1. Online Group Concept Mapping (GCM)

This document provides an overview of the proposed SAF-T Project Group Concept Mapping (GCM) process including screenshots of what stakeholder participants will see as they navigate through the Concept Systems, Inc. online [groupwisdom](#)[™] GCM platform. The information in this document is presented in the order that participants will experience in the system and is organized by three main activities included in GCM (i.e., brainstorming, sorting, and rating). The initial “General Project Areas” section contains screenshots of messages to participants every time they access the system (whether it is their first time, or they are a returning user), including important elements such as safety warnings, informed consent, welcome, and thank you messages. The “Participant Questions” section contains questions that will be asked of all participants before the sorting and rating activity.

Depending upon how individuals are recruited, they may participate in GCM activities anonymously or confidentially. Participants referred to the GCM via The Hotline (i.e., victims/survivors of relationship abuse, family members of victims/survivors, or friends of victims/survivors) will participate anonymously and will not be assigned a login/password. While they will be able to return to the system as many times as they like for the brainstorming activity, anonymous route respondents will be encouraged to complete the sorting and rating in one sitting (for each activity) since their data are not linked across sessions through a login/password. As the instructions included below show, anonymous participants will be encouraged to start sorting or rating only if they have enough time to complete the activity.

Participants who participate via the confidential path will be able to return multiple times to complete the sorting and rating tasks using a confidential username and password. Each time directions provided in this document mention returning to complete activities, these directions are specific to confidential-route respondents and will not be visible to the anonymous-route respondents. There are notes throughout this document indicating which directions anonymous participants will not see.

Given the aforementioned differences, there will also be two separate consent forms.¹ Finally, we include notes throughout this document to indicate where example data have been included for illustrative purposes. Example data will be removed before data collection begins.

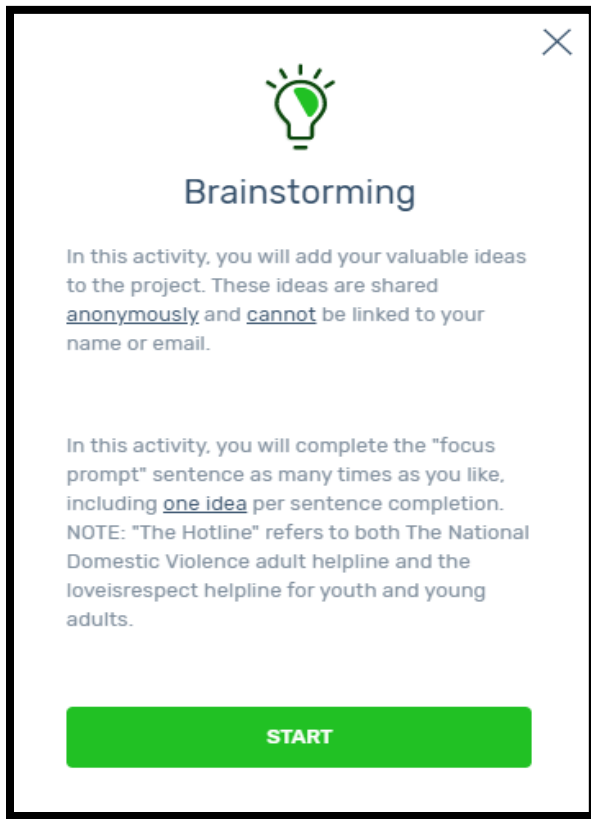

3. Brainstorming Activity

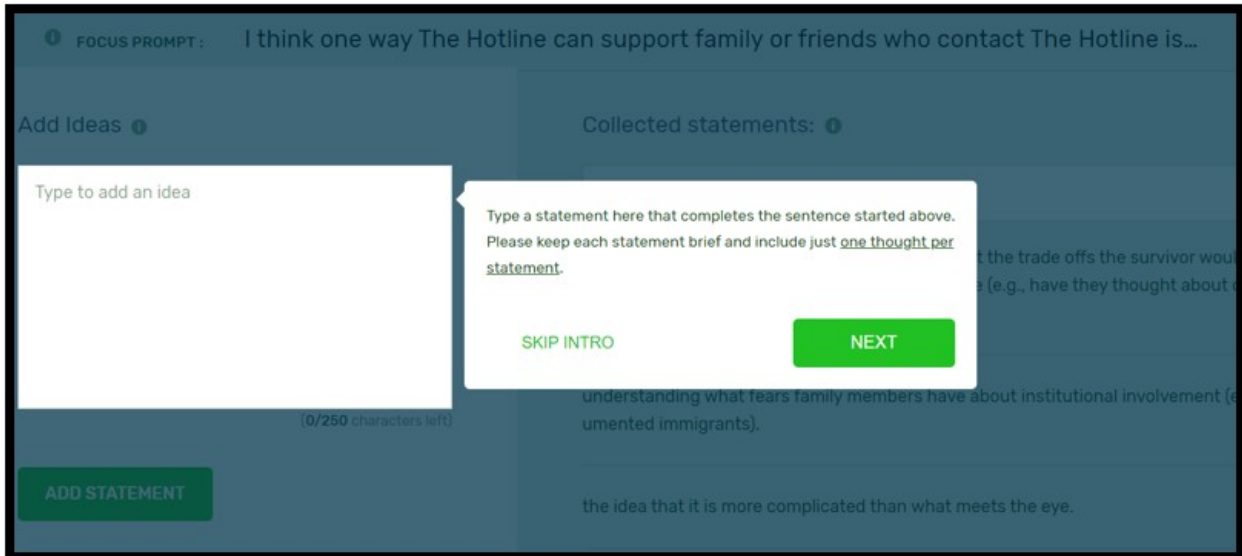
After respondents consent to participate, they will be provided with general instructions for participating in the brainstorming activity as illustrated in Exhibit 3a.

