To report statutory and regulatory waivers and alternative requirements for Public Housing Agencies (PHAs) pursuant three authorities: to the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and. Economic Security Act (CARES Act) enacted on March 27, 2020, as Public Law 116-136. and PIH Notice 2020-05; waivers and relief under the FR-6050-N-04 is: Relief from HUD Public Housing and Section 8 Requirements Available During CY2020 and CY2021 to Public Housing Agencies to Assist with Recovery and Relief Efforts; and any future emergency waiver relief. Each available authority, pursuant to HUD's discretionary authority under section 106 of the Department of Housing and Urban Development Reform Act of 1989 and consistent with 24 CFR 5.110, specific waiver options is the basis for the checklist responses to report which options were subsequently used and their date of implementation.

PHAs as respondents report the information once annually in the checklist created by the specific prevailing authority. Upon receipt of the information, HUD analyzes the use of waiver authority to inform responses to future emergencies."
