# GENERAL INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS

**NOTE:** Throughout this form, the words "we," "us," and "our" refer to the U.S. Department of Education or to your TEACH Grant servicer. The word "Agreement" refers to the Agreement to Serve or Repay that you signed before you received your TEACH Grants.

# How do I use this form?

As explained in your Agreement, you can request a suspension of the 8-year period for completing your TEACH Grant service obligation if you are temporarily unable to teach due to certain qualifying conditions. You use this form to request a suspension of the 8-year period for completing your service obligation if you are temporarily unable to teach because you are enrolled in a qualifying program of study at an institution of higher education or are receiving state-required instruction or otherwise fulfilling requirements to be licensed to teach in a state's elementary or secondary schools. See Section 4 of the form for specific eligibility requirements.

# How do I complete the form?

- Before you begin, carefully read the entire form. Print using dark ink.
- Your name, address, and other information may be preprinted in Section 1. If any of this information is not shown, or if any of the preprinted information is incorrect, enter or correct the information on the right side of Section 1. If any of your information has changed since the last time you reported it to us, check the box in Section 1 to indicate this.
- Complete Section 2:
  - O Enter the beginning and ending dates (month and year only) of the school year for which you are requesting a suspension of the 8-year service obligation period. For example, if you are requesting a suspension to cover a school year that begins in August 2021 and ends in June 2022, you would enter "<u>0</u> <u>8</u> 20 <u>2</u> <u>1</u>" as the beginning date and "<u>0</u> <u>6</u> 20 <u>2</u> <u>2</u>" as the ending date.
  - Sign and date the form. Enter the date as month-day-year. For example, if you signed the form on August 25, 2021, you would enter
    "<u>0 8 2 5</u> 20 <u>2 1</u>".
- Have Section 3 completed by an authorized official of the institution of higher education where you are or were enrolled, or by an authorized official of the organization through which you are otherwise fulfilling requirements to be certified or licensed to teach.

I am/was unable to complete a full year of teaching service during this school year because (1) I am/was enrolled at an institution of higher education in a program of study for which I would be eligible to receive a TEACH Grant; or (2) I am/was enrolled at an institution of higher education in a program of study that satisfies the requirements of a state to be licensed or certified to teach in that state's elementary or secondary schools; or (3) I am/was receiving state-required instruction or otherwise fulfilling requirements to be licensed to teach in state's elementary or secondary schools. I understand that:

- If I qualify for a suspension, I will receive a suspension for a consecutive 12-month period. If I continue to qualify for a suspension at the end of 1. one suspension period, I may reapply for another 12-month suspension. There is a maximum limit on the period of time for which the 8-year period for completing my TEACH Grant service obligation may be suspended, as explained in Section 4 of this form.
- 2. My TEACH Grant servicer must receive my suspension request before my TEACH Grants are converted to Direct Unsubsidized Loans. As explained in my Agreement, my TEACH Grants will be converted to Direct Unsubsidized Loans if I do not begin teaching or do not continue to perform qualifying teaching service within a timeframe that would allow me to complete my required 4 years of teaching within my 8-year service obligation period.
- ED will not approve my suspension request unless this form is complete and I have provided any required documentation. 3.

# SECTION 4: SUSPENSION ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS AND MAXIMUM SUSPENSION PERIOD

### Suspension eligibility requirements

You may qualify for a temporary suspension of the 8-year period for completing your TEACH Grant service obligation if you are temporarily unable to teach because you are—

- 1. Enrolled at an institution of higher education in a program of study for which you would be eligible to receive a TEACH Grant (see Section 5);
- 2. Enrolled at an institution of higher education in a program of study that has been determined by a state to satisfy the requirements for certification or licensure to teach in the state's elementary or secondary schools; or
- 3. Receiving state-required instruction or otherwise fulfilling requirements to be licensed to teach in state's elementary or secondary schools.

If you qualify for a suspension, your TEACH Grant servicer must receive your suspension request before your TEACH Grants are converted to Direct Unsubsidized Loans. Refer to your Agreement or contact us (see "Who can I contact if I have questions?" on page 1) for more information about the conditions under which your TEACH Grants may be converted to loans.

### Maximum suspension period

If you meet the requirements described in this section, you will receive a temporary suspension of the 8-year period for completing your TEACH Grant service obligation for a consecutive 12-month period covering the school year during which you are temporarily unable to teach. If you continue to qualify for a suspension at the end of one suspension period, you may reapply for another 12-month suspension. However, there is a maximum 3-year limit on the period of time for which you may receive a suspension of the 8-year service obligation period based on your enrollment in a qualifying program or completing teacher certification or licensure requirements, in combination with any periods of suspension I may receive based on certain other conditions, as explained in my Agreement.