After respondents select "START" at the bottom of the brainstorming activity general instructions message, they will be presented with pop-up windows with detailed instructions on the brainstorming activity as illustrated in Exhibits 3a-1 through 3a-4. Respondents can choose to skip or navigate forward or back through these activity instructions. After respondents progress through (or skip) these instructions, they will advance to the activity interface where they can begin the brainstorming activity (See Exhibit 3b).

Exhibit 3a-2. Screenshot of pop-up window with brainstorming activity instructions: Location of participant responses*

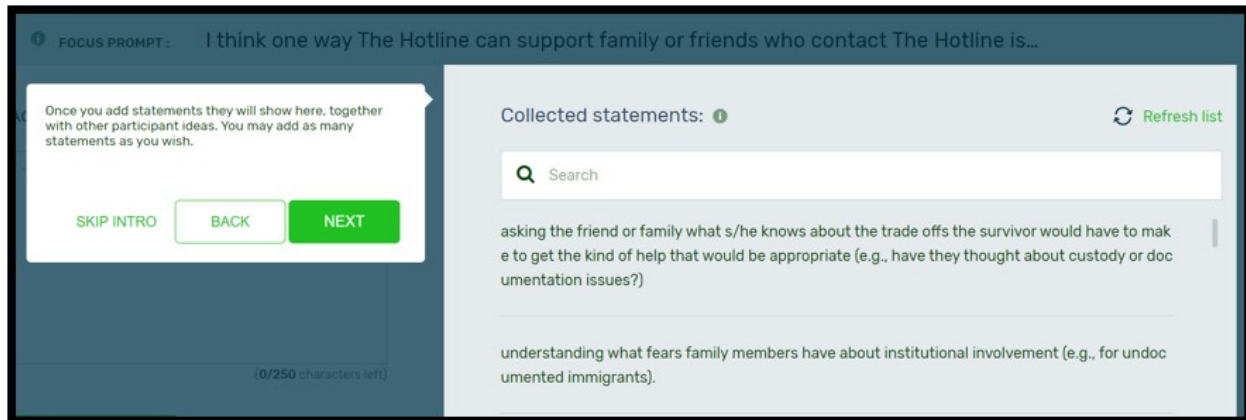
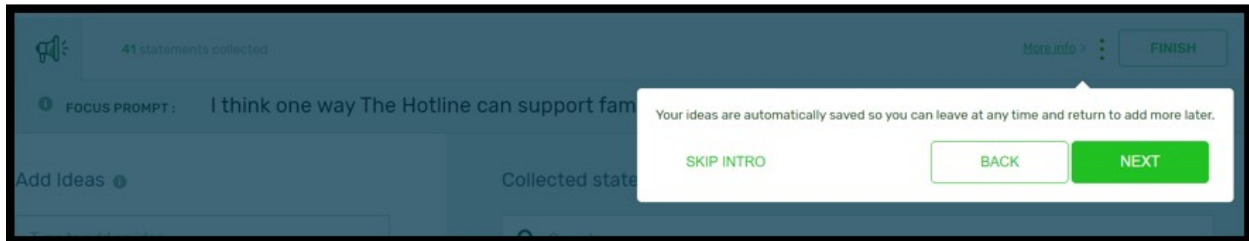
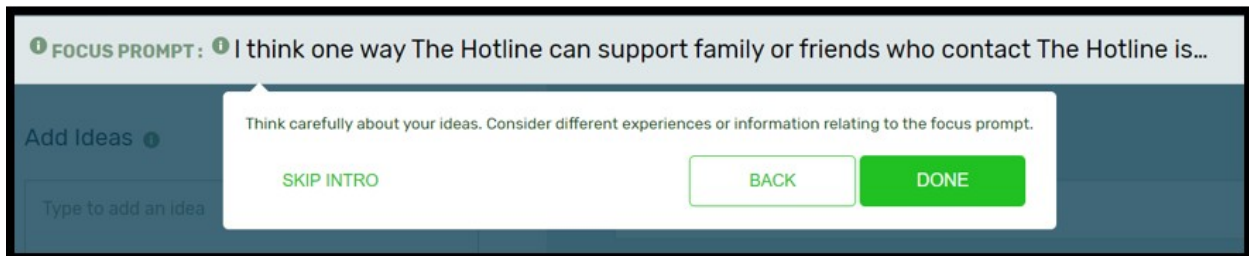


Exhibit 3a-3. Screenshot of pop-up window with brainstorming activity instructions: Auto-save function and option to respond during more than one session *



