This review assesses the evidence comparing reusable and single-use reprocessed medical devices with single-use disposable devices. The primary focus will be on: 1) devices whose inherent purpose is HAI prevention and 2) devices commonly used in bedside care. A secondary focus addresses surgical devices and other scopes.
