proposed for the 2020 Census. If it appears on the 2020 Census, it will be the first time that the citizenship question will be asked of everyone in a decennial census since the 1950 Census. If implemented, the proposed 2020 Census citizenship question would be asked of each person rostered on the form.² It would be the last question asked after collecting a person's name, relationship to first person rostered, sex, age, date of birth, Hispanic origin, and race. See Appendix A for images of the questionnaires.

8. Is this person a citizen of the United States?

- Yes, born in the United States
- Yes, born in Puerto Rico, Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, or Northern Marianas
- Yes, born abroad of U.S. citizen parent or parents
- Yes, U.S. citizen by naturalization – *Print year of naturalization.*
- No, not a U.S. citizen

For the 2019 Census Test, about half of the respondents will receive a questionnaire containing the citizenship question and the other half of the respondents will receive a questionnaire without the citizenship question. See Section 3 for more details.

2.2 Self-Response Strategy

To encourage self-response during the 2020 Census, the Census Bureau will use one of two mail contact strategies: Internet First or Internet Choice. These same contact strategies will be used for the 2019 Census Test.

Because response by internet is more cost effective than response by paper questionnaire, a majority of the housing units in self-response mailout areas will receive up to five mailings using the Internet First contact strategy.³ With the Internet First strategy, the initial mailings provide the options to respond online or to call to respond over the phone. For some areas of the country, such

² The internet and Telephone Questionnaire Assistance (TQA) instruments roster up to 99 people for each household and asks the question for all people rostered. The paper questionnaire rosters up to ten people, but only asks the citizenship question for the first six people rostered.

³ For the purpose of the decennial census, geographic areas in the United States are assigned to one specific Type of Enumeration Area (TEA). The TEA assignment is based on address types and other characteristics of the area, including an assessment of the likelihood of residents to self-respond and the accessibility of the area. The TEA assignment determines the methodology used for frame creation and enumeration of people in the area. A majority of the country is enumerated using self-response mailout methods.

as areas with low internet access or areas that are historically less likely to self-respond, this strategy is not ideal. Instead, an Internet Choice contact strategy will be used for those areas. With the Internet Choice contact strategy, the initial mailings include online, telephone, and paper questionnaire response options. About 20 percent of housing units in self-response mailout areas will receive up to five mailings using the Internet Choice contact strategy. All nonresponding housing units will receive a paper questionnaire in the fourth mailing regardless of the initial contact strategy. Sections 2.2.1 and 2.2.2 provide more details about these two contact strategies.

For each contact strategy, a subset of areas will receive bilingual (English and Spanish) materials.⁴ As was done for the 2010 Census, tracts in which at least 20 percent of the occupied housing units have at least one adult in the household who speaks Spanish and does not speak English “very well” will be identified as bilingual (Bentley, 2008). All housing units in these tracts will receive bilingual materials. Overall, about 10 percent of housing units in the country will receive bilingual materials in the 2020 Census.

2.2.1 Internet First Contact Strategy

The Internet First contact strategy emphasizes online response as the primary self-response option. This strategy includes up to five mailings. The first mailing invites respondents to complete the census online. The subsequent mailings include a reminder letter, a reminder postcard, a paper questionnaire package, and a final reminder postcard. All households in this contact strategy will receive the first two mailings.

Subsequent contact with a household is dependent upon if and when the Census Bureau receives a response from the household. New mailing universes, where addresses of respondents from the previous mailing are removed, will be created after the second, third, and fourth mailings.

The Census Bureau will provide a telephone number in all mailings that respondents may use to complete the questionnaire over the telephone or to ask questions. During the 2020 Census, the mailings in this contact strategy will be delivered in four cohorts to more evenly distribute expected workloads for the Census Questionnaire Assistance operation and the processing systems. This staggered mail delivery approach will not be employed in the 2019 Census Test, since the lower volume of responses are not expected to overload the telephone workload and processing systems.

2.2.1.1 First and Second Mailings (Initial Mailing Universe)

The first mailing, or the initial mailing, will be sent to all mailable housing unit addresses in the self-response mailout areas identified for the Internet First contact strategy.⁵ This mailing includes an

⁴ Throughout this report the term “bilingual” will refer to materials that contain both English and Spanish wording.

invitation to respond online and states that a paper questionnaire will be sent in a few weeks to those who are not able to respond online. The initial mailing will also include a language assistance sheet, which gives telephone numbers for help completing the questionnaire in non-English languages. A Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) insert is also included in areas that receive the bilingual materials. These same FAQs are provided on the back of the English letters in non-bilingual areas.

About four days after receiving the first mailing, these same addresses receive the second mailing, which is a reminder letter to respond online, via phone, or wait for a paper questionnaire.

2.2.1.2 Third Mailing (Second Mailing Universe)

About 10 days after receiving the second mailing, the nonresponding addresses will receive the third mailing, which is a reminder postcard that reiterates the instructions for responding online.⁶ The recipients are also reminded that they have the option of responding by a paper questionnaire, which will be mailed to them in the next mailing.