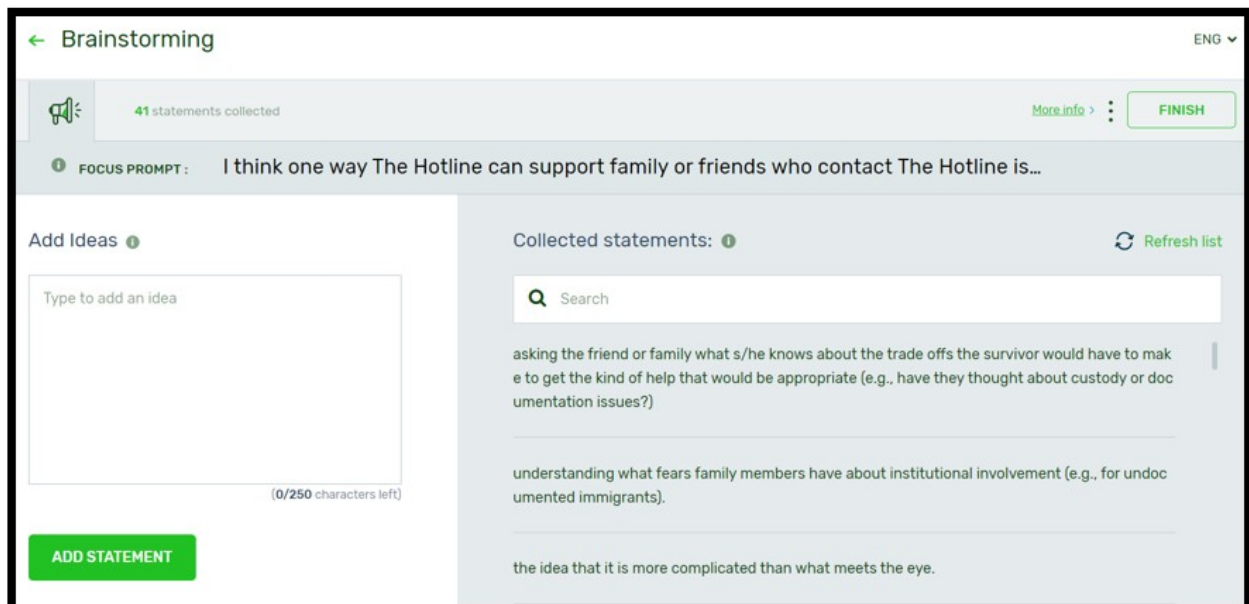

* Instructions in screenshot: “Think carefully about your ideas. Consider different experiences or information relating to the focus prompt.”

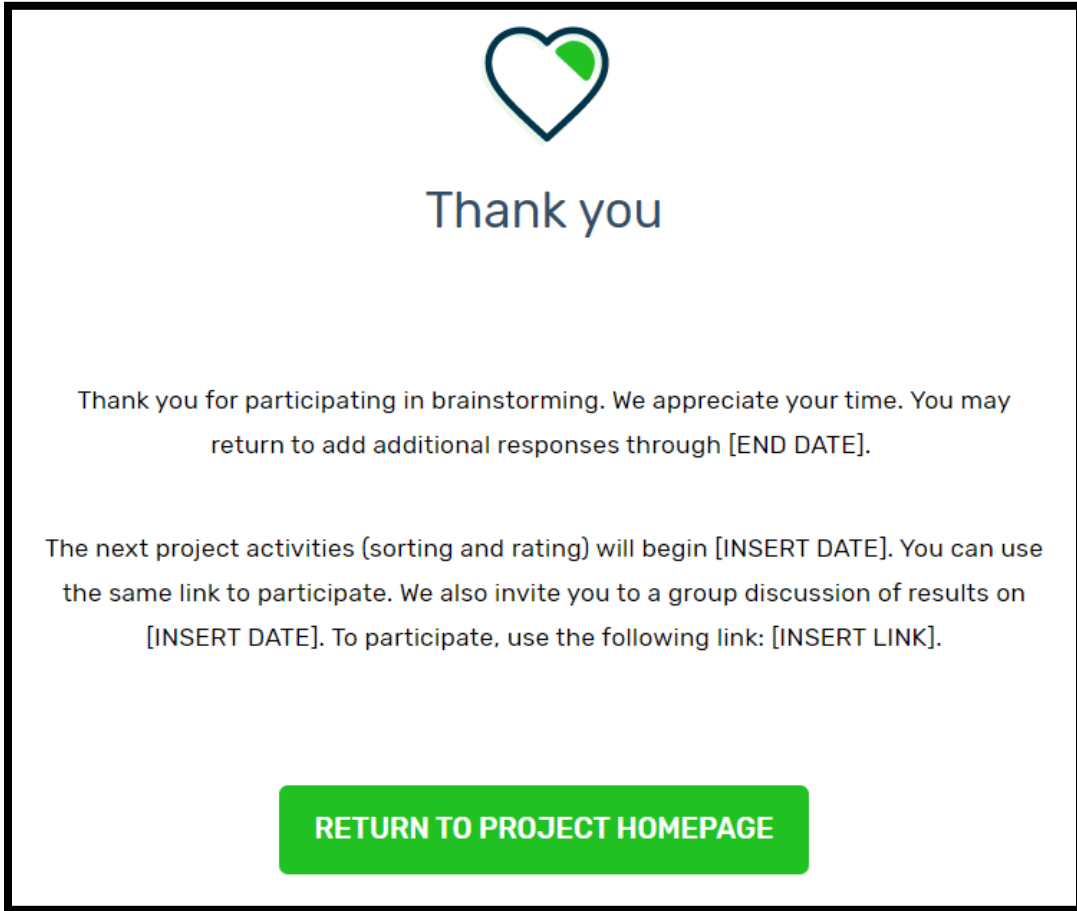
Exhibit 3b. Brainstorming activity interface*

When respondents are finished with the brainstorming activity, they will select “FINISH” and will receive a thank you message as illustrated in Exhibit 3c.

