

**SUPPORTING STATEMENT FOR
GENEOLOGY INDEX SEARCH REQUEST AND GENEALOGY RECORDS REQUEST
OMB Control No.: 1615-0096
COLLECTION INSTRUMENT(S): Forms No. G-1041 and G-1041A**

A. Justification

- 1. Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary. Identify any legal or administrative requirements that necessitate the collection. Attach a copy of the appropriate section of each statute and regulation mandating or authorizing the collection of information.**

Section 112 of Public Law 106-553 (Making Appropriations for the Government of the District of Columbia and Other Activities Chargeable in Whole or in Part Against the Revenues of Said District of Columbia for the Fiscal Year Ending September 30, 2001, and for Other Purposes), established a Genealogy Fee for providing genealogy research and information services under section 286(t) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (Act). A Genealogy Program is necessary to provide a more timely response to requests for genealogical and historical records.

- 2. Indicate how, by whom, and for what purpose the information is to be used. Except for a new collection, indicate the actual use the agency has made of the information received from the current collection.**

Under Public Law 106-553, the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) charges a fee to recover the cost of searching for and identifying the presence or absence of a historical record. USCIS additionally charges a second set of fees to retrieve, copy, review, and mail historical records to requestors. There is a fee for a copy of a microfilmed record and a separate fee for a copy of a textual record. USCIS uses the data collected on these forms to determine eligibility for the requested service. The forms serve the purpose of standardizing requests for the benefit, and ensuring that basic information is required to assess eligibility provided by applicants.

The Genealogy Index Search Request, Form G-1041, is provided as a convenient means for persons to provide data necessary to perform a search of historical agency indices. The Genealogy Records Request, Form G-1041A, provides a convenient means for persons to obtain copies of agency historical records under the Genealogy Program. The forms provide rapid identification of such requests and ensure expeditious handling.

Persons such as researchers, historians, and social scientists seeking ancestry information for genealogical, family history and heir location purposes will use Forms G-1041 and G-1041A. United States citizens seeking historical records to support a foreign application for dual citizenship may also use these forms.

- 3. Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use**

of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological collection techniques or other forms of information technology, e.g., permitting electronic submission of responses, and the basis for the decision for adopting this means of collection. Also describe any consideration of using information technology to reduce burden.

The use of these forms provides the most efficient means for collecting and processing the required data. Forms G-1041 and G-1041A are both available on the USCIS website at www.uscis.gov, keyword search “Form G-1041” or “Form G-1041a.” The paper forms can be downloaded, filled out, and saved electronically, but must be printed, signed, and submitted to USCIS by mail.

Forms G-1041 and G-1041A can also be completed, signed, and submitted electronically through the USCIS Genealogy online request system at <https://genealogy.uscis.dhs.gov/#/>.

- 4. Describe efforts to identify duplication. Show specifically why any similar information already available cannot be used or modified for use for the purposes described in Item 2 above.**

A review of USCIS’ Forms Inventory Report revealed no duplication of effort, and there is no other similar information currently available that can be used for this purpose.

- 5. If the collection of information impacts small businesses or other small entities (Item 5 of OMB Form 83-I), describe any methods used to minimize burden.**

This collection of information does not have an impact on small businesses or other small entities.

- 6. Describe the consequence to Federal program or policy activities if the collection is not conducted or is conducted less frequently, as well as any technical or legal obstacles to reducing burden.**

This form was created to facilitate an accurate and timely response to USCIS Genealogy Program requests. If the information is not collected, a response to such requests may be impossible or unduly delayed.

- 7. Explain any special circumstances that would cause an information collection to be conducted in a manner:**

- **Requiring respondents to report information to the agency more often than quarterly;**
- **Requiring respondents to prepare a written response to a collection of information in fewer than 30 days after receipt of it;**

- **Requiring respondents to submit more than an original and two copies of any document;**
- **Requiring respondents to retain records, other than health, medical, government contract, grant-in-aid, or tax records for more than three years;**
- **In connection with a statistical survey, that is not designed to produce valid and reliable results that can be generalized to the universe of study;**
- **Requiring the use of a statistical data classification that has not been reviewed and approved by OMB;**
- **That includes a pledge of confidentiality that is not supported by authority established in statute or regulation, that is not supported by disclosure and data security policies that are consistent with the pledge, or which unnecessarily impedes sharing of data with other agencies for compatible confidential use; or**
- **Requiring respondents to submit proprietary trade secret, or other confidential information unless the agency can demonstrate that it has instituted procedures to protect the information's confidentiality to the extent permitted by law.**

This information collection is conducted in a manner consistent with the guidelines in 5 CFR 1320.5(d)(2).