# **SECTION 5: DEFINITIONS**

An **authorized official** who may complete Section 3 of this form is **(1)** an official of the institution of higher education where you are or were enrolled in program of study for which you would be eligible to receive a TEACH Grant, or in a program of study that satisfies the requirements of a state to be licensed or certified to teach in that state's elementary or secondary schools; or **(2)** an official of the organization where you are or were fulfilling requirements to be certified or licensed to teach in state's elementary or secondary schools by some other means.

A program of study for which you would be eligible to receive a TEACH Grant is a program that is designed to prepare you to teach as a highly qualified teacher in a high-need field (see below) and which leads to a baccalaureate or master's degree, or is an eligible post-baccalaureate program of study (see below). A two-year program of study that is acceptable for full credit toward a baccalaureate degree is considered to be a program of study leading to a baccalaureate degree.

An eligible post-baccalaureate program of study is a program of instruction for individuals who have completed a baccalaureate degree that (1) does not lead to a graduate degree; (2) consists of courses required by a state in order for a student to receive a professional certification or licensing credential that is required for employment as a teacher in an elementary or secondary school in that state (except that it does not include any program offered by a TEACH Grant-eligible institution that offers a baccalaureate degree in education); and (3) is treated as an undergraduate program for purposes of Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended.

# A high-need field is:

- Bilingual education and English language acquisition;
- Foreign language;
- Mathematics;
- Reading specialist;
- Science (including, but not limited to, computer science);
- Special education; or
- Any other field that is documented as high-need by the federal government, a state government, or a local educational agency, and is listed in the U.S. Department of Education's annual Teacher Shortage Area Nationwide Listing (Nationwide List) at\_ <u>https://www2.ed.gov/about/offices/list/ope/pol/tsa.html.</u>

### PRIVACY ACT NOTICE

The authorities for collecting the requested information from and about you are §420L *et seq.* and §451 *et seq.* of the Higher Education Act (HEA) of 1965, as amended (20 U.S.C. 1070g *et seq.* and 20 U.S.C. 1087a *et seq.*) and the authorities for collecting and using your social security number (SSN) are §484(a)(4) of the HEA (20 U.S.C. 1091(a)(4)) and §31001(i)(1) of the Debt Collection Improvement Act of 1996 (31 U.S.C. 7701(c)). Participating in the Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education (TEACH) Grant Program and/or the William D. The principal purposes for collecting the information on this form, including your SSN, are to verify your identity, to determine your eligibility to receive a TEACH Grant, and, if a TEACH Grant that you receive is converted to a Direct Unsubsidized Loan, to determine your eligibility to receive a benefit on the loan (such as deferment, forbearance, discharge, or forgiveness), to permit the servicing of your loan(s), and, if it becomes necessary, to locate you and to collect and report on your loan(s) if your loan(s) become delinquent or in default. We also use your SSN as an account identifier and to permit you to access your account information electronically.

The information in your file may be disclosed, on a case-by-case basis or under a computer matching program, to third parties as authorized under routine uses in the appropriate systems of records notices.

The routine uses of the information that we collect about you, if your TEACH Grant has not been converted to a Direct Unsubsidized Loan, include, but are not limited to, its disclosure to federal, state, or local agencies, to institutions of higher education, and to third party servicers to determine your eligibility to receive a TEACH Grant, to investigate possible fraud, and to verify compliance with federal student financial aid program regulations.

In the event of litigation, we may send records to the Department of Justice, a court, adjudicative body, counsel, party, or witness if the disclosure is relevant and necessary to the litigation. If this information, either alone or with other information, indicates a potential violation of law, we may send it to the appropriate authority for action. We may send information to members of Congress if you ask them to help you with federal student aid questions. In circumstances involving employment complaints, grievances, or disciplinary actions, we may disclose relevant records to adjudicate or investigate the issues. If provided for by a collective bargaining agreement, we may disclose records to a labor organization recognized under 5 U.S.C. Chapter 71. Disclosures may be made to our contractors for the purpose of performing any programmatic function that requires disclosure of records. Before making any such disclosure, we will require the contractor to maintain Privacy Act safeguards. Disclosures may also be made to qualified researchers under Privacy Act safeguards.

If your TEACH Grant has been converted to a Direct Unsubsidized Loan, the routine uses of this information also include, but are not limited to, its disclosure to federal, state, or local agencies, to private parties such as relatives, present and former employers, business and personal associates, to creditors, to financial and educational institutions, and to guaranty agencies to verify your identity, to determine your program eligibility and benefits, to permit making, servicing, assigning, collecting, adjusting or discharging your loan(s), to enforce the terms of the loan(s), to investigate possible fraud and to verify compliance with federal student financial aid program regulations, to locate you if you become delinguent in your loan payments or if you default, or to verify whether your debt qualifies for discharge or cancellation. To provide default rate calculations, disclosures may be made to guaranty agencies, to financial and educational institutions, or to federal, state or local agencies. To provide financial aid history information, disclosures may be made to educational institutions.