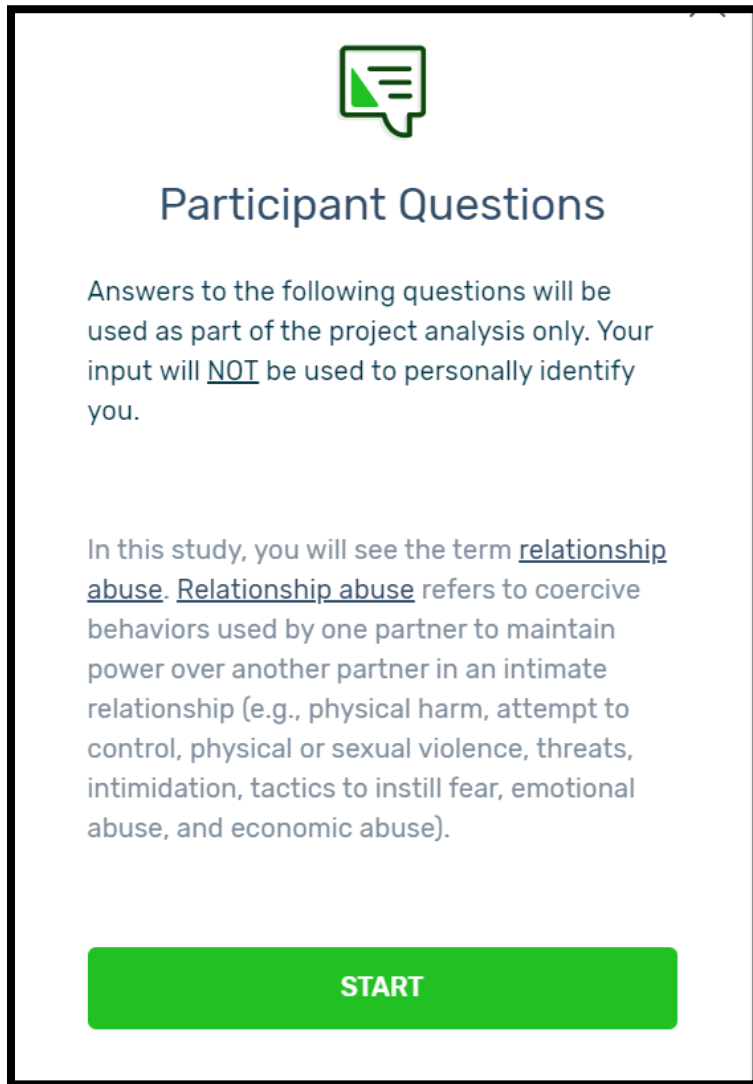
Exhibit 3c. Brainstorming activity completion thank you message



4. Participant Questions

Before beginning sorting/rating activities, participants will be prompted to answer participant questions and will be provided the definition of “relationship abuse” as illustrated in Exhibit 4a.

After respondents select “START” at the bottom of the participant questions overview message, they will be prompted to answer five participant questions. Screen shots of the five questions are illustrated in Exhibits 4b-1 through 4b-5. The responses to the participant questions will allow subsequent analyses of differences by key stakeholder group, age, race/ethnicity, and preferred mode of contacting The Hotline.

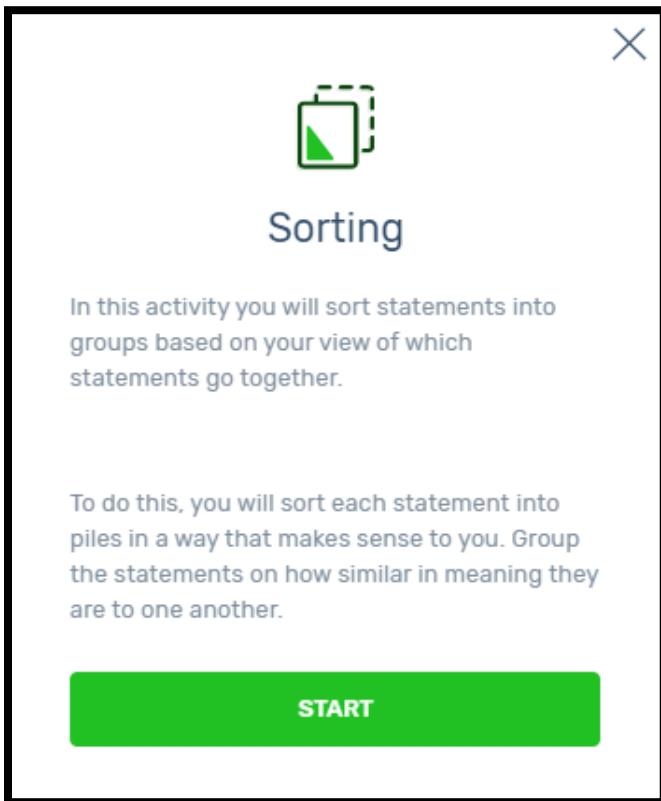

5. Sorting Activity

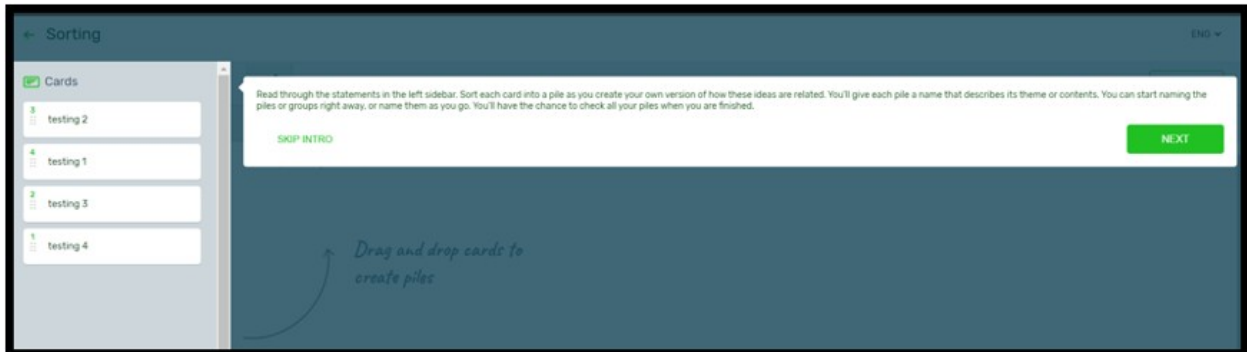
After responding to the five participant questions, respondents will be provided with general instructions for participating in the sorting activity as illustrated in Exhibit 5a.