2.2.1.3 Fourth Mailing (Third Mailing Universe)

About two weeks after receiving the third mailing, the nonresponding addresses will receive the fourth mailing, a paper questionnaire package. This mailing includes a paper questionnaire, a letter, a language assistance sheet, and a business reply envelope. The enclosed letter informs respondents that they can respond by paper questionnaire or online. The paper questionnaire package for bilingual areas will also include an FAQ insert. These same FAQs are provided on the back of the English letters in non-bilingual areas.

2.2.1.4 Fifth Mailing (Fourth Mailing Universe)

About two weeks after receiving the fourth mailing, the nonresponding addresses will receive the fifth mailing, a final reminder postcard. Between one to two weeks later, depending on the mailout group, responding addresses are removed to create the initial universe of addresses eligible for the NRFU operation.⁷

2.2.2 Internet Choice Contact Strategy

The Internet Choice contact strategy will be used in areas with low internet connectivity or areas with characteristics that make it less likely the recipients will complete the census questionnaire online.⁸ In Internet Choice areas, a paper questionnaire is provided in the first mailing in addition to instructions for responding online. This mailing and subsequent mailings will also provide a telephone number that the respondent may call to ask questions or complete the questionnaire over the phone.

Like the Internet First contact strategy, after the second mailing, subsequent contact with a household is dependent upon if and when the Census Bureau receives a response from the household. New mailing universes, where respondents from the previous mailing are removed, will be created after the second, third, and fourth mailings.

2.2.2.1 First and Second Mailings (Initial Mailing Universe)

The first mailing, the initial paper questionnaire package, is sent to all mailable housing unit addresses in the self-response mailout areas identified for the Internet Choice contact strategy. The mailing includes an invitation letter, a paper questionnaire, a business reply envelope, and a language assistance sheet. The invitation letter instructs respondents to respond online or mail back the paper questionnaire. The language assistance sheet provides telephone numbers for help completing the questionnaire in non-English languages. Bilingual areas also receive a FAQ insert. These same FAQs are provided on the back of the English letters in non-bilingual areas.

About four days after receiving the first mailing, these same addresses receive the second mailing, a reminder letter, which repeats the instructions to either respond online, send back the paper questionnaire, or call the telephone questionnaire assistance line to obtain answers to any questions.

2.2.2.2 Third Mailing (Second Mailing Universe)

About 10 days after receiving the second mailing, the nonresponding addresses will receive the third mailing, a reminder postcard, which repeats the instruction to respond online or mail back the paper questionnaire.

2.2.2.3 Fourth Mailing (Third Mailing Universe)

About two weeks after receiving the third mailing, the nonresponding addresses will receive the fourth mailing, a replacement paper questionnaire package that includes a letter, a paper questionnaire, a business reply envelope, and a language assistance sheet. Bilingual areas also

receive a FAQ insert. These same FAQs are provided on the back of the English letters in non-bilingual areas.

2.2.2.4 Fifth Mailing (Fourth Mailing Universe)

About 10 days after receiving the fourth mailing, the remaining nonresponding addresses receive a final reminder postcard. About two weeks later, responding addresses are removed to create the initial universe of addresses eligible for the NRFU operation.⁹

See Appendix C for the Internet Choice mail materials.

3 RESEARCH QUESTIONS AND METHODOLOGY

3.1 Sample Design

For the 2019 Census Test, we will compare two treatments via a randomized controlled experiment. Half of the sample will receive the control treatment questionnaire, which will include the citizenship question. The other half of the sample will receive the experimental treatment questionnaire, which will not include the citizenship question.

The sample size for this test is approximately 480,000 mailable housing unit addresses. This sample size is designed to detect a difference of approximately 0.5 percentage points between the overall self-response rates of the experimental and control treatments at the national level (80 percent power and $\alpha=0.1$). Each treatment will be assigned approximately 240,000 addresses. The sample will allow for additional analysis of subgroups (see Section 3.3 for more information about subgroups).¹⁰

The sample will be geographically stratified into three strata (high, medium, and low) for the purpose of oversampling areas with high proportions of non-citizens and low self-response. The strata were defined by the percent of non-citizens and low response scores (LRS), a response propensity measure, at the census tract level. The “High Stratum” is comprised of all tracts where the percent of non-citizens is greater than 11.1 percent. The “Medium Stratum” is comprised of all tracts where the percent of non-citizens is between 7.22 and 11.1 percent or an LRS score greater than 24.0 and not covered in the “High Stratum.”¹¹ All remaining tracts were assigned to the “Low Stratum” group. The cut-offs were chosen so that the percent of occupied housing units in each

stratum were such that the Low stratum has more than the Medium stratum, which has more than the High stratum. This resulted in the following allocation:

- The “High Stratum” accounts for 19.6% of the occupied housing units.
- The “Medium Stratum” accounts for 27.9% of the occupied housing units.
- The “Low Stratum” accounts for 52.5% of the occupied housing units.

Within each stratum, the housing unit addresses are sorted geographically and then systematically sampled. Sampled housing unit addresses will be assigned to one of the treatments, alternating the assignment between the control and the experimental treatment as selections are made. For more details on the stratification, see (Poehler, 2019).

Table 1 provides the sample size for each stratum by treatment. Table 2 provides the expected sample size by contact strategy and language of the materials.

