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The current requirement for school districts to submit identical or overlapping data to multiple agencies, including the Office for Civil Rights (OCR), is redundant and counterproductive. School districts already provide extensive data to state agencies multiple times each year. Duplicating this effort for the OCR diverts critical personnel time and resources away from core educational activities, such as teaching and supporting students.

Instead, the OCR should collaborate with state agencies and other entities, like the College Board, to streamline data collection. These organizations already possess much of the information the OCR requires, and leveraging these existing datasets would minimize redundancy while maintaining access to accurate, comprehensive data. This approach would not only reduce administrative burdens but also improve efficiency and foster greater alignment between federal and state reporting processes.

Simplifying the data submission process would allow school districts to focus on their primary mission: serving students. It's time to prioritize efficiency and collaboration over unnecessary bureaucratic repetition.