Exhibit 5a. Sorting activity general instructions message



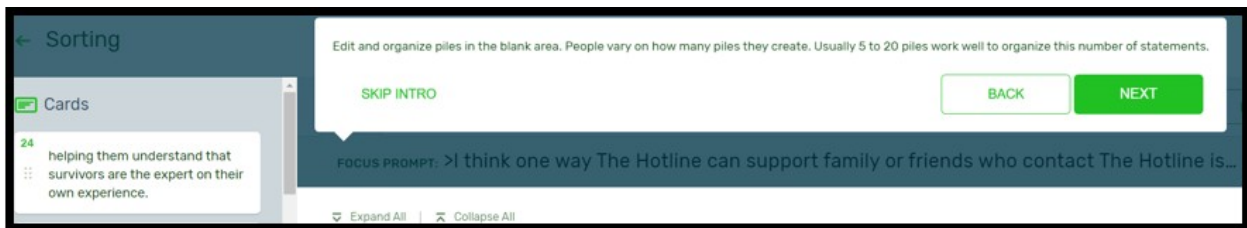
After respondents select “START” at the bottom of the sorting activity general instructions message, they will be presented with pop-up window detailed instructions on the sorting activity as illustrated in Exhibits 5a-1 through 5a-3. Respondents can choose to skip or navigate forward or back through these activity instructions. After respondents progress through (or skip) these instructions, they will advance to the activity interface where they can begin the sorting activity (See Exhibit 5b-1).

Exhibit 5b-1. Screenshot of pop-up window with sorting activity instructions: Sorting cards into piles*



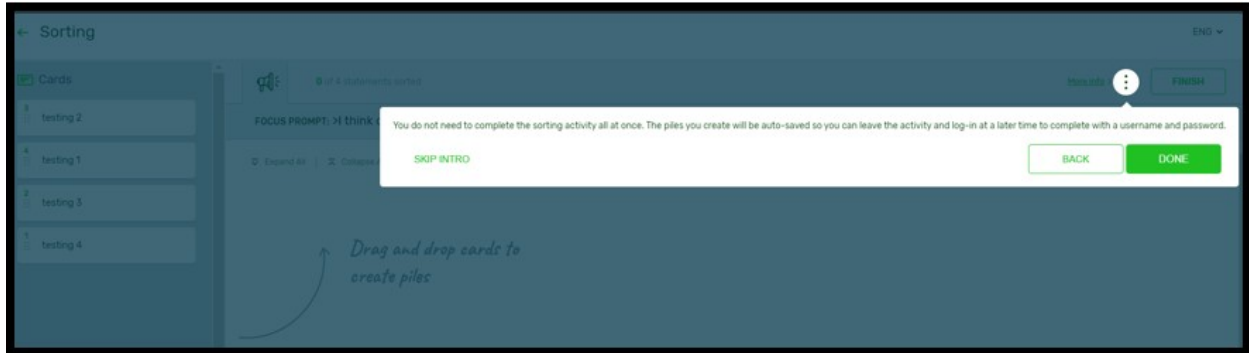

Exhibit 5b-2. Screenshot of pop-up window with sorting activity instructions: Editing and organizing piles*



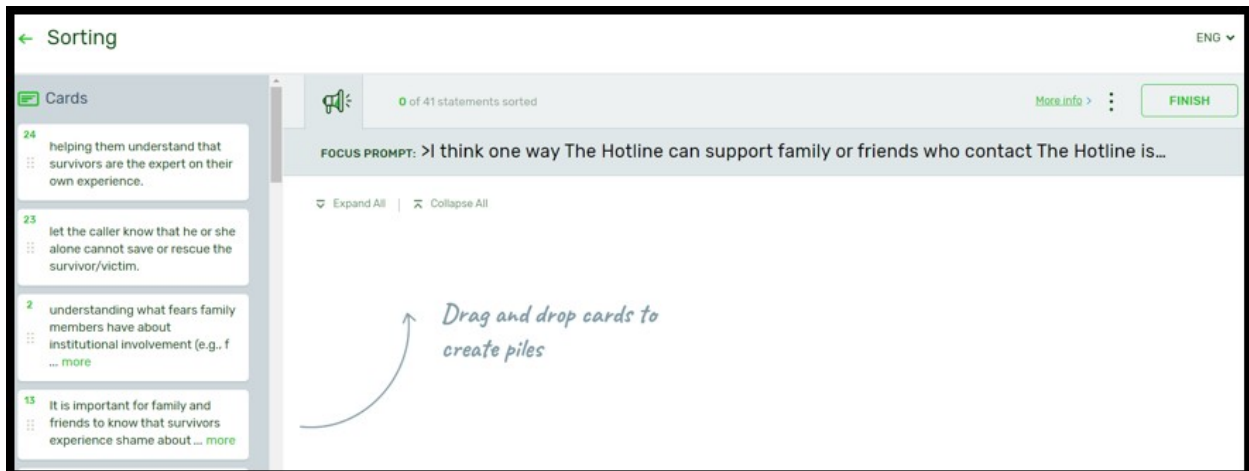

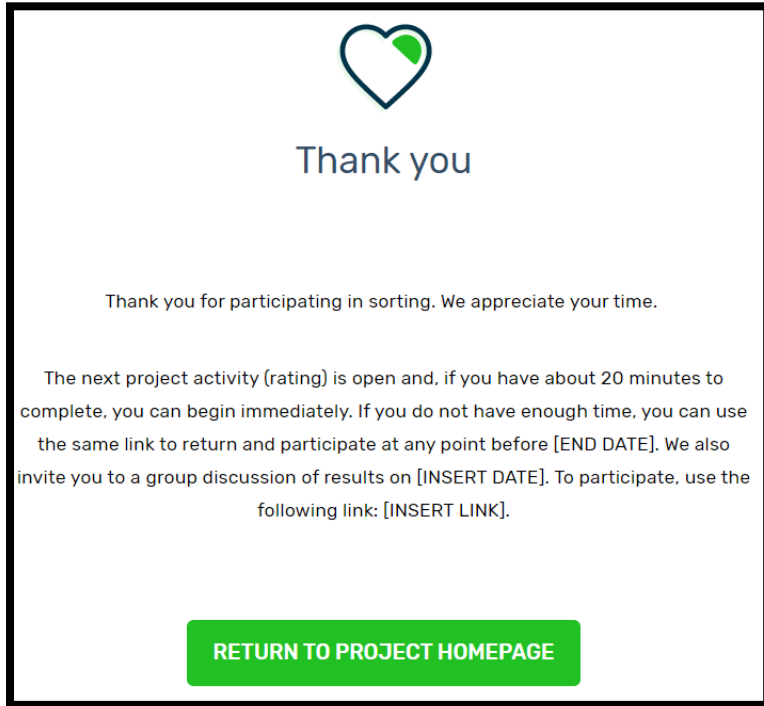
Exhibit 5c. Sorting activity interface *