3.2 2019 Census Test Operational Plan

The 2019 Census Test will be conducted using a July 1, 2019 Census Day. Nonresponse Followup will not be conducted for this test. Data collection will begin on June 13, 2019 and will end on August 15, 2019 following the mailing schedule outlined in Table 3. This mailing schedule follows the general plan for the 2020 Census mailings, but is adjusted to accommodate the July 4th holiday and the National Processing Center (NPC) work schedule. Following the strategy planned for the 2020 Census, sampled addresses in areas designated to receive Internet Choice mailing materials will receive mailings following that approach. Sampled addresses in areas designated to receive Internet

First mailing materials will receive mailings following that approach. This test will not stagger Internet First mailings as will be done for the 2020 Census. During the 2020 Census, the mailings in this contact strategy will be delivered in four cohorts to more evenly distribute expected workloads for the Census Questionnaire Assistance operation and the processing systems. This staggered mail delivery approach will not be employed in the 2019 Census Test because the volume of the mailings and workload for Telephone Questionnaire Assistance (TQA) is not a concern.¹²

Self-response will be accepted via internet, paper questionnaire, or Telephone Questionnaire Assistance (TQA). The internet instrument will be available in English and Spanish; the test will also use English and bilingual mail materials.¹³ In addition to English, TQA will support 10 non-English languages: Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, Russian, Arabic, Tagalog, French, Haitian Creole, and Portuguese.¹⁴ TQA will utilize the same internet instrument for data collection that respondents will use. TQA interviewers will be trained to utilize the self-response instrument for an interviewer-administered interview.

The internet instrument for the 2019 Census Test has some differences from the planned 2020 internet instrument, as noted below:

- When responding online, respondents will be asked to enter a “Census ID” found in the mail materials sent to them. Without this ID, they will not be able to respond online. In the 2020 Census, a “non-ID” response option will be available that allows respondents to complete the Census without an ID. This “non-ID” option will not be available for this test.
- An automated check for consistency in responses to the sex and relationship questions will not be included.
- Users who start to respond but do not finish will be able to log back in and continue responding from where they left off. The 2020 Census instrument requires respondents to start over if they do not finish.

This section has highlighted some of the differences between the 2019 Census Test and the plans for the 2020 Census, which may result in some limitations to extending the conclusions drawn from this analysis to the 2020 Census (see Section 4.2 for limitations). However, these limitations would impact both treatments the same and therefore any differences observed between the treatments can be concluded to be the result of the experiment. Another noteworthy distinction between this test and the 2020 Census is that, although this test is being conducted to inform the 2020 Census program, it is being implemented using the infrastructure and resources of the American Community Survey program.

3.3 Research Questions

The 2019 Census Test will answer the following research questions (RQ). Details about how the metrics are defined can be found in Sections 3.4 and 3.5.

RQ1. What is the impact on unit self-response rates between treatments?

RQ2. What is the impact on unit self-response rates between treatments for subgroups of interest? Self-response rate comparisons will be conducted between the control and experimental treatments within the following subgroups:

- a. Over time, at various points in time of data collection
- b. Self-response mode
- c. Contact and language strategy areas (Internet First/Internet Choice by English/bilingual)
- d. Areas with high, medium, and low proportions of non-citizens
- e. Areas with high and low self-response
- f. Areas with high, medium, and low proportions of foreign-born populations
- g. Areas with high, medium, and low proportions of Hispanics
- h. Regional census center
- i. Urban areas and rural areas

RQ3. How do selected demographic characteristics compare between treatments for the responses received?

- a. Relationship
- b. Sex
- c. Age groups
- d. Hispanic origin
- e. Race
- f. Tenure
- g. Average household size

RQ4. What is the impact on item nonresponse between the treatments?

RQ5. What is the impact on form completeness between the treatments?

RQ6. How do breakoff rates between treatments compare for internet returns?

RQ7. For the Control treatment, what is the item nonresponse rate for the citizenship question?

3.4 Unit Response Analysis

All unit self-response rates computed for this report will be weighted. The weight is the inverse of the probability of selection. A significance level of $\alpha=0.1$ will be used when determining significant differences between treatments. Unless otherwise specified, comparisons will be made using a two-sided t-test. For analyses that involve multiple comparisons, the Type I familywise error rate will be adjusted using the Hochberg method to further ensure the validity of the statistical inferences based on simultaneous comparisons (Hochberg, 1988).

3.4.1 Overall Self-Response Rates (RQ1)

To evaluate the impact of the experiment on self-response (SR) between the treatments, self-response rates will be calculated.¹⁵

This will test the following hypotheses: $H_0: SR_{Control} = SR_{Experiment}$; $H_A: SR_{Control} \neq SR_{Experiment}$

The self-response rates will be calculated for each treatment, using the following formula:

$$\text{Self-Response Rate} = \frac{\text{Unduplicated, sufficient internet, mail, and TQA responses}^{16}}{\text{Mailout Universe}}$$

If more than one sufficient response from an address is received, only the first sufficient response received will be used in the calculations of self-response rates. See (U.S. Census Bureau, 2016a) for the definition of a sufficient response.¹⁷

The denominator (i.e., the mailout universe) is comprised of sampled addresses. The definitions of unduplicated, sufficient returns and the mailout universe will be used for all self-response rate calculations.

