



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Annual Integrated Economic Survey

The Annual Integrated Economic Survey (AIES) is a re-engineered survey designed to integrate and replace seven existing annual business surveys into a streamlined single survey instrument. It is designed to be easier for businesses to complete, result in better and more timely data, and allow the Census Bureau to operate more efficiently to reduce costs. The AIES will provide key yearly measures of economic activity including the only comprehensive national and subnational data on business revenues, expenses, and assets on an annual basis. The AIES will be conducted annually.

The existing surveys integrated into the AIES include:

- Annual Capital Expenditures Survey (ACES)

- Annual Retail Trade Survey (ARTS)
 Annual Survey of Manufactures (ASM)
 Annual Wholesale Trade Survey (AWTS)
- Manufacturers' Unfilled Orders Survey (M3UFO)
 Report of Organization (COS)
 Service Annual Survey (SAS)

The AIES is a company-based survey that:

- Covers domestic, nonfarm employer businesses with operations during the

- survey year.

 Samples approximately 385,000 small, medium, and large companies.

 Includes most industries across the economy.

 Spans most geographic areas of the United States, including all 50 states and the District of Columbia.



The AES will use a holistic approach to collect data. The U.S. Census Bureau will collect data using one instrument for all operations of the entire company and expensed pieces of the corpasys for entarple, under the traditional annual mailtain data and the company for example, under the traditional annual mailtain dates and due dates. When will the U.S. Census Bureau begin releasing AIES data?

The U.S. Census Bureau is planning to release data beginning in the summer of 2025.

Can I see a list of the companies that will receive the AIES?

No, the U.S. Census Bureau is barred from releasing any information that could identify an individual, business, organization, or institution – and tightly safeguards confidentiality using strong, ever-improving cybersecurity measures.

Why am I receiving more than one Economic Survey from the Census Bureau?

Your company was selected for multiple surveys at the same time. Census Bureau Economic Surveys are a key source for official statistics and provide important measures of the American economy. In 2023, the Annual Integrated Economic Survey (AES) is being conducted concurrently with the Economic Census, Annual Business Survey, and other economic surveys.


- Monthly and Quarterly surveys are small sample surveys that provide the TIMELIEST data available.
- Annual surveys have larger samples and provide the most up-to-date TREND data available.
- The Annual Business Survey (ABS) provides information on selected economic and demographic characteristics for businesses and business owners.
- The Economic Census occurs every 5 years and measures all businesses and provides the most COMPREHENSIVE data available at the national, state, and

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Overview

The Annual Integrated Economic Survey (AIES) is a new survey designed to integrate and replace seven existing annual business surveys. The AIES will produce the only comprehensive national data on business revenues, e-commerce, expenses, inventories, and capital expenditures on an annual basis. Subnational data will be produced for revenue, employment, and payroll.

The surveys being integrated and replaced by the AIES include:

- Annual Capital Expenditures Survey (ACES)
- · Annual Retail Trade Survey (ARTS)
- Annual Survey of Manufactures (ASM)
- Annual Wholesale Trade Survey (AWTS)
- Manufacturers' Unfilled Orders Survey (M3UFO)
- Report of Organization (COS)
- Service Annual Survey (SAS)

These seven surveys will transition to the AIES after the 2022 survey year.

The Census Bureau will conduct the 2022 AIES with approximately 8,200 companies. The 2022 AIES will allow the Census Bureau to examine patterns of response and to determine what additional support respondents will need in future collections.

To minimize the burden imposed on companies already in one or more of the seven annual surveys that the AIES will replace, responses submitted for the 2022 AIES collection will fulfill survey year 2022 reporting requirements for the seven surveys.

After conclusion of the 2022 AIES collection and based on refinements made to collection instrument and procedures, the Census Bureau will conduct the 2023 AIES with approximately 385,000 companies.

Online Reporting

Online reporting for the 2022 AIES collection opened in early September 2023. Data will be collected for survey year 2022.

Online reporting for the 2023 AIES collection will open in March 2024. Data will be collected for survey year 2023.