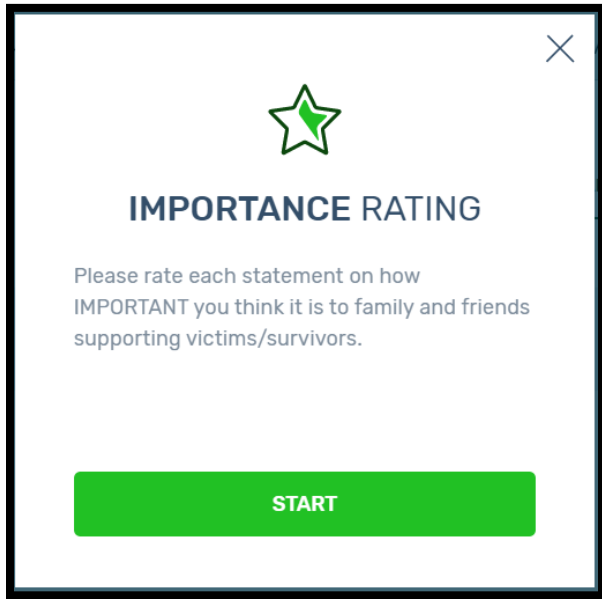
Exhibit 5d. Sorting activity completion thank you message



6. Rating Activity

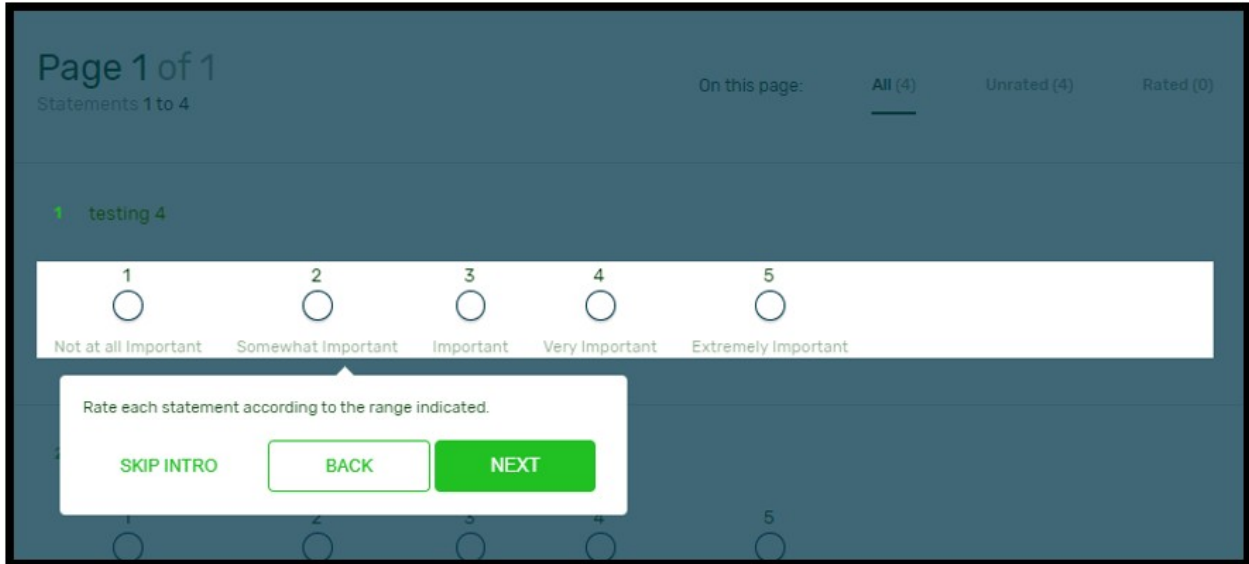

Exhibit 6a. Importance rating activity general instructions message



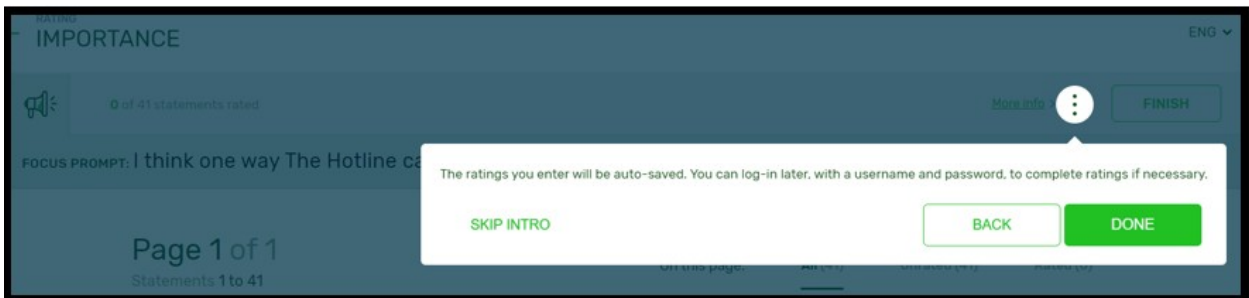
After respondents select “START” at the bottom of the importance section of the rating activity general instructions message, they will be presented with pop-up windows with detailed instructions on the importance section of the rating activity as illustrated in Exhibits 6a-1 and 6a-2. After respondents progress through (or skip) these instructions, they will advance to the activity interface where they can begin the importance section of the rating activity (See Exhibit 6b).