3.4.2 Self-Response Rates Over Time (RQ2a)

Changes to self-response impact each subsequent phase of the mailing process. An increase in self-response decreases the number of subsequent mailing pieces that need to be sent out, reducing costs. A decrease in self-response increases the mailing costs. A significant increase in self-response before the start of the NRFU operation decreases the number of NRFU interviews required (which is more costly than self-response). Likewise, a significant decrease in self-response increases the NRFU workload and associated costs. To understand any potential impacts, cumulative self-response rates will be calculated at selected points in time in the data collection cycle and compared between treatments.

The selected points in time reflect the dates of additional mailings or key dates related to the timing of NRFU for the 2020 Census:

1. All returns received through close of business on 6/20, when the mail file will be created for the 3rd mailing¹⁸
2. All returns received through close of business on 7/2, when the mail file will be created for the 4th mailing
3. All returns received through close of business on 7/15, when the mail file will be created for the 5th mailing
4. All returns received through close of business on 8/13, when a hypothetical NRFU universe would be created (mirroring the 2020 Census process)
5. All returns received through closeout on 8/15, when a hypothetical NRFU operation would start (mirroring the 2020 Census process)

This will test the following hypotheses, where the date is as specified above.

H₀: SR through Date_{Control} = SR through Date_{Experiment}

H_A: SR through Date_{Control} ≠ SR through Date_{Experiment}

3.4.3 Self-Response Rates by Mode (RQ2b)

Self-response will be compared between treatments within each mode of response: internet and mail. The expected small number of returns obtained from TQA will be classified as internet returns for the calculations since they will be collected using the internet instrument. This will test the following hypotheses:

H₀: Internet SR_{Control} = Internet SR_{Experiment}; H_A: Internet SR_{Control} ≠ Internet SR_{Experiment}

H₀: Mail SR_{Control} = Mail SR_{Experiment}; H_A: Mail SR_{Control} ≠ Mail SR_{Experiment}

The denominator for these calculations will be the mailout universe.

3.4.4 Self-Response Rates by Contact and Language Strategy Areas (RQ2c)

To assess the effect of the experimental changes on self-response for each contact strategy, self-response rates will be compared between treatments for each contact strategy, Internet First and Internet Choice as defined in Sections 2.1 and 2.2, respectively.¹⁹ The following hypotheses will be tested:

H₀: Internet First English SR_{Control} = Internet First English SR_{Experiment}

H_A: Internet First English SR_{Control} ≠ Internet First English SR_{Experiment}

H₀: Internet First Bilingual SR_{Control} = Internet First Bilingual SR_{Experiment}

H_A: Internet First Bilingual SR_{Control} ≠ Internet First Bilingual SR_{Experiment}

H₀: Internet Choice English SR_{Control} = Internet Choice English SR_{Experiment}

H_A: Internet Choice English SR_{Control} ≠ Internet Choice English SR_{Experiment}

H₀: Internet Choice Bilingual SR_{Control} = Internet Choice Bilingual SR_{Experiment}

H_A: Internet Choice Bilingual SR_{Control} ≠ Internet Choice Bilingual SR_{Experiment}

The denominator for these calculations will be the mailout universe for the contact strategy.

3.4.5 Self-Response Rates in Areas with Different Non-Citizen Rates (RQ2d)

To assess the effect of the experimental changes on self-response for areas that have different proportions of non-citizens, self-response rates will be compared between treatments. First, tracts will be classified as high, medium, or low in terms of the percent of non-citizens in a tract:²⁰

- High: tracts where the percent of non-citizens is 11.1 or higher
- Medium: tracts where the percent of non-citizens is higher than 4.87 and less than or equal to 11.1
- Low: tracts where the percent of non-citizens is less than or equal to 4.87 or if the percent of non-citizens is unknown

All sampled housing units within the tract will then be classified as being in an area with a high percent of non-citizens, medium percent of non-citizens, or low or unknown percent of non-citizens. The denominator for these calculations will be the mailout universe within that area.

This will test the following hypotheses:

H₀: SR in High % Non-Cit. Areas_{Control} = SR in High % Non-Cit. Areas_{Experiment}

H_A: SR in High % Non-Cit. Areas_{Control} ≠ SR in High % Non-Cit. Areas_{Experiment}

H₀: SR in Medium % Non-Cit. Areas_{Control} = SR in Medium % Non-Cit. Areas_{Experiment}

H_A: SR in Medium % Non-Cit. Areas_{Control} ≠ SR in Medium % Non-Cit. Areas_{Experiment}

H₀: SR in Low % Non-Cit. Areas_{Control} = SR in Low % Non-Cit. Areas_{Experiment}

H_A: SR in Low % Non-Cit. Areas_{Control} ≠ SR in Low % Non-Cit. Areas_{Experiment}

3.4.6 Self-Response Rates by Low Response Score (RQ2e)

To assess the effect of the experimental changes on self-response for areas that have different response propensities, self-response rates will be calculated and compared for each treatment in historically high and low self-response areas as defined below.

- High Response Area (HRA): tract where the low response score (LRS) > 24.0
- Low Response Area (LRA): tract where the LRS ≤ 24.0 or missing

This will test the following hypotheses:

H₀: SR of HRA_{Control} = SR of HRA_{Experiment}; H_A: SR of HRA_{Control} ≠ SR of HRA_{Experiment}

H₀: SR of LRA_{Control} = SR of LRA_{Experiment}; H_A: SR of LRA_{Control} ≠ SR of LRA_{Experiment}

The LRS is obtained from a response propensity model that uses variables on the 2018 Census Planning Database (PDB) (Erdman & Bates, 2016).

