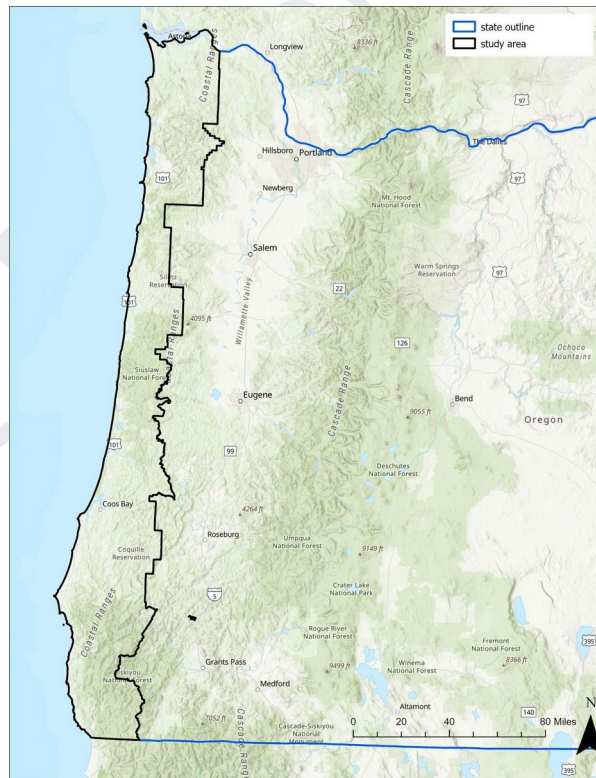
Public Burden Statement

Floating offshore wind energy has recently been proposed off Oregon's southern coast (see map below) by the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM).
