

SUPPORTING STATEMENT
FOR PAPERWORK REDUCTION ACT SUBMISSION

The Office of Elementary and Secondary Education (OESE) in the US Department of Education (ED) requests clearance for a new information collection for the discretionary grant application for the Project Prevent program. The Project Prevent grant program provides grants to local educational agencies (LEAs) to increase their capacity to help schools in communities with pervasive violence to better address the needs of affected students and to break the cycle of violence in those communities. This program is authorized under section 4631(a)(1)(B) of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) (20 U.S.C. 7281).

The first Project Prevent grant competition was held in 2019 and was exempt from rulemaking under Section 437(d)(1) of the General Education Provisions Act (GEPA). At this time, the Department is proposing priorities, requirements, and a definition under the Project Prevent grant program. The proposed requirements contain information collection requirements.

Applications are screened for eligibility and then will be evaluated through a peer review process. The Department will use an application's score to determine its ranking and selection for funding.

Applications must be submitted using the grants.gov system, reducing the burden on applicants.

No duplication of effort exists. This information collection requests information specifically for the Project Prevent grant program authorized under section 4631(a)(1)(B) of the ESEA. Applicants will be required to provide information that addresses the statutory purpose and requirements, as well as the selection criteria.

This information collection may impact small entities, but the Department will limit the collection to only information necessary to make grant awards, in order to minimize the burden on small entities.

If this information is not collected, the Department will be unable to make grant awards. Applications provide information describing the project for which funding is requested. The information collected is necessary to evaluate the applications and select projects for funding annually.

- **requiring respondents to report information to the agency more often than quarterly;**

application for which the Department invites comments on the application package for 30 days.

We estimate 150 LEAs will apply and submit an application. We estimate that it will take each LEA 40 hours to complete and submit the application, including time for reviewing instructions, searching existing data sources, gathering and maintaining the data needed, and completing and reviewing the collection of information. The total burden hour estimate for this collection is 6,000 hours. At \$97.28 per hour (using mean wages for Education and Childcare Administrators² and assuming the total cost of labor, including benefits and overhead, is equal to 200 percent of the mean wage rate), the total estimated cost for 150 LEAs to complete the Project Prevent application is approximately \$583,680.

This information collection will not require the purchase of any capital equipment nor create any startup costs.

We estimate it will take 2 staff at the GS 13 level 35 hours to review applications for eligibility. This will result in a total cost to the federal government of 2 Staff at \$46/hour X 35 hours each staff person must work = \$6,440. In addition, the Department has contractor support to conduct the peer review process. The Department can use up to 1 percent of the discretionary budget for peer review costs; the total allocation for FY 2022 is approximately \$95,000,000 so the total available for peer review OSSS discretionary programs is \$950,000 of which the current contract for all School Safety National Activities programs is \$433,733 of which we estimate we will use \$100,000 for the Project Prevent program. The total cost to the Department for this collection is estimated to be \$106,440.
