

**SUPPORTING STATEMENT FOR REQUESTS FOR APPROVAL UNDER
THE PAPERWORK REDUCTION ACT AND 5 CFR 1320
EMPLOYMENT APPLICATION, OMB CONTROL NUMBER 3316-0063**

A. Justification

1. **Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary. Identify any legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection. Attach a copy of the appropriate section of each statute and regulation mandating or authorizing the collection of information.**

This information collection request covers the documentation related to the employment application process for TVA. An applicant initially provides information to TVA electronically in the form of a resume and application form. Additional information may be requested from applicants who are selected as prospective candidates for positions with TVA.

Applicant resumes and application forms are accepted from the public who have interest in employment with TVA.

The applicant job application form and resume are needed to collect information on each applicant's qualifications and suitability for employment. TVA Forms 3595 and 17900 are used to collect information to determine an applicant's eligibility for veteran's preference. The information is used to make comparative appraisals and to assist in selections.

Section 3 of the TVA Act (included in this submission) authorizes the collection of the information.

2. **Indicate how, by whom, and for what purpose the information is to be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection.**

The information is used by TVA Talent Acquisition Specialists, Business HR, People First Solution Center personnel, hiring managers, and security personnel to evaluate applicants' qualifications, to determine their eligibility for TVA positions, and to determine their suitability for employment.

3. **Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g. permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. Also, describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden.**

Technology within TVA allows applicants to apply for TVA's externally posted positions by submitting job application forms, resumes and veterans' preference forms electronically. The electronic information provided by the applicant is populated into an electronic database. This data maintenance/retrieval system allows for less paper handling, fewer hard file needs, more applicant filing space, and access at all times to all applicant information. These allowances are the basis for the decision to adopt these means of collection. Electronic collection reduces the candidate's burden because information is automatically collected from the applicant's resume and placed into the appropriate fields on the electronic application form.

An applicant must submit an electronic application form and a resume containing their job qualifications each time they apply for a TVA position. Information from the applicant's resume automatically populates the electronic application form, reducing the applicant's burden of having to enter the same information each time they submit an application.

TVA currently electronically searches to match a unique applicant identifier against those already on file.

There are no other sources for information for individuals seeking employment with TVA.

The online application captures the essential information required to evaluate applicants for specific TVA positions. The collection cannot be made less frequently as it is the source of the most current information about the applicants.

7. **Explain any special circumstances that would cause an information collection to be conducted in a manner:**

- requiring respondents to report information to the agency more often than quarterly;
- requiring respondents to prepare a written response to a collection of information in fewer than 30 days after receipt of it;
- requiring respondents to submit more than an original and two copies of any document;
- requiring respondents to retain records, other than health, medical, government contract, grant-in-aid, or tax records for more than three years;
- in connection with a statistical survey, that is not designed to produce valid and reliable results that can be generalized to the universe of study;
- requiring the use of statistical data classification that has not been reviewed and approved by OMB; that includes a pledge of confidentiality that is not supported by authority established in statute or regulation, that is not supported by disclosure and data security policies that are consistent with the pledge, or which unnecessarily impedes sharing of data with other agencies for compatible confidential use; or
- requiring respondents to submit proprietary trade secret, or other confidential information unless the agency can demonstrate that it has instituted procedures to protect the information's confidentiality to the extent permitted by law.

Copies of the Federal Register Notices are included as part of the OMB submission process. TVA did not receive any public comments in response to the Federal Register notices.

The pool of applicants for TVA employment is unique and the information is, therefore, not elsewhere available. Feedback about the electronic and paper forms is frequently received from the applicants themselves. The electronic job application form, Form TVA 3595 and Form 17900 are reviewed periodically and may be revised to simplify and enhance their utility based, in part, on feedback from applicants.

TVA receives this feedback by email, letter and telephone.

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This statement, appearing on the external Careers home page, provides applicants with the information necessary to provide feedback by email, letter or telephone.

These records are maintained in a Privacy Act System of Records, TVA-13, Employment Applicant Files (copy included in this submission). A Privacy Act statement appears on all paper forms related to the employment application process.

Online information is transmitted using Hypertext Transfer Protocol Secure (HTTPS).

