

This appendix also includes the final versions of reading, mathematics, and the COVID-19 outbreak survey questionnaires for students, teachers, and school administrators, which was approved by OMB in November 2021 (OMB #1850-0928 v.21). The COVID-19 outbreak SQs for U.S. History and Civics and the final survey questionnaires for 2022 will be included in Appendices J1, J2, J3, J4 and J-S, which will be submitted in future Amendments.