- 8. On August 21, 2026, USCIS published a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking for RIN 1615-AD21, *Genealogy Program Regulations To Clarify the Impact of Federal Records*

Requirements, in the Federal Register at 91 FR 54252.

9. Explain any decision to provide any payment or gift to respondents, other than remuneration of contractors or grantees.

USCIS does not provide any payment for benefit sought.

10. Describe any assurance of confidentiality provided to respondents and the basis for the assurance in statute, regulation or agency policy.

There is no assurance of confidentiality.

* The above Average Hourly Wage Rate is the [May 2025 Bureau of Labor Statistics](#) average wage for All Occupations of \$33.54 times the wage rate benefit multiplier of 1.46 (to account for benefits provided) equaling \$48.97. The selection of "All Occupations" was chosen because respondents to this collection could be expected from any occupation.

13. Provide an estimate of the total annual cost burden to respondents or record keepers resulting from the collection of information. (Do not include the cost of any hour burden shown in Items 12 and 14).

- **The cost estimate should be split into two components: (a) a total capital and start-up cost component (annualized over its expected useful life); and (b) a total operation and maintenance and purchase of services component. The estimates**

should take into account costs associated with generating, maintaining, and disclosing or providing the information. Include descriptions of methods used to estimate major cost factors including system and technology acquisition, expected useful life of capital equipment, the discount rate(s), and the time period over which costs will be incurred. Capital and start-up costs include, among other items, preparations for collecting information such as purchasing computers and software; monitoring, sampling, drilling and testing equipment; and record storage facilities.

- If cost estimates are expected to vary widely, agencies should present ranges of cost burdens and explain the reasons for the variance. The cost of purchasing or contracting out information collection services should be a part of this cost burden estimate. - Generally, estimates should not include purchases of equipment or services, or portions thereof, made: (1) prior to October 1, 1995; (2) to achieve regulatory compliance with requirements not associated with the information collection; (3) for reasons other than to provide information or keep records for the government; or, (4) as part of customary and usual business or private practices.

There are no capital, start-up, operational or maintenance costs associated with this collection of information.

This information collection may impose some out-of-pocket costs on respondents, in addition to the time burden for the form's preparation. Costs may include payments for document translation and preparation services, attorney and legal fees, postage, and costs associated with gathering documentation. USCIS estimates that the average cost for these activities is \$31.95. The estimated out of pocket cost to respondents is calculated as follows.

G-1041: 103 annual respondents multiplied by the average cost per response of \$31.95, which equals a total annual cost of \$3,291.

G-1041A: 185 annual respondents multiplied by the average cost per response of \$31.95, which equals a total annual cost of \$5,911.

The total estimated annual cost to respondents is **\$9,202** (Calculated: \$3,291 + \$5,911 = \$9,202).

USCIS establishes its fees using an activity-based costing model to assign costs to an adjudication based on its relative adjudication burden and use of USCIS resources. Fees are established at an amount that is necessary to recover these assigned costs, plus an amount to recover unassigned overhead (which includes the suggested average hourly rate for clerical, officer, and managerial time with benefits) and immigration benefits provided for free. USCIS uses the fee associated with an information collection as a reasonable measure of the collection's costs to USCIS, since these fees are based on resource expenditures related to the benefit in question. In addition, this figure includes the estimated overhead cost for printing, stocking, distributing and processing of this form.

The total estimated cost to the Federal government is **\$454,200**. This figure is calculated by multiplying the form's estimated number of annual respondents for each form's filing type multiplied by the form's filing fee for each form's filing type (see table below).

15. **Explain the reasons for any program changes or adjustments reporting in Items 13 or 14 of the OMB Form 83-I.**

USCIS is reporting no change in the estimated annual hour burden to respondents for this collection of information as a result of the proposed rulemaking, *Genealogy Program Regulations To Clarify the Impact of Federal Records Requirements*. The changes to Form G-1041 and G-1041A include clarifying edits related to historical records requests, the method of delivery, and instructional language. USCIS has provided a synopsis of the edits associated with the changes to the information collection within the paper filing instrument Table of Changes (TOC); and the online filing instrument Copy Deck TOC for Form G-1041 and G-1041A.

USCIS is reporting no change to the estimated annual cost burden to respondents for this collection of information as a result of the proposed rulemaking

This information collection will not be published for statistical purposes.
