The preferred method is using electronic Notice of Arrival and Departure (eNOAD) format specified at the NVMC's website — <u>https://www.nvmc.uscg.gov/</u> .	
What happens when complete information is received?	The NVMC receives over 250 NOA submissions each day via internet and email. Submissions sent through the eNOAD system will receive a confirmation receipt. After the data has been reviewed, the submitter will receive an email detailing any discrepancies, or a simple notification that the correct information was received.