3.4.7 Self-Response Rates in Areas with Different Rates of Foreign-Born Residents in the Tract (RQ2f)

To assess the effect of the experimental changes on self-response for areas that have different proportions of foreign-born residents, we will compare self-response rates between treatments by high, medium, and low proportions. The tracts will be classified as high, medium, or low in terms of the percent of foreign-born residents in a tract:²¹

- High: tracts where the percent of foreign-born residents is higher than 15.0
- Medium: tracts where the percent of foreign-born residents is higher than 5.0 and less than or equal to 15.0
- Low: tracts where the percent of foreign-born residents is less than or equal to 5.0 or if the percent of foreign-born residents is unknown

All sampled housing units within the tract will then be classified as being in an area with a high percent of foreign-born residents, medium percent of foreign-born residents, or low or unknown percent of foreign-born residents. The denominator for these calculations will be the mailout universe within that area.

- This will test the following hypotheses:

H_0 : SR in High % Foreign Born Areas_{Control} = SR in High % Foreign Born Areas_{Experiment}

H_A : SR in High % Foreign Born Areas_{Control} \neq SR in High % Foreign Born Areas_{Experiment}

H_0 : SR in Medium % Foreign Born Areas_{Control} = SR in Medium % Foreign Born Areas_{Experiment}

H_A : SR in Medium % Foreign Born Areas_{Control} \neq SR in Medium % Foreign Born Areas_{Experiment}

H_0 : SR in Low % Foreign Born Areas_{Control} = SR in Low % Foreign Born Areas_{Experiment}

H_A : SR in Low % Foreign Born Areas_{Control} \neq SR in Low % Foreign Born Areas_{Experiment}

3.4.8 Self-Response Rates in Areas with Different Rates of Hispanic Residents in the Tract (RQ2g)

To assess the effect of the experimental changes on self-response for areas that have different proportions of Hispanic residents, we will compare self-response rates between treatments by high, medium, and low proportions. The cut-off points for defining the tracts will be determined prior to conducting the analysis, based on existing data.

All sampled housing units within the tract will then be classified as being in an area with a high percent of Hispanic residents, medium percent of Hispanic residents, or low or unknown percent of Hispanic residents. The denominator for these calculations will be the mailout universe within that area.

- This will test the following hypotheses:

H₀: SR in High % Hispanic Areas_{Control} = SR in High % Hispanic Areas_{Experiment}

H_A: SR in High % Hispanic Areas_{Control} ≠ SR in High % Hispanic Areas_{Experiment}

H₀: SR in Medium % Hispanic Areas_{Control} = SR in Medium % Hispanic Areas_{Experiment}

H_A: SR in Medium % Hispanic Areas_{Control} ≠ SR in Medium % Hispanic Areas_{Experiment}

H₀: SR in Low % Hispanic Areas_{Control} = SR in Low % Hispanic Areas_{Experiment}

H_A: SR in Low % Hispanic Areas_{Control} ≠ SR in Low % Hispanic Areas_{Experiment}

3.4.9 Self-Response Rates by Regional Census Center (RQ2h)

The sample was not designed to support state-level estimates, but lower-level geographical differences may be of interest. Therefore, we will look at the effect of the experimental changes on self-response for the six different areas served by the Census Bureau’s regional census centers (RCCs). Self-response rates will be calculated and compared for each treatment separately for each region: Atlanta, Chicago, Dallas, Los Angeles (includes Alaska and Hawaii), New York (excluding Puerto Rico), and Philadelphia.²² See Appendix D for more details on the boundaries for each RCC.

This will test the following hypotheses for each region:

H₀: SR in the RCC_{Control} = SR in the RCC_{Experiment}; H_A: SR in the RCC_{Control} ≠ SR in the RCC_{Experiment}

The denominator for these calculations will be the mailout universe within the RCC.

3.4.10 Self-Response Rates by Urban/Rural Areas (RQ2i)

To assess the effect of the experimental changes on self-response for different types of geographic areas self-response rates will be calculated and compared for each treatment by designated urban and rural areas. The Census Bureau definition of “urban” will be used to include urbanized areas (areas with 50,000 or more people) and urban clusters (areas with at least 2,500 but fewer than 50,000) (Ratcliffe, Burd, Holder, & Fields, 2016). All other areas will be considered rural.

This will test the following hypotheses:

H₀: SR in Urban Areas_{Control} = SR in Urban Areas_{Experiment}

$H_A: SR \text{ in Urban Areas}_{Control} \neq SR \text{ in Urban Areas}_{Experiment}$

$H_0: SR \text{ in Rural Areas}_{Control} = SR \text{ in Rural Areas}_{Experiment}$

$H_A: SR \text{ in Rural Areas}_{Control} \neq SR \text{ in Rural Areas}_{Experiment}$

The denominator for these calculations will be the mailout universe within each of the areas.

