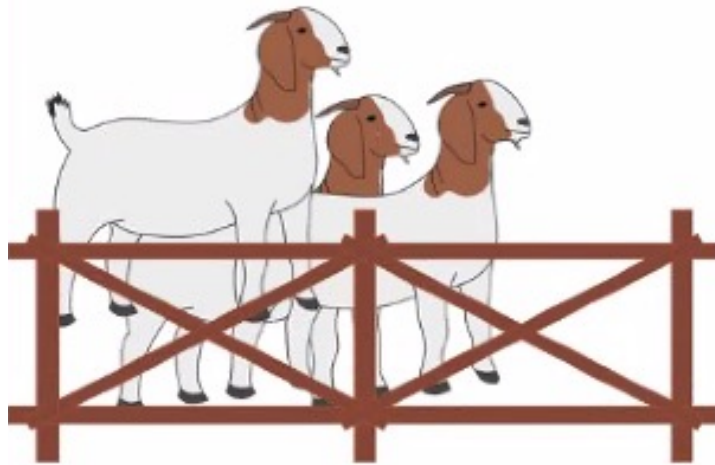


Quarantine New Animals or Keep a Closed Herd

- Keep new additions to the herd quarantined
- Quarantine animals that have recently left the property or had contact with animals from another herd (fairs/shows, breeding, etc)
- Acquire animals from known or proven sources
- Maintain a closed herd by keeping animals born on your farm

Always Have Clean Footwear, Clothes, and Hands

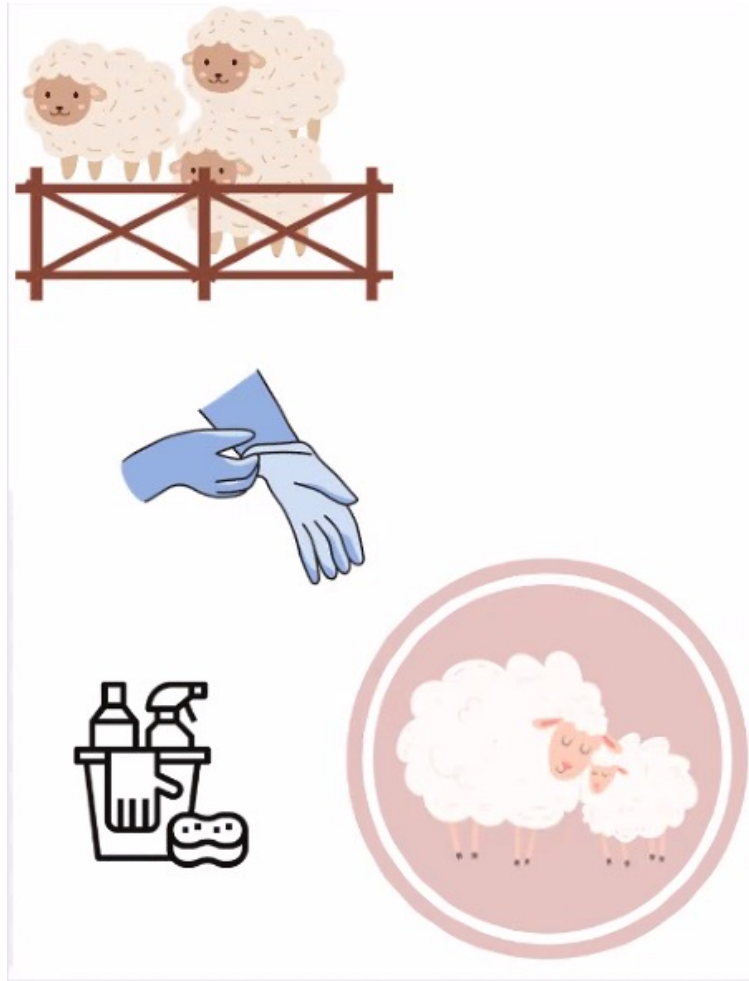


To decrease disease transmission:

- Wash hands or wear gloves
- Clean boots or wear boot covers
- Wear clean clothes or coveralls

Practice Good Kidding and Lambing Hygiene

- Separate females near when they will be kidding/lambing from other members of the herd
- Remove placentas other products of birth promptly
- Wear gloves and disinfect tools when handling products of birth or kids/lambs
