



Upon clicking the "VECS" button in ACE, they will be taken to VECS.

There will be a warning / acknowledgement banner regarding CBP systems usage and penalties for providing false or inaccurate information (not yet built)

They will then be prompted to select with port they are filing for.




After clicking the port of filing, they will be asked to provide an IMO or vessel name to locate the vessel they are looking for, along with a date range for arrival.

Once they click Search they will be provided the results.


From here they will have the ability to file an Arrival Report, Entrance, Clearance or requests Permits.



The Arrival Report (currently named Preliminary Entry, but will be changed by the tie of release) will be the 1st step for most vessel scenarios.

At the top of each page it indicates what step of the process they are on and information about the vessel (automated from the eNOAD/APIS transmission), the Fee history (not yet integrated), and the vessel's certificates (which the agent will be responsible for uploading).

The "Agent" field will be auto-populated based on their ACE log-in. This field aligns with the CBP form 3171 and 1300

Many vessel agents are aware of the local port's operating hours.


This aligns with the regulations on the CBP form 3171.


They can then Submit the data to CBP once complete or Save it as a Draft.

Any data that was populated on the Arrival Report will carry over to the Entrance, which can be updated, if necessary.

They will provide the actual Arrival Date and Time, indicate whether the tonnage mark is submerged or not, and what the operating draft is.

These fields align with the CBP form 1300.





The Cargo Operations selected in the Arrival Report are carried over to the Entrance.

Corresponds to the CBP form 1300.


The Crew count is carried over from the Arrival Report. Corresponds to the CBP form 1300.

The vessel agent is then able to add line items for the Vessel's Stores and Crew's Effects or they can upload a spreadsheet (a template will be available for the user to prepare and upload). Replaces the CBP form 1303 and 1304 respectively.

The vessel agent can apply for certain exemptions if they believe they are eligible. This will be automated in the future based on the data available to CBP. This is currently determined manually by the CBPO.

The vessel agent can outline any additional requests or remarks prior to Saving or Submitting.



After submitting the Entrance, the vessel agent can then submit the Clearance.

U.S. vessels do not require an Entrance prior to Clearance, since they are based in the U.S. and may not have an Entrance prior to needing to Clear.

The vessel agent information is carried over from the Arrival Report, along with the Port itinerary information and will allow the vessel agent to update the next port, if needed.

Vessel agent will update the operating draft at the time of expected departure and declare if the vessel is departing in ballast or took bunkers while in the U.S. This aligns with the CBP form 1300.

If they indicate taking bunkers they must provide the quantity, value and type of fuel taken.

They will also indicate any Cargo Operations not captured at the time of the Arrival Report or on Entrance.

This aligns with the CBP form 1300

The departing crew and passenger counts will be pulled automatically from the departure eNOAD transmission and the vessel agent will be able to update, if necessary.

They will be able to include any additional remarks or requests prior to saving or submitting.