3.5 Item-Level Analysis

Item response analysis metrics computed for this report will be weighted. The weight is the inverse of the probability of selection. A significance level of $\alpha=0.1$ will be used when determining significant differences between treatments. Other than response distributions, comparisons will be made using a two-sided t-test. For response distributions, Rao-Scott chi-square tests will be used. For analyses that involve multiple comparisons, the Type I familywise error rate will be adjusted using the Hochberg method (Hochberg, 1988). Item data will not be edited or imputed for this analysis.

3.5.1 Demographic Analyses

The sample design for this test allocates housing unit addresses for each treatment to ensure similarities, to the extent possible, between the two treatments. As such, a working assumption is that respondents in both treatments will have similar demographic characteristics. Thus, similar distributions are expected when response data are analyzed. Any differences in the demographic distributions may be attributed to the experimental difference in the treatments. Demographic distributions for data will be analyzed from the following response categories: *relationship, sex, age, Hispanic origin, race, and tenure*. The *average household size* for each treatment will also be calculated and compared.

There are two metrics that may be used to analyze the demographic characteristics: category response distributions and a ratio metric. If the overall unit self-response rates are not significantly different, the category response distributions will be used. If there is a significant difference in the unit self-response rates the ratio metric will be used. This is to account for the potential impact differential unit response may have on the response distributions. The calculations for these two metrics follows.

3.5.1.1 Category Response Distributions (RQ3a-g)

Response distributions between treatments will be compared overall and by mode for the following items.

Person Level Items

- a. Relationship (RQ3a): The response categories will be collapsed into two categories, Related and Unrelated (to Person 1).
- b. Sex (RQ3b): The response categories are male and female.

- c. Age Groups (RQ3c): The responses will be grouped into the following categories – under 5 years old, 5 to 20 years old, 21 to 29 years old, 30 to 39 years old, 40 to 52 years old, 53 to 64 years old, and 65 years old or older.²³
- d. Hispanic Origin (RQ3d): The response categories will be collapsed into two categories, Hispanic and not Hispanic. We will also look at the different Hispanic groups (Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, and Other) as there is potential for the impact to vary by group, for example people born in Puerto Rico are citizens of the U.S.
- e. Race (RQ3e): The response categories will be collapsed into the following categories – White alone, Black or African American alone, American Indian or Alaska Native alone, Asian alone, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander alone, Some Other Race alone, Two or more races.

Housing-Unit Level Items

- f. Tenure (RQ3f): The response categories will be collapsed into two categories, Owners and Renters. The fourth category “Occupied without payment of rent” will be included in the renter category.
- g. Average Household Size (RQ3g): Household size will be determined by the total count of data-defined persons (DDP) for each sufficient, unduplicated return. A person response is considered a DDP if two or more person-level data items are considered sufficient.²⁴ This number will be divided by the number of sufficient, unduplicated returns in the treatment. To determine statistical differences for *average household size* between treatments, we will perform two-tailed hypothesis tests.

Recognizing that household size could affect response levels for items on the questionnaire (i.e. we could expect a higher item nonresponse from larger households due to response fatigue), we will compare the average household size between treatments. If there is a significant difference between treatments, this will be taken into account for analyses involving item response (item non-response, form completion, and internet breakoff rates). If no significant difference is detected between the two treatments then any respondent fatigue will be assumed to be the same for each treatment and should not be a factor when analyzing differences between the treatments for the item response analyses.

The numerator for these calculations will include all valid response categories. Missing and invalid responses will be analyzed separately as part of item nonresponse analysis (see Section 3.5.2).

The denominator for person-level item calculations will include all DDPs with a valid response for the question of interest from unduplicated, sufficient returns. A person response is considered a

DDP if two or more person-level data items are determined to be sufficient, as defined in (U.S. Census Bureau, 2016b)

The denominator for housing-unit level item calculations will include all unduplicated, sufficient returns with a valid response for the question of interest.

In the case of bilingual forms, questions are presented in English and Spanish. While the intent of the bilingual form is for a respondent to answer the questions in either English or Spanish, it is possible for a respondent to answer questions in both languages. If there is housing-unit level data reported in both the English and Spanish, the data will be evaluated to determine whether there are more housing-level responses in English or in Spanish. The data that are more complete will be used in the analysis. In the event of a tie, the English data will be used for the analysis. For person level data, respondents could answer in both languages as a way to include a large household or they could be confused and duplicate their household, answering once in Spanish and again in English. Therefore, for person level data, all DDP's will be processed regardless of whether the data was answered in English or Spanish, however, duplicate people will be removed.²⁵

For response distributions, Rao-Scott chi-square tests of independence will be used to determine statistical differences between treatments at the 0.1 level of significance (Rao & Scott, 1987).

The following hypotheses will be tested:

H_0 : Distribution of Responses_{Control} = Distribution of Responses_{Experiment}

H_A : Distribution of Responses_{Control} \neq Distribution of Responses_{Experiment}

To control for the overall Type I error rate for the hypotheses tested simultaneously, the Hochberg multiple-comparison procedure will be used (Hochberg, 1988). A family for the response distribution analyses will be defined as the seven demographic items (a through g from above) being compared. The resulting p-value from each of the seven response distributions will be used in the Hochberg procedure.