Exhibit 6a-1. Screenshot of pop-up window with importance rating activity instructions: Range of responses*



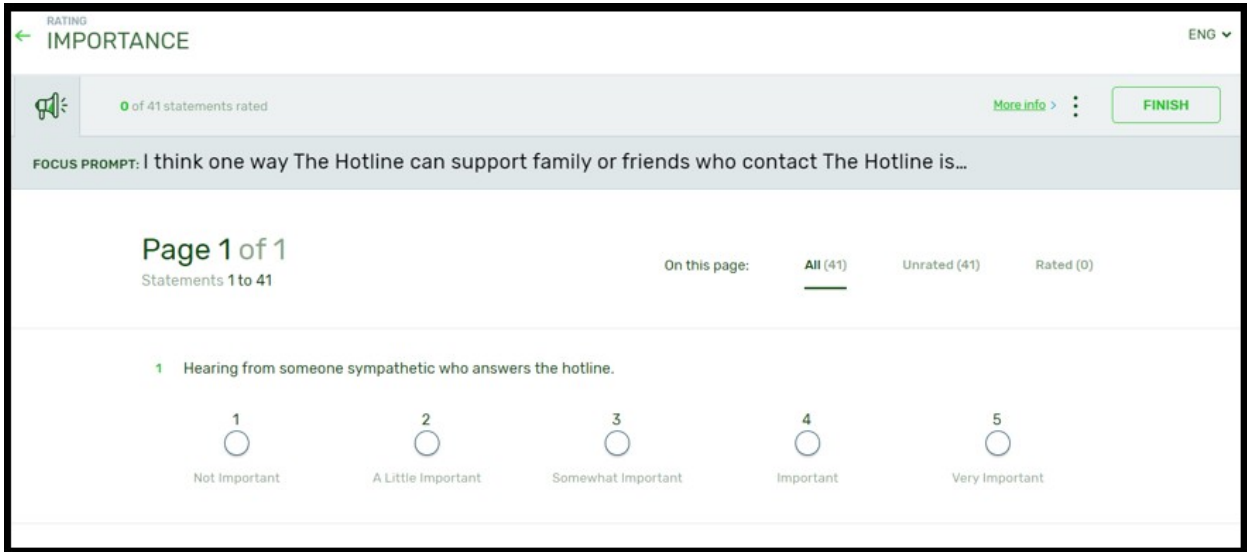

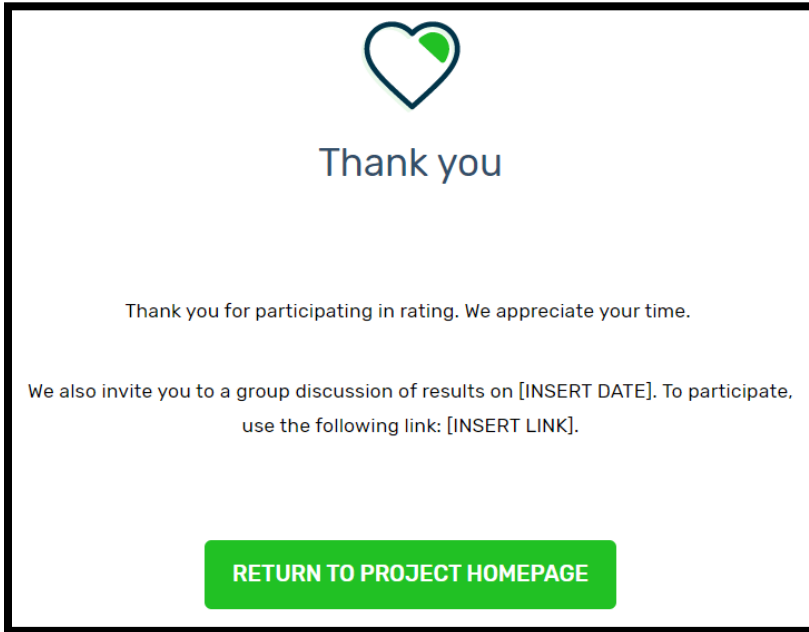
Exhibit 6b. Importance rating activity interface *

