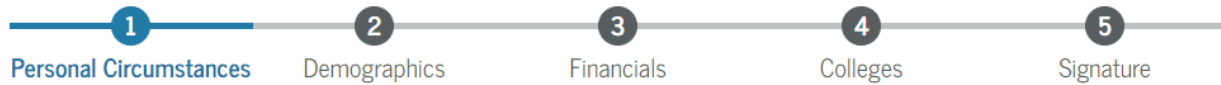


Dependency Status page