For distributions with more than two categories, *race* and *age groups*: if the distributions are significantly different we will perform additional tests on the differences for each response category using two-tailed hypothesis t-tests to determine which category proportions are causing the differences in the distributions. The following hypotheses will be tested:

H_0 : Category Proportion_{Control} = Category Proportion_{Experiment}

H_A : Category Proportion_{Control} \neq Category Proportion_{Experiment}

The Hochberg multiple-comparison procedure will be performed within each distribution, with the family defined by the number of category proportions being compared (Hochberg, 1988).

3.5.1.2 Ratio Metric (RQ3a-g)

As indicated, the ratio metric will be used instead of the category response distributions if the overall unit self-response rate is significantly different between the treatments. The ratio will be calculated for the same demographic items identified above, but only for overall self-response, not by mode. The following hypotheses will be tested:

H₀: Category Ratio Metric_{Control} = Category Ratio Metric_{Experiment}

H_A: Category Ratio Metric_{Control} ≠ Category Ratio Metric_{Experiment}

The category ratio metric is defined as follows, for each demographic category of interest:

$$\text{Category Ratio Metric} = \frac{\text{Observed proportion of the demographic category}}{\text{National estimate of the demographic category}}$$

For example, the percent of Hispanics who responded in the control treatment divided by the percent of Hispanics estimated to be in the country. The denominator, the national-level estimate, will be an estimate based on the most recently five-year ACS estimates.²⁶

The Hochberg multiple-comparison procedure will be used (Hochberg, 1988). A family for the ratio metric analyses will be defined as the seven demographic items being compared.

3.5.2 Item Nonresponse and Form Completeness (RQ4 and RQ5)

Respondents leave items blank for a variety of reasons including not understanding the question (clarity), unwillingness to answer a question as presented (sensitivity), and lack of knowledge of the data needed to answer the question. Two metrics will be used to assess this: item nonresponse and form completeness.

The item nonresponse rate (for a given item) is the proportion of eligible units, housing units for household-level items or persons for person-level items, for which a required response is missing. The question concerning citizenship will not be included in these calculations because it is only included in one treatment. See Section 3.5.4 for analysis of that question.

The following formula will be used to calculate the item nonresponse rate:

$$\text{Item Nonresponse Rate} = \frac{\text{Number of missing or invalid responses to the item of interest}}{\text{Universe for the item of interest}}$$

A response is missing if no answer is given for a particular question (blank for mail, skipped for internet or TQA). A response is invalid if it is not allowed according to Census Bureau rules, for example an age of 145 years old or a response on a paper questionnaire that has multiple boxes checked when only one marked box is allowed.

The following items will be assessed:²⁷

Housing items:

1. Number of people living or staying in the housing unit
2. Housing unit owned or rented
3. Contact telephone number

Person items:

1. Name (First, Middle, and Last combined)
2. Relationship
3. Sex
4. Age and Date of Birth
5. Hispanic Origin
6. Race

The denominator for housing items is all sufficient, unduplicated returns. The denominator for person items is all DDPs to whom the question is asked. The person level items are not asked of everyone on the paper questionnaires due to space limitations. All questions are asked of everyone rostered on the internet and in TQA. Table 4 shows the questions asked on the paper questionnaire.

*The relationship question determines the relationship of each person to Person 1. Person 1 is designated as the reference person and no relationship question is asked. Persons 2 through 6 are asked the full relationship question. Persons 7 through 10 are asked a shortened relationship question to indicate if the person is related to Person 1 or not, but the specifics of the relationship are not obtained.

Only persons that are asked a question will be included in the calculations and this varies by mode of data collection. For example, Persons 7 through 10 are not asked about *race* on the paper questionnaire, so they will not be included in item nonresponse rate for *race*. For mail returns, *relationship* responses for Persons 2 through 10 will be included in the analysis and responses will be assessed based on the question asked (either the full question or shortened question).

The following hypotheses will be tested:

$$H_0: \text{Item Nonresponse Rate}_{\text{Control}} = \text{Item Nonresponse Rate}_{\text{Experiment}}$$

$$H_A: \text{Item Nonresponse Rate}_{\text{Control}} \neq \text{Item Nonresponse Rate}_{\text{Experiment}}$$

Form completeness is the number of questions on the form that were answered among those that should have been answered. The formula to calculate form completeness rates is:

$$\text{Overall Form Completeness Rate} = \left(\frac{\text{Number of questions answered}}{\text{Number of questions that should have been answered}} \right) \times 100$$

The universes for form completeness will be similar to the universes used for item nonresponse, as appropriate for each mode of response and each type of question (housing or person).

The following hypotheses will be tested:

$$H_0: \text{Form Completeness Rate}_{\text{Control}} = \text{Form Completeness Rate}_{\text{Experiment}}$$

$$H_A: \text{Form Completeness Rate}_{\text{Control}} \neq \text{Form Completeness Rate}_{\text{Experiment}}$$

The item nonresponse and form completeness rates will be calculated for each treatment for overall self-response, by response mode, and by strata. The comparisons between treatments will use two-tailed hypothesis tests with a significance level of 0.1. To control for the overall Type I error rate for the hypotheses tested simultaneously, the Hochberg multiple-comparison procedure will be used

(Hochberg, 1988). A family for the response distribution analyses will be defined as the nine demographic items being analyzed.