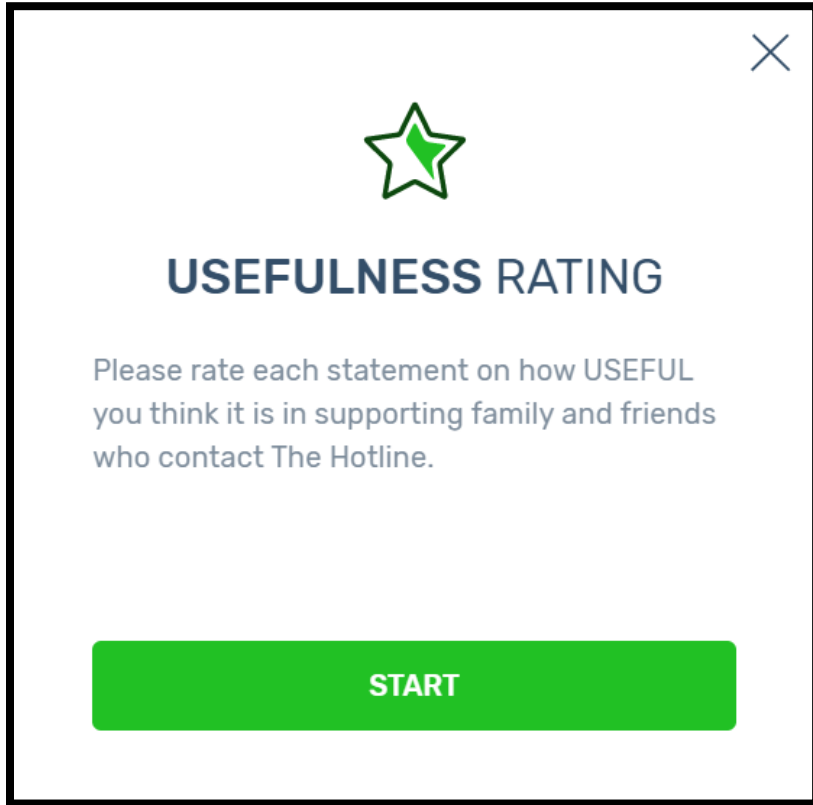

Exhibit 6c. Importance rating activity completion thank you message



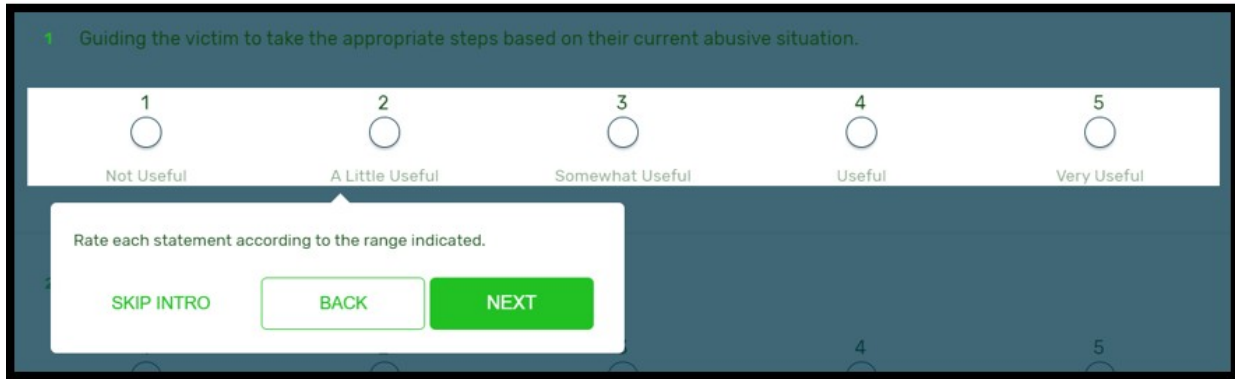
After completing the importance rating activity, respondents will receive general instructions for participating in the usefulness rating activity as illustrated in Exhibit 6d.

Exhibit 6d. Usefulness rating activity general instructions message



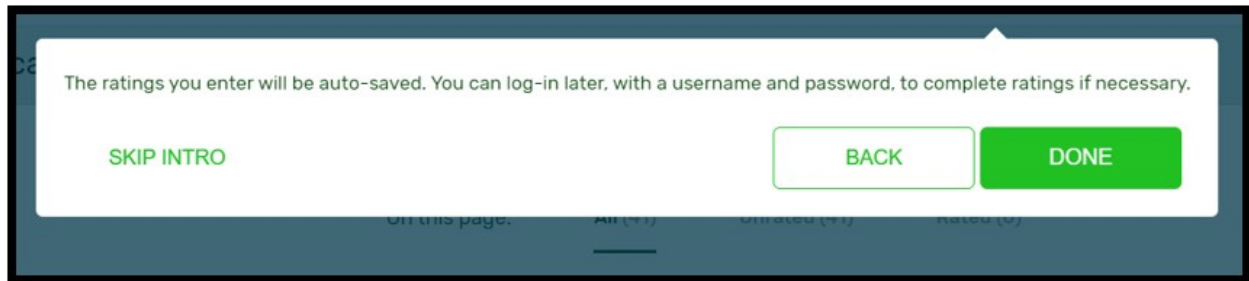

Exhibit 6d-1. Screenshot of pop-up window with usefulness rating activity instructions: Range of responses*



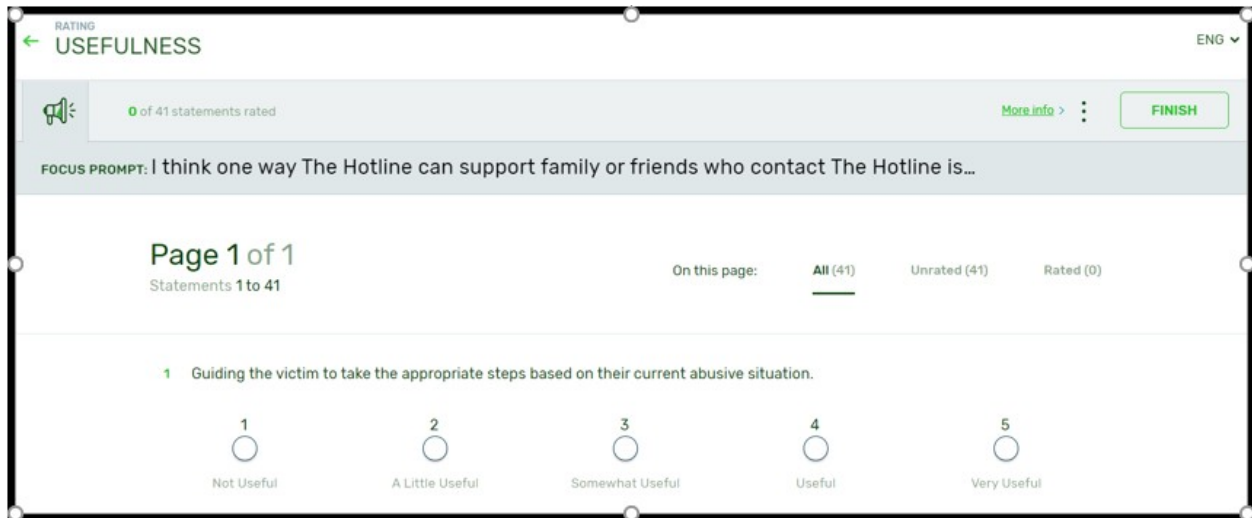