In addition, there are Privacy Act Statements on the paper forms submitted as part of the application process. The paper forms also contain "Sensitive Information" markings which are required for this type of information by TVA-SPP-12.02, Information Management Policy. Sensitive Information is TVA's highest level of sensitivity. The Sensitive Information markings indicate that access to the information is restricted to those individuals who have this level of clearance. Sensitive Information clearances require an investigation above the standard employment background checks.

Internally, access to the information is restricted to those individuals who have a TVA network ID and password and management authorization to access the data. Some information is restricted to those individuals who hold the appropriate security clearance and have a business reason for needing to access the information.

11. **Provide additional justification for any questions of a sensitive nature, such as sexual behavior and attitudes, religious beliefs, and other matters that are commonly considered private. The Demographic Information on Applicants form is designed to enable federal agencies to evaluate their employment practices by collecting and analyzing data on the race, national origin, sex and disability status of applicants for both permanent and temporary employment in order to comply with requirements of Equal Employment Opportunity Management Directive 715 (MD-715). MD-715 was promulgated under EEOC's authority under Title VII and the Rehabilitation Act. Federal agencies may or may not elect to use the form. Applicants for federal employment may or may not elect to complete the form. Therefore, federal agencies' and applicants use of the form is optional.

Currently the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) publishes forms SF-181, Ethnicity and Race Identification, and SF-256, Self-Identification of Disability, for use in obtaining data from federal employees. This collection would provide identical information from applicants allowing federal agencies to measure the effectiveness of their recruitment efforts.

EEOC is dedicated to ensuring that all segments of American society are represented within the federal workforce. Collection of this data allows federal agencies to develop outreach and recruiting programs to diversify the workforce. Diversification allows the federal workplace to capitalize on differing viewpoints, thereby improving the overall service provided to the public. The federal government's outreach efforts are important to meeting this goal and without the information received from this collection we will be unable to determine the effectiveness of a federal agency's recruitment program.

This type of sensitive information is covered at the Federal level by OMB Control #3046-0017, Uniform Guidelines on Employee Selection Procedure, and OMB Control #1250-0005, Office of Federal Control Compliance Programs Recordkeeping and Reporting Requirements under Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as Amended Section 503.

Resume & Application

Description: Candidate Application, including submission of required forms and resume attachment.

Calculation: Determined by identifying average number of applicant responses over the last three years and multiplying by 12 minutes, which is the average time it takes to complete an application and upload resume. Respondents are up significantly vs last submittal due to increased job openings and applicants, but time per response is down due to system and technology enhancements.

Form 3595

Description: Veteran Status Information

Calculation: Number submitted multiplied by an average completion time of 15 minutes per form.

Form 17900

Description: Request for extension of veteran's preference documents

Calculation: Number submitted multiplied by an average completion time of 15 minutes per form.

Total estimated annualized cost to respondents: \$114,329.

Number of respondents - The estimates of annual applicant resumes and applications submissions are derived from FY2017-2019 data. Applicants are not limited on the number of positions on which they can apply.

Annualized cost per applicant: The average hourly wage for the states in the TVA service area is \$27.78, and represents an increase in the average hourly wage from the previous approval. This estimate was calculated using a snapshot of data taken on 12-31-2021 from the 2021 Bureau of Labor Statistics National Compensation Survey on Wages from the following sources:

13. **Provide an estimate of the total annual cost burden to respondents or record keepers resulting from the collection of information. (Do not include the cost of any hour burden shown in Items 12 and 14).**

The cost estimate should be split into two components: (a) a total capital and start-up cost component (annualized over its expected useful life); and (b) a total operation and maintenance and purchase of services component. The estimates should take into account costs associated with generating, maintaining, and disclosing or providing the information. The applicant profiles, resumes and application forms are collected electronically. Approximately .25 FTEs are required to process all other forms.

Additionally, other possible agency users such as Solution Center Specialists, Business HR, security personnel, and hiring managers are estimated to handle the employment forms. The number of personnel who may handle respondent information and the time spent by each on respondent information are dependent upon company employment needs and resulting interviews, offers, and actual employment.

There are very limited changes, with Changes to Item 14 includes updates to job titles and incumbent salaries.

Number of Respondents are up significantly vs last submittal due to increased job openings and applicants, but time per response is down due to system and technology enhancements.