3.5.3 Internet Breakoff Rate (RQ6)

The internet breakoff rates for the control and experimental treatments will be calculated and compared.

The denominator for the calculations will include all addresses that began to respond on the internet by logging on and do not respond in any other mode.²⁸ Note that this means both sufficient and insufficient returns will be included in this analysis, which is different than other sections of this report.

An overall breakoff rate is calculated by including in the numerator all housing units that began to respond via the internet but did not complete and confirm the response via the internet.²⁹ Breakoffs will also reviewed at various points in the internet instrument as follows:

- Started the interview but did not reach the demographic dashboard (i.e., did not begin to answer any demographic items for anyone in the household).³⁰
- Reached the demographic dashboard but exited before responding to the SUBMIT_Census_Questionnaire screen.³¹
- Went through all of the demographic screens for each person (regardless of whether they were answered), but did not respond to the CONFIRMATION screen.³²
 - If the data can indicate it, we will also try to break this down further to identify the rate that respondents went through all of the demographic screens for one person (regardless of whether they were answered), but did not respond for any other people in the household and did not reach later portions of the interview.³³

The following hypotheses, overall at the points indicated above, will be tested:

H₀: Breakoff Rate_{Control} = Breakoff Rate_{Experiment}

H_A: Breakoff Rate_{Control} ≠ Breakoff Rate_{Experiment}

3.5.4 Citizenship Question Item Nonresponse Rate (RQ7)

The item nonresponse rate for the citizenship question on the control questionnaire will be calculated (overall, by response mode, and by strata) using the following formula:

$$\text{Citizenship Item Nonresponse Rate} = \frac{\text{Number of invalid or missing responses to the citizenship question}}{\text{Data defined person for whom the citizenship question is asked}}$$

The denominator for these calculations will include all DDPs, for whom the question is asked, from unduplicated, sufficient returns. The internet instrument and the TQA instrument will ask questions for up to 99 people in each household, and the citizenship question will be asked for everyone. The paper questionnaire will ask questions for up to 10 people in each household. As is the case for the Hispanic origin and race questions, the citizenship question will only be asked for the first six of those people, as it is more costly to include more questions on paper due to increased costs for ink, paper, and postage.

A response will be considered missing if no checkboxes are marked and no year of naturalization has been provided. Invalid responses (such as more than one box checked for a paper questionnaire) will be considered a nonresponse.

Although a direct comparison cannot be made, item nonresponse from self-responses for the ACS (for the same month of data collection as this test) may be used as a general ballpark estimate for what might be expected for nonresponse to the question.

3.6 Standard Errors

All variances will be estimated using the Successive Differences Replication method with replicate weights. The variance for each rate and difference will be calculated using the formula below.

$$\text{Var}(X_0) = \frac{4}{80} \sum_{r=1}^{80} (X_r - X_0)^2$$

Where:

X_r = the estimate calculated using the r^{th} replicate

X_0 = the estimate calculated using the full sample

The standard error of the estimate (X_0) is the square root of the variance.

4 ASSUMPTIONS AND LIMITATIONS

4.1 Assumptions

For this test, we assume that there is no difference in mail delivery timing or subsequent response time across samples of similar size using the same postal sort and mailout procedures, as the chosen sample sizes for the treatments considered postal procedures.

4.2 Limitations

The following are the known limitations of the 2019 Census Test, in no particular order:

1. The results of this test apply only to self-response mailout areas.
2. The focus of this analysis is to understand how the citizenship question affects self-response rates prior to NRFU. As such, the results of this test are limited to the self-response timeframe prior to the start of NRFU. The self-response rates discussed in this analysis do not try to mimic the final overall self-response of a census, which includes self-response received during NRFU and other field operations.
3. The 2019 Census Test does not provide the same level of language support as will be available in the 2020 Census, as described in Section 3.2. To the degree that needing non-English language materials to self-response is correlated with citizenship status, the results of this test will be impacted.
4. The test also does not include a non-ID operation, which allows for self-response by collecting a person's address in lieu of providing a Census ID. In the 2019 Census Test, a Census ID is required to respond. This could mean that some people who try to respond online will not be able to respond for this test or will respond using a different mode than what they would use in the 2020 Census.
5. The environment in which this test is conducted may differ from the 2020 Census, which includes advertising and typically more media attention than is experienced during tests. For instance, the 2020 Census is projecting a national-level self-response rate of 60.5 percent prior to NRFU, which is about ten percentage points higher than seen in mid-decade census tests. Additionally, Census Bureau advertising may mitigate some differences observed in this test. There has also been media coverage of the citizenship question being added to the 2020 Census. Public awareness of the topic may influence behavior for this test as well as the 2020 Census. The degree to which public awareness is different between this test and the 2020 Census may influence the reliability of the results of this test.

6. Self-response may be lower for a census test with a July 1st Census Day, as many people are on vacation in the summer, compared to the 2020 Census with an April 1st Census Day. Additionally, the coverage of people may be different due to different living situations in the summer months (i.e. college students are less likely to be living in a dorm in the summer and would be counted elsewhere; migrant workers are more likely to be in southern states in the spring and northern states in the summer). However, these differences between this test and the 2020 Census will not affect conclusions drawn between the control and experimental treatments in this test.
